## Evangelist Will Speak

Dr. Bob Jones Sr., internationally known evangelist and founder of Bob Jones University, will deliver a special lecture-sermon in Ashland Thursday, Feb. 23, at 8 p.m. Dr. Jones will discuss "The Perils of America—Where is This Nation Headed?" There will be two other services the same day. At 10 a.m. Dr. Jones will conduct a special pastors' and Christian workers' conference on evangelism in which he will discuss the evangelism of the past, modern trends in evangelism, and the future outlook for evangelism. At 2:30 p.m. he will speak on the subject "When and Why God Gets Mad." The meetings will be held at the Faith Tabernacle, south of Ashland on Highway 99. The Rev. Leo Wine is pastor. Dr. Jones will appear under the sponsorship of a committee of local pastors and laymen.

large and small farms. They ranged from 400 acre spreads, large according to Swedish standards, to very small diversified acreages. She helped with farm work, harvesting wheat and barley, potatoes, and assisted her host mother with the housework. Shirley reported, "Each day my host mother and I would hurry through the house cleaning and little chores and then work on a special project. I learned to do Swedish embroidery, make sausage, which we prepared for smoking to be used at Christmas, and, of course, I learned to make Swedish pastries!"

Two of her most exciting experiences were living with the Lapps in Lapland, in the northern part of Sweden, and in a fishing village. Shirley was born and raised in Bend. She has almost completed her work for her bachelor of science degree in home economics at Oregon State College. She was a 10-year 4-H Club member, and two years a 4-H leader. Since 1951, 33 IFYE delegates from Oregon have participated in this program. Twenty-nine have returned to report on their experiences, with color slides, to more than 200,000 persons in Oregon.

## Methodists Schedule Visitation

A Crusade for Christ, Lay Evangelism Visitation, is scheduled for the Methodist Church from Feb. 26 to March 6.

The Rev. Leroy Walker of the General Board of Evangelism, centered at Nashville, will be present to direct an intensive effort to revive inactive members, enlist unaffiliated members and friends, and lead others into Christian commitment.

He will preach on both Sunday mornings, and will speak at evening meetings during the week. Methodist men who are volunteering as callers will eat together each evening at a dinner served by the Woman's Society of Christian Service, where they will be instructed and encouraged for the task before them.

Early morning breakfasts are already being held for men workers, and women are meeting in groups in various parts of town for prayer in preparation for the anticipated week of evangelism.

The Rev. Walker was born in Oklahoma, but was a graduate from Willamette University before completing seminary work in Kimball School of Theology. He became a member of Oregon Conference in 1926, and has also served in the Idaho and the Pacific Northwest Conferences. Through the years he has developed a technique and a philosophy for visitation evangelism which has been very effective in many parts of the country.

He has directed great missions in the Arkansas-Louisiana area, in Florida, Jackson, Mississippi, Alabama, Maryland, and West Virginia. In 1957 he directed 12 churches and four denominations in St. Louis. He is author of booklets such as "A Prayer Guide for Lay Groups," "Winning Persons for Christ," and "The Concern of Friendship."
