Enters Plea Of Guilty

ALEXANDRIA, Va. (AP) — A former Pentagon mathematician has pleaded guilty to unauthorized possession of a secret defense document.

After Arthur Rogers Roddey, 38, entered the plea Friday, the government indicated it would drop the other 11 counts of a 12-count indictment.

U.S. Judge Albert V. Bryan deferred sentencing, pending a probation report. He continued Roddey's \$15,000 bond.

Roddey, who worked for a private contractor at the Pentagon until last August, admitted specifically that he willfully and unlawfully kept a secret defense document which he "had reason to believe could be used to the advantage of a foreign power."

The new organization pledged itself to work for the early construction of a first class all-weather highway from Winnemucca to Crescent City. The proposed route would pass through Lakeview, Klamath Falls, Medford and Grants Pass on its way to the sea.

The group decided that construction of the highway was a county responsibility and the project should be controlled by the counties until it is completed and ready for use.

The bylaws for the Winnemucca-to-the-Sea Association were patterned after those of the Redwood Empire Association, a group which pushed for the Redwood Highway from Grants Pass south down Highway 101 to San Francisco.

A Friday night banquet concluded the day-long session. Representatives emerged from the meeting with high hopes that the long awaited highway would be a reality soon.

Economic Proposals Near Action

WASHINGTON (AP) — One of President Kennedy's top priority economic proposals may be ready this week for House consideration while another of his measures to spur the economy faces rougher going.

The committee also killed a bill to increase state aid to school districts from \$105 per child per year to \$115. The committee indicated it does not think the increase is large enough.

The committee postponed action for at least two weeks on a bill to require five years of college training for elementary school teachers. Four years now are required.

As to the basic school increase, several committee members said they favor a Senate bill to boost it to \$130. Gov. Mark Hatfield has recommended \$130.
