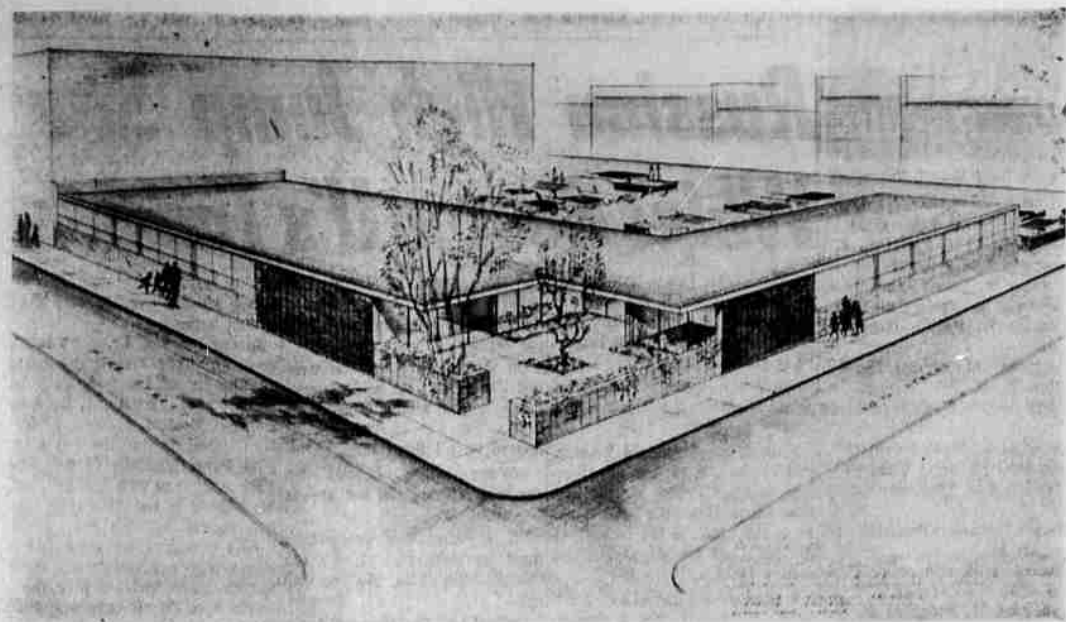




THIS NEW COMBINED medical and accounting building is scheduled for construction at the corner of Tenth and Pine streets this spring and summer. Dr. Frank W. Johnson and Kenneth Lambie, CPA, have authorized the construction which will be financed and supervised by West-

ern Medical Centers, Inc., of Seattle. Architects for the new building, shown here, are Morrison, Howard and Starbuck, Engineer. Approximate cost of the building will be \$95,000.

Plans For New Building Announced

A combination medical and accounting office is to be constructed at the corner of Tenth and Pine streets beginning in March. Announcement of the proposed construction was made jointly by

Dr. Frank W. Johnson, ophthalmologist, and Kenneth Lambie, CPA. The new structure will be constructed in an "L" with the wing on Pine Street housing approx-

imately a 3,000 square foot space for Dr. Johnson, and the Tenth Street section will provide office space for Kenneth Lambie and Company, accountants. Dr. Johnson indicated that the

new structure will give him additional space for expansion and said that his plans are to add another associate with his office. Western Medical Centers, Inc., Seattle, is handling construction and financing arrangements. Plans call for construction to begin sometime in early March with a tentative completion date of July.

Estimated cost of the lot and the new structure has been set at about \$117,000. Of this amount, the building will cost about \$95,000. Morrison, Howard, Architects and Starbuck, Engineer, are architects for the new project. The site of the new structure is the former site of the old Linkville School which used to be located on the block now occupied by Montgomery Ward and the Medical Dental Building. This schoolhouse was later moved to this corner and remodeled into an apartment house which was torn down some years ago.

The new plans call for a building covering about half of the 9,000 square feet of the lot, and providing parking space for about 17 to 18 cars. Lambie indicated that his present building, constructed only a few years ago, has been condemned by the Post Office Department to make room for the proposed expansion of the post office building here, and that he will be forced to move from the structure early in September.

Satellite Room Open For Public

The Satellite Restaurant and Lounge at the Municipal Terminal Building at the airport is officially open to the public today. Richard Smith and his wife, Dorothy, new operators of the airport restaurant facility, report the opening to the public today with the grand opening scheduled within the week.

Smith formerly was manager of the Umpqua Hotel in Roseburg, and prior to that was with the Willard Hotel here in Klamath Falls in 1956 and 1957. Smith was also with the Eugene Hotel for six years prior to that.

In addition to his extensive background in restaurant operation, Smith has been very active in civic affairs.

He was president of the Roseburg Jaycees and active with the Kiwanis Club and the Roseburg Chamber of Commerce. He was also a member of the board of directors of the Red Cross, and was secretary-treasurer of the Douglas County Restaurant and Beverage Association for three years.

Smith recently signed a lease on the Satellite Room, formerly managed by Mike May. His lease with the city of Klamath Falls has been affirmed by the city council.

The Smiths reside at 2444 Garden with their three children, Kimberly Ann, 4½; Kevin, 2½; and 1-year-old Kristine.

Proposals for the new operation include a conversion to a motor-hotel type operation with the addition of motel units on the east side of the current structure and considerable internal changes in the hotel itself.

Winema Hotel Change Told By New Partners

Ownership of the Winema Hotel was recently changed from a three-way partnership of T. B. Watters, Lois Serruys and Merle West to a partnership between Merle West and R. T. Lindley, optometrist.

Announcement of the exchange of ownership was made Friday jointly by West and Lindley. In discussing the change, they outlined some of their tentative plans for extensive remodeling of the Winema.

Plans are being formulated to convert the Winema into a motor-hotel type operation with addition of motel units anticipated on the east side of the structure. Tentative plans are being discussed for motel units on the second and third levels with parking on the ground level. These units will probably be complete with a swimming pool situ-

ated to utilize the sun to great advantage.

The new owners also plan expansion of present banquet facilities and expect to have a banquet room capable of handling 300 guests, plus smaller rooms for other events. The present lobby and the Cunas Room will be combined and remodeled into a combination dining room with bar and lounge, under present tentative plans. The lobby would be moved to the east end of the structure to better serve both the hotel and the motel operation. Both men admitted that their plans are in the proposal stage at the present time, and that until final architectural designs are drafted and adopted, they do not know what the cost of such a modernization program will be. They did indicate that they hope to begin construction on the motel units of the operation sometime later this year.

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Construction Bids Asked

Bids are being asked by the Base Procurement Office at Kingsley Field for modification of the power check pad and blast deflectors and taxiway repair at Kingsley Field.

The bids require the furnishing of all tools, labor, materials, equipment and supplies to accomplish all operations in connection with the installation of a jet blast deflector, and repair of the access taxiway at the Aircraft Power Check Pad.

Specification on the project may be obtained from the Government Printing Office, Washington 25, D.C.

The site may be viewed between the hours of 9 a.m. and 3 p.m. Monday through Friday by contacting the Installation Engineer, Kingsley Field.

Bids will be opened at 2 p.m. on Tuesday, March 14.

PO Contract Let

Congressman Harold T. Johnson announced that a contract has been signed providing for the construction and rental to the Post Office Department of a new building for the Dorris Post Office.

The Dorris Post Office will have 1,131 square feet in a building which will be located on the corner of Third and Oregon streets. The rental agreement was made with Marshall Hamilton, P.O. Box 236, Dorris. The new post office is expected to be completed about May 1.

Specifications call for new modern lighting and equipment, including a low, open patron-service counter.

Court To Issue Juror Handbook

A special new booklet called "A Handbook for Jurors" will make its appearance in the Klamath County Circuit Court. Circuit Judge David R. Vandenberg reported last week that Klamath County has ordered 1,250 booklets for distribution to future veniremen. The booklets will be distributed by the bailiff to possible jurors when they are called for service.

The book was written by a special committee of the Oregon Bar, working with the bar's public service and information committee.

Judge Vandenberg said, "The information contained in the booklet is substantially the same information that I issue to prospective jurors when they are first empaneled. The booklet gives them an opportunity to study the duties of a juror at their own leisure."

Airline Sets New Record

West Coast Airlines ended the year 1960 with new all-time records in total passenger revenue, on-line revenue and interline revenue, the company's sales statistics annual report revealed today.

Net sales, including sales from other airlines, reached a record \$6,269,256, an increase of 33.58 per cent over last year. On-line sales, including station and travel agency sales, were up 31.5 per cent and interline revenue up almost 41 per cent.

Klamath Falls developed local sales of \$156,987 for the year, compared to \$93,414 for 1959 for an increase of 68 per cent. The total number of passengers boarded was 11,806 compared to 1959's 8,039, an increase of 38 per cent.

West Coast carried on an all-time record total of 288,781 revenue passengers, up 14.22 per cent and another record 92,805 revenue passenger miles, up nearly 30 per cent over 1959.
