Colors of both range from pure white through deeper shades of pink, red, yellow, so that many color schemes are possible.

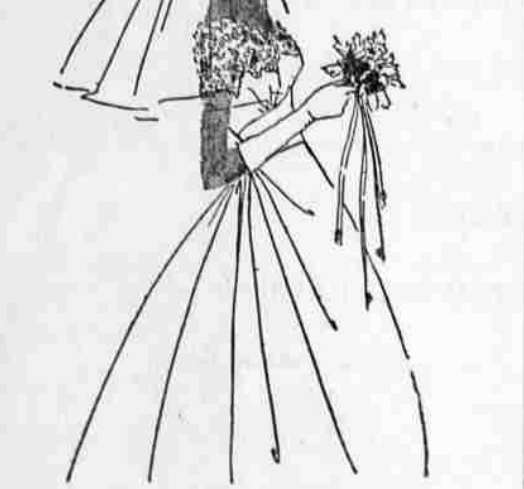

There is a seed of virtue we can nourish if we are willing to admit them and start pruning them clean of fears. In the snappiness moment before opening it. Sure enough, the good-looking, too-sure-of-himself young serviceman Julie had met at a New Year's party had a leave coming and wanted "to spend as much of it with you as you will let me."

Later when her daughter got home, she gave her the opened letter saying, "I was naughty to open it, I know. It was unfor- givable. But I was so interested to hear what he said that I couldn't wait for you. You don't mind, do you, dear? Are you going to see him? He . . ."

Her daughter exploded. "You snooped, Mother!" she cried. "What right had you to read my letter? If you ever do this to me again . . ."

Mother began to cry. "That I should live to see the day my own child called me a 'snoop,' she said. 'How dare you call your own mother a 'snoop'? Other girls would be grateful to have a mother so interested in them. But not you, not you . . ."

The trick of diverting the other fellow's criticism of our shortcomings by calling them virtues is an old, old device of people who must be perfect.

Like Julie's mother, they have no faults. They open children's mail, not out of snooping, but out of "interest" in them. They accept a relative's domination, not out of spinelessness but out of respect for "peace in the home." They are never gullible, but "trusting," their stinginess is "thrift" and their conceit always "pride." Such idealizers of their shortcomings naturally get upset when someone else names the shortcomings accurately.
