Sentiment For Industry Is Better

SALEM (AP)—The public attitude toward Oregon industrial development is much improved, a committee of the state Department of Planning and Development said Thursday.

Committee members made the survey among top executives of Oregon industry to aid the department in the future development.

They also approved resolutions to increase the present trend toward improving the climate for all business, and to oppose the use of public funds for private low interest capital to draw new industry.

Many states, they said, are offering tax concessions for as long as 10 years to draw new industries to their areas. Some even are setting up public funds to provide loans to draw new industry with interest rates as low as two per cent a year.

Another resolution said marked stimulus to the economy would result from either outright or gradual elimination of the property tax on inventory.

Tax Director Gives Warning

A. G. Erickson, district director of the Internal Revenue Service for the state of Oregon, cautions all federal income taxpayers that they must report income from several sources which are not reported on their W-2 withholding tax certificates.

"Sources of taxable income," he pointed out, "include part-time work, dividends, interest on savings accounts, tips or other gratuities and several other forms of income."

Taxpayers who fail to report such taxable income," Erickson warned, "may be subject to penalties and interest."

"Taxpayers should check their sources of income against the instruction booklet or the appropriate tax guide to determine whether specific items should be reported," Erickson said.

MC Offers Recruit Plan

Men between 17 and 28 years of age are eligible to participate in the "join now, go later" program announced by the Marine Corps Recruiting office in Medford last week.

Under the program, a man may enlist and return home to complete his education or term of employment. Then, 120 days from date of enlistment he is called to active duty, if he has not reported of his own volition in the interim.

Thus, the corps advises, enlistees are assured of acceptance before graduation from school and before quitting a job, more pay when assigned to active duty, eligibility for promotion earlier and fulfillment of a portion of military obligation at home.

No uniforms are worn, nor will enlistees be required to attend drills.

Men choosing the program are also eligible to apply for assignment to the corps' guaranteed aviation program if qualified.

A recruiter spends each Friday afternoon in the Selective Service office here, and those interested in more information are invited to contact him.

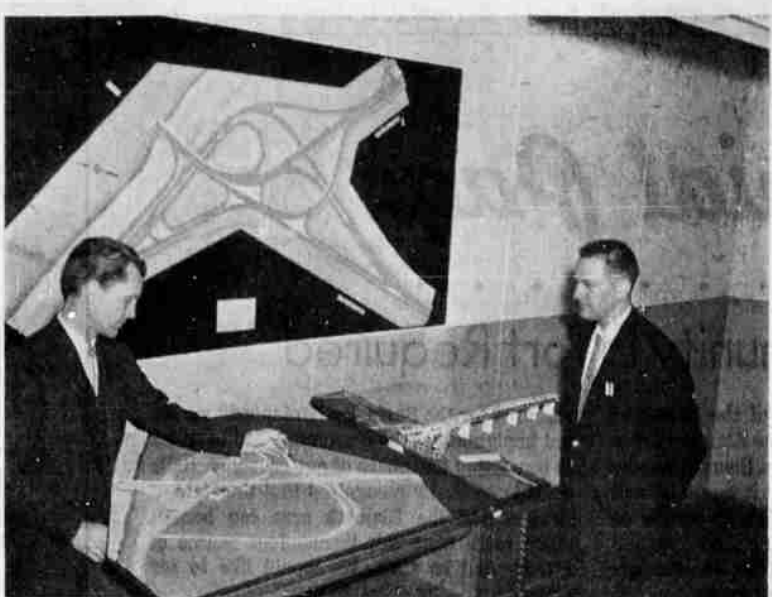
