State Hits Accelerator On Projects

SALEM (AP)—Oregon has accelerated its timetable for construction projects in an effort to put new vigor into the economy. Gov. Mark O. Hatfield said Friday in a telegram to President Kennedy.

The President Thursday asked all states to give prompt consideration to special action to invigorate the economy, including "state and local projects that are genuinely useful and will provide immediate jobs and business help. Hatfield said he had urged the Oregon Legislature to accelerate the timetable on projects that normally would have to wait until July 1 for funds. "In order that the building industry might absorb unemployment and make an earlier start with the good spring construction weather."

"Your administration's recent request for submission of forest projects of access roads and reforestation among other efforts is most welcome," Hatfield's telegram said.

Hatfield said he recommended building an all-wood forestry building in Oregon's Capitol Mall as both a tribute to the industry and as a symbol for home and public construction.

Kennedy urged release of \$724 million in federal highway aid in the nation this month and \$350 million in other construction funds for such projects as hospitals, schools and waste treatment facilities.

Refuge Plan Is Opposed
CORVALLIS (AP)—A plan to locate a 5,000-acre refuge south of here for Canada geese has run into some stiff opposition.

The U. S. Fish and Wildlife Service outlined the plan at a public meeting that drew about 150 persons, mostly farmers.

Opposition was voiced on the grounds that Benton County already has a considerable amount of tax-exempt public lands.

Vernon Chelidino, member of the Corvallis school board, said county taxpayers now "pick up the tab" on some \$90 million true cash value of public land.

David Marshall, biologist for the Wildlife Service, said some 15,000 Canada geese now winter in Benton County.

Purpose of the refuge would be to maintain the goose population at about that figure, he said.

Luce Orders Speedup In BPA Works

PORTLAND (AP)—A speedup in a \$1 million Bonneville Power Administration construction program has been ordered by BPA Administrator Charles F. Luce.

"Construction contracts and maintenance work that can be started now instead of next summer will give an immediate boost to our regional economy in keeping with President Kennedy's program has been ordered by BPA Luce.

Luce said the acceleration will provide an increase in March and April of approximately \$350,000 in construction contracts in Oregon and \$500,000 in Washington, plus \$150,000 in material purchases. "The work will in most instances provide substantial local employment, while sizeable portions of the electrical and other material purchases are made in the Northwest," Luce said.

Oregon projects included in the speedup include construction of a 115,000-volt transmission line in Lane County, feeder additions and the Wren substation transformer in Benton County, and a new Fern Ridge substation in Lane County, along with work on access bridges near Oregon City and Tillamook.

Projects in Washington include: construction of the Tacoma-Covington 287,000-volt transmission line in Pierce and King counties; construction of the Ice Harbor-Franklin 115,000-volt transmission line in Franklin and Walla Walla counties; an addition to the Scoot-enay substation; building repair to the Ross substation, and drainage system maintenance in the Spokane area.

CHAMBER COMMENTS by GEORGE T. CALLISON Manager KLAMATH COUNTY CHAMBER OF COMMERCE

The decision of the Board of Directors of the Klamath County Chamber of Commerce to initiate a comprehensive study of the mutual problems of the city of Klamath Falls and the surrounding suburban area should result in one of the most, if not the most, significant area development project ever undertaken by the chamber.

The chamber enters into the study with the full knowledge that the problem is a thorny one. To resolve it will demand a completely open-minded attitude. There must be no preconceived ideas regarding possible conclusions to be reached, but only a sincere and serious desire to determine all of the facts and, on the basis of them, to recommend a procedure which will be in the best interests of all concerned.

In a sense, we are lucky we have not had to deal with this problem much earlier, as hundreds of communities across the nation have had to do. The experience of some of these other areas should prove invaluable. Admittedly, no two communities have identical problems, although there are similarities, even between such widely divergent areas as Klamath County and Dade County, Fla. We have 24 taxing districts in Klamath County; Dade County, with one-third our area, had 26 separate police agencies before a metropolitan form of government was agreed upon and most of the needless and costly duplication of services was eliminated.

Tax Charge Is Returned For Evasion

PORTLAND (AP)—A federal jury Thursday indicted Otto W. Heider Sr. of Sheridan, Ore., on two counts of evading payment of \$272,898 in income taxes in 1953 and 1954.

U. S. Atty. C. E. Luckey said Heider's secretary, Irene E. Lawrence of Sheridan, also was named in the same indictment and charged with attempting to evade income taxes. Luckey said she was accused of filing, with Heider, fraudulent joint income tax returns for Heider and his wife.

The indictment against Heider accused him of reporting a loss of \$22,937 in 1953, when his actual income was \$203,425 and the tax on that amount totaled \$141,252. On the second count, Heider was accused of reporting no income for 1954, when he had an income of \$196,829 and the tax on that amount totaled \$131,646.

Heider is a former attorney who was permanently disbarred by the Oregon Supreme Court in 1959.

Heider was brought to court before the chamber's committee. The meeting time, again, is 3:30 every Monday afternoon as long as the legislature is in session.
