He hastily added however, that there was still the district and state competition to be considered, so the Pelis still had a lot to do.

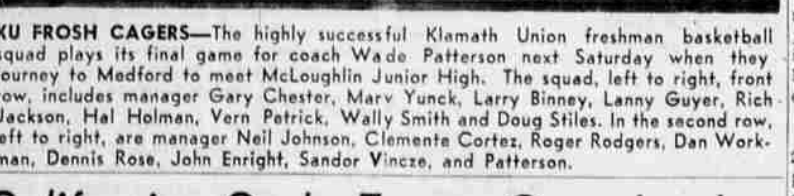
Chiefs Win In Squeaker KF Archers

OTI Wrestlers Win Four Titles: OCE Wolves Win OCC Crown

ASHLAND (Special)—The Oregon Tech Owls, with only one season behind them in their wrestling program, collected four Oregon Collegiate Conference championships here Saturday but the favorite Oregon College Wolves matched them and won the league championship.

The Wolves, tied with the Techmen 70-all at the end of the championship round, nabbed their title with 12 points garnered in the 2nd place challenge round.

Oregon Tech's John Weaver, 123 pounds, Dave Kubesh, a 130-pounder undefeated in two years at OTI, Hank Williams, 157 pounds, and heavyweight Ed Anderson, each picked up titles in the first OCC championship.

Mat Headliners Set Tuesday KF Show

The world's light-heavyweight professional wrestling champion and one of the top contenders for his title will headline the pro mat card slated in the Klamath Auditorium Tuesday night.

Although the title is not at stake, this time, matchmaker Tex Hager of Sierra Sports, Inc., noted that should Portland's Jack Kiser, the challenger, beat Jack "Moe" Smith, the defender, a title fray would be a "must" in the near future.

In addition to the main event, a two of three fall, one time limit affair, Hager has paired Frenchy Roberre, a popular Canadian 205-pounder, with Mexico's Pancho Valdez, 210, in a semi-main which is scheduled to be a 45-minute time limit or the best of three falls.

The opener, a special event over a 30-minute route, will match Salt Lake's Sandy Barr and Seattle's Bill Nichols, each near 190 pounds.
