

# Owls, Raiders Clash Tuesday At OTI

## Long Putt Wins Cash In Tourney

TUCSON, Ariz. (AP)—A 27-foot desperation putt good for a birdie on the third hole Sunday gave Dave Hill of Jackson, Mich., victory in the sudden death playoff for top money in the \$20,000 Tucson Open golf tournament.

Former U.S. Open champ Tommy Bolt and California rookie Buddy Sullivan quietly headed for the clubhouse as the 23-year-old Hill leaped for joy. It was his first PGA victory.

The putt that wasn't meant to fall earned \$2,800 for Hill and trimmed Bolt's and Sullivan's shares to \$1,670 each.

"I just hit it," said the elated youngster. "I had no idea it would go in. All I was trying to do was get close to the pin for a par."

Hill also had something to jump about a few minutes earlier when his 15-foot putt dropped for an eagle 3 on the par-5, 510-yard 18th hole. This gave him a 5-under-par 65 for the round and a 72-hole total of 269.

It also put the pressure on nine others still on the course if they were to tie him. At the start of the final round, Hill had been in a three-way tie for ninth.

Bolt met the challenge with birdies on the last two holes for a 1-under-par for the rain swept 6,464-yard, par 70 El Rio Course.

Sullivan stood up under pressure by coming out of trees for a birdie on the 18th. Bolt also had 269. Sullivan had shared the lead at the halfway mark with Jay Hebert and held a stroke advantage going into the final round.

Bolt missed a 10-foot putt for a birdie on the first extra hole by less than an inch. All three took par fours for the 368-yard hole.

Bolt went for victory on the second hole with a 20-foot chip shot from the apron that rimmed the cup and hung on the lip. He had to settle for a par 4 on the 450-yard No. 2 hole. So did Hill and Sullivan. The end came on the next green.

"I was scared all the way," Hill admitted. "I figured Tommy would win. He'd just birdied two in a row to tie me and I thought he was in the best position. I was nervous, but perhaps he was too."

MIAMI, Fla. (AP)—Little Pennuts Lowrey outdrove and outputted his rivals to win the baseball players golf championship with a final round of 72 and a 72-hole score of 295.

Lowrey's two-over-par finish Sunday gave him a three stroke triumph over Baltimore manager Paul Richards, who shot a 74 for a 298 total at the Miami Springs course.

The 5-foot-9 coach of the Philadelphia Phillies credited his victory to long smashes off the tees and to his steady putting game.

Alvin Dark, San Francisco Giants manager also had a fine round, coming in with a 74 to tie the defending champion Jim Hearn.

## Paret, Ortega Set Non-Title Return Bout

NEW YORK (UPI)—Welterweight champion Benny (Kid) Paret engages Mexican Gaspar Ortega at Los Angeles Saturday night in a nationally televised return non-title fight that stands out on this week's boxing schedule.

In the Los Angeles 10-rounder, Cuban Paret will try to avenge a defeat by Ortega, suffered Aug. 7, 1959—before Benny became champion.

Paret took the Ortega return as a replacement for Emile Griffith of New York, when Paret and Griffith were matched for a title fight at Miami Beach, April 1.

Were Griffith to fight and lose to Ortega, the title fight would be knocked out. But should champion Paret lose to Ortega, the Miami Beach title bout still will be on, since Benny's crown is not being risked against Ortega.

Dave Charnley of England defends his European lightweight title against Fernand Nallet, champion of France, at London Tuesday night.

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## Buckeyes, Indianans In Rematch

Like the frying pan and the fire, it's out of Iowa City (barely) and into Bloomington tonight for Ohio State's singed Buckeyes in the second of two showdown steps toward major college basketball's first all-winning regular season record in four years.

The top-ranked Buckeyes, breathing hard after whipping up a 10-point late-game burst that beat Iowa 62-61 Saturday night, go against the revenge-minded Indiana Hoosiers—a tough to beat bunch at home even when they don't have a grudge to settle.

And these hurryin' Hoosiers do have a grudge—one that flamed when Ohio State clobbered Indiana 100-65 at Columbus, Ohio, on Feb. 6.

Indiana Coach Branch McCracken accused the Bucks of purposely rolling up a big score, and the Hoosier folk have been implying retaliation when Ohio State got to Bloomington for the return match.

A year ago, before the Bucks went on to the national championship, they lost at Indiana 99-83 after having rallied for a 96-95 triumph at Columbus earlier in the season. That loss, back on Feb. 29, 1960, was the last for Jerry Lucas & Co. They have won 25 since, including all 20 this season in their bid to become the first team since North Carolina in 1957 to sweep unbeaten through a regular season.

The Tar Heels ultimately went a step further—going on to win the NCAA title and finishing 32-0. After Indiana tonight, Ohio State has three games left — at home against Wisconsin and Michigan State, and on the road at Illinois. The three have a combined Big Ten record of 6-20.

Second-ranked St. Bonaventure, shadowing the Buckeyes with a 20-1 record and 11-game streak, also has a pair of games during the week.

The Bonnies, who needed a comeback like Ohio State's to beat DePaul 78-69 last Saturday, seek their 99th and 100th straight home victories when they go against Siena Thursday and Niagara Saturday.

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## Important Series Face PNW Fives

A series of crucial games come up this week as the Pacific Northwest's major independent colleges scramble for a bid to the western regional NCAA basketball playoff.

Seattle, which now has the best overall record among the six independents, posted a 61-57 victory over visiting Oregon Saturday night.

Idaho meanwhile made it two straight over visiting Oregon State with a 54-47 decision. The University of Portland lost at Notre Dame 80-69.

That gave Seattle an overall 15-7 record, Oregon State 13-9, Portland and Oregon 12-9, Washington State 8-13 and Idaho 9-14.

This week it will be Idaho at Washington State Tuesday and Seattle at Idaho State Wednesday. On Friday Oregon and Portland will clash at Vancouver, Wash., Southern California will be at Oregon State and Seattle at Montana State. On Saturday Southern California again will be at Oregon State and Washington will play at Washington State.

The NCAA selection committee has said that overall records will not be the sole determining point for invitations to the playoff. Caliber of competition and how the teams fare against each other also will be considered.

In play against each other Oregon, Oregon State and Idaho are leading the pack. Oregon's record is 8-5, Idaho and Oregon State 9-6 each, Seattle 7-5, Washington State 4-9 and Portland 2-8. Seattle has no games remaining against any of the other five independents, Idaho and Portland one each, Oregon State two.

Washington State three and Oregon five.

Idaho and Portland will wind up their play against the other independents this week, but Oregon, Oregon State and Washington State will carry on into March.

A former Oregonian played a key role in Idaho's victory Saturday. Dole James, former Pendleton prep player, led a second-half rally that brought Idaho from a 40-20 deficit to a 40-40 tie in less than 20 minutes. Idaho went on from there with the 5-11 James totaling 19 points. Big Karl Anderson led Oregon State with 17.

At Seattle it was Dave Mills who saved the game for the Chieftains after Oregon almost duplicated Idaho's comeback.

Oregon trailed 37-22 at the half, but a second-half rally cut the margin to 57-56 with 20 seconds to go. Oregon, trying to get the ball, fouled Dan Stautz of Seattle. He missed the free throw and Oregon might have had a chance to go ahead but for Mills. He grabbed the rebound and sank one of the only four baskets Seattle got in the second half. Not enough time remained for Oregon to threaten again.

The Carolina League All-Star game is set for Thursday night, June 29.

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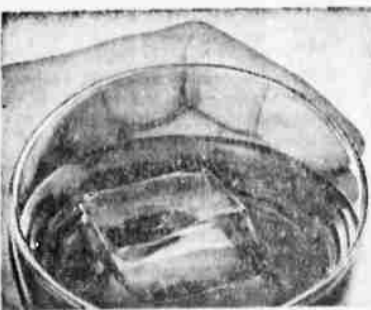
