O&C Counties Outline Recreational Program

PORTLAND (AP) — Development of recreational areas spread widely through Western Oregon mountain and coastal country was outlined today by the Association of O & C Counties and cooperating state and federal agencies.

The key to the program—which is still to be worked out in detail—is a vast network of 37 road tapping areas of recreational possibility.

The roads would make it possible to get to areas along the crest of the Cascades from Mt. Hood to Lake of the Woods and Klamath Lake, then into the Siskiyou, across the Coast Range, and up the coast from the California state line to Tillamook.

Most of this network already exists in part as unconnected segments, the association said in a report prepared to announce the project. What is needed now is to connect them and to improve, to standard two-lane width, those that are now substandard.

The work will run into millions of dollars, said Darrell Jones, association president, but the O & C counties have been spending large sums on access roads, reforestation and recreational development and it is expected that available money will be even greater in coming years.

There are 18 O & C counties in Oregon—the counties in which there are timberlands taken back by the federal government from the original Oregon and California Railroad grant. The counties get 75 per cent of the earnings from this land, giving them substantial sums.

Cooperating with the counties are the Forest Service Bureau of Land Management, state Highway Commission, State Parks Advisory Board, Department of Planning and Development, State Travel Information Bureau Advisory Committee, Bureau of Indian Affairs, and some non-O & C counties.

Two big recreational projects connected in part with the proposal were listed as a ski area development near Ashland, to be reached by one of the roads in the new network, and replacement of Magic Mile chair lift at Timberline Lodge on Mt. Hood. The Ashland development is contingent on private development of the ski facilities.

Jones said the O & C association had taken the lead in the proposal and a steering committee of all interested groups would work out details.

The report prepared by the association said that the proposed road network runs near "the areas of greatest immediate promise" for development. It noted that there are a number of wilderness areas already set aside which "seem to provide adequately for those people who enjoy the wilderness type of recreation... What is urgently needed is easily accessible outdoor recreational facilities for all season for the mass of people..."

Jones said that illustrative of the development the counties have in mind is opening up Waldo Lake by a short access road. In addition to making the lake itself accessible, the road would make it feasible to develop a ski area there.
