# Interest Mounting In Art Association's Anniversary Show

Entries for the Klamath Art Association's first anniversary art and crafts show scheduled for next weekend are stacking up quickly, reports a member of the association.

Association members are celebrating the first birthday of the Klamath Art Gallery in Maple Park. The spruce building was opened to the public about this time last year. Association members worked hard for many months to collect necessary material and finances and to get the building constructed.

The show is the only one so far planned for the year when the public in the Klamath Basin will be invited to show amateur arts and crafts of all kinds.

Some of the items to be shown include drawings, paintings, designs, prints of all kinds, weavings, silk screen prints, sculpture, ceramics, jewelry and wood carvings. Generally, all pieces are of original design.

Entries are mounting so quickly, say association members, that entrants are strictly limited to one item. Otherwise, not enough room will be available to display them.

The event is a show, not a contest, so pieces will not be judged. Artists and craftsmen who live within 50 miles of Klamath Falls are invited to turn in their

entries at the gallery from 7 to 9 p.m. Tuesday or Thursday. If that is not possible, they are invited to call Mrs. Barbara Kenner, TU 4-9374, for advice.

The exhibit will be open to the public Sunday from 2 to 5 p.m. During its first year of operation, the gallery has housed 17 well-received exhibits of local and out-of-county art.

The gallery is the property of the community and the association only accepts responsibility for its continuing operation.

The association is a non-profit organization that helps promote arts and crafts in the Klamath Basin. It works entirely on membership fees, donations and sale of items at the gallery. No tax money ever is received for gallery operation or any other purpose.

The organization in 1959 received \$3,500 from the Oregon Centennial Commission to help build the gallery. A drive was started to supplement that money and donations of material, labor and money flowed in from individuals, business and industry.

The city council offered an extended lease on the small park donated to the city by Clara Moore. The offer included use of the old Moore House in the park and that building is used for art workshops and other functions.

of the area marked the opening of the gallery Feb. 27, 1960.

Much work has since been done to the new gallery and to the added "Phase I of remodeling." The Art Center Rooms there have been converted to art workrooms. A ceramics shop has been made from the washroom at the rear of the home.

Inside, walls have been insulated and painted and the ceilings lowered and covered with acoustic tile. Much of the old wiring has been replaced and lighting added. "Phase I of remodeling is complete," said an association member, "but there is more to come."

Meanwhile, the association still is receiving offers of donations and members are planning more improvement as money and material accumulate.

Some things needed are a patio area outside the gallery with walkways across the lawn areas, plumbing in the gallery, fixtures and connections in the building's restrooms, further remodeling of the Art Center, and equipment to further expand the art program to include jewelry, photography and print-making operations.

## Publisher Heads Press Meeting

EUGENE (AP)—Hugh McGilvra, publisher of the Washington County News-Times, of Forest Grove, will serve as president of next year's Oregon Press Conference.

He was elected Saturday at the closing session of this year's conference. Verne McKinney of Hillsboro was named representative to the Allen Memorial Fund Board of Trustees.

Carl Webb, executive secretary of the Oregon Newspaper Publishers' Association, discussed a new libel law bill which has been introduced in the Oregon legislature. He said the bill would place on the publisher the burden of proof that defamation of character was not intentional, that publication was made without negligence and that a retraction was made.

Webb said the bill would render the publisher liable in practically every case of libel based on negligence.

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
