

PORTLAND (AP)—Two power companies today announced plans for construction of vast transmission lines that will carry power from two new dams, Wanapum and Priest Rapids, on the Columbia River in Eastern Washington. One of the lines will be built over the Cascades.

When the dams are completed, the two companies will get more than one million kilowatts from them. To carry that power, PGE and PP&L will coordinate construction of new 230,000-volt lines.

PP&L said a 230,000-volt line carrying power from Priest Rapids into its Yakima County system will be doubled in capacity, and linked to the Wanapum project. It will be extended to west of Yakima and converge with PGE's new line from Wanapum.

The two 230,000-volt circuits will be hung on opposite sides of the steel towers carrying the lines across the mountains to the vicinity of PP&L's Yale and Swit hydroelectric projects on the Upper Lewis River. At this point they will separate again. PGE's

line will continue down the Lewis River Valley to its Portland system. The PP&L circuit will extend south and cross the Columbia River and connect with its system east of Portland," the release said.

About 85 4-H Club youngsters from Klamath County met Saturday at Altamont Junior High school for their annual officers training session.

The youngsters gathered for registration and preliminary activities at 10 a.m. and group meetings followed. When they recessed, club mem-

ers assembled to view a movie about parliamentary procedure, they heard a report from Sharon Hobson, Merrill, and Don Owens, Lamath Falls, of their trip to the recent state 4-H conference in Salem.

Delegates from Oregon met Gov. Mark Hatfield and local leaders and representatives. They were instructed on the workings of state government and toured the capitol, during a conference.

Miss Armstrong led a session in folk dancing after the program.
