NEW YORK (AP)—Small gains and losses prevailed in active stock market trading late this afternoon, although a few selected issues moved higher.

Volume for the day was estimated at 5.9 million shares compared with 5.07 million Tuesday. Trading tapered off a bit from the fast pace of the morning, when more than a million shares changed hands in each of the first two hours.

Electronics were strong with Beckman up more than 2 and Litton nearly as much. Mail order, retail issues, farm implement makers, aircraft-missile stocks, utilities, rails, oils and airlines were higher on balance. Steels were mostly lower.

Brokers noted that the Dow Jones average of 30 industrials, up 0.87 at 653.27 at 2 p.m., was meeting resistance just below its intermediate top of last June.

Zenith gained more than 4. Ford, Douglas and Eastern Air rose around a point and Consolidated Edison a bit more. Brunswick was up about 2. General Electric was down around a point and Westinghouse slightly lower.

Corporate bonds were slightly higher. U.S. governments were irregularly lower.

Mother, Son Hammered To Death

CENTRAL POINT, Ore. (AP)—The bodies of a woman and her infant son, both beaten fatally with a hammer, were found in a closet in their apartment here Wednesday night. Two men were taken into custody today for questioning, authorities said.

Mrs. Charles Theodore Holt, 32, and her son, Rodney, 2, apparently were killed the night of Feb. 12, and their bodies thrown into the open closet and covered with blankets, Police Chief Wallace Bowen said.

At nearby Medford, Dist. Atty. Allen Holmes said two men were taken into custody today for questioning. Holmes identified them as Mrs. Holt's estranged husband and Ray McGahuey, 35, of Medford. Holt, 43, has worked until recently as a card dealer in Reno, Nev., police said.

The bodies were discovered by Frank Saxbury, 23, a relative of the apartment house owner, who had been doing maintenance work and was moving into the apartment adjoining Mrs. Holt's.

Police said Saxbury was concerned because he had not seen the woman for days, and had seen no lights in her apartment. Getting no answer to his knocking, he pushed open the apartment door, partially blocked by furniture, and peeked inside. He saw a body and ran to call police.

Police Chief Bowen said that he and deputies found the body of Mrs. Holt on the floor of the closet, covered with blankets. On top of her body was an apple box, covered with blankets, containing the body of her son. The bloody claw hammer was found nearby.

Bowen said it appeared this is what had happened: The killer battered Mrs. Holt and the boy on the head with the hammer and then piled the bodies in the closet. Following that, the slayer pushed a table and television set against the front door. The killer apparently cut a window screen, climbed out onto a flat roof and then walked down an outside stairway.

Mrs. Holt and her son moved here last fall from Medford. She worked in the laundry room at a cleaning firm.

Klamath Falls Flyer Uninjured In Crackup

A Klamath Falls realtor, Deane Sacher, walked away from his light plane, shaken but uninjured Wednesday afternoon, after the plane flipped on landing at the Alturas airfield.

Sacher said he was making a landing in a 25-30 knot crosswind from the left. His left front wheel touched down first and a gust of wind caught the plane, putting it back into the air. The plane returned to earth and flipped in soft dirt at the side of the runway.

At the time of the incident, Sacher was alone on a cross country flight, which is required for a private pilot's license. He has 70 hours of flying time.

The plane was a twin-engine Cessna 182 "Skylane." Sacher estimated damage to the wing, tail assembly and propeller at between \$3,000 and \$4,000.

Les Liston of Liston Aircraft, upon hearing of the incident, flew

to Alturas to pick up Sacher. The realtor was back in his office late Wednesday afternoon.

"I wasn't too afraid at the time of the accident," Sacher said, "but I'm getting more chicken by the minute."
