PTA Meeting Honors Founders

Twenty two years ago on Feb. 10, 1939, the very first Klamath Council of Parents and Teachers Founders Day meeting was held at Mills School. The council observed Founders Day at Mills School again this year Tuesday, Feb. 7. The first PTA movement in Klamath County was started with Mrs. Burt Hawkins as president at Henley in 1915. Mrs. Hawkins was also the first president of a city school unit, when the Mills PTA was organized in 1920. The first Klamath Council PTA was organized under the direction of Mrs. L. V. Brewer in the year 1929.

Mrs. Orson Stearns presented the program honoring past presidents and the founders of the PTA movement. Mrs. Burt Hawkins shared many experiences of the past in an interesting resume; Mrs. Harry Goeller, retired school teacher, was unable to be present due to illness.

James Scott, principal of Mills School, spoke on some of the highlights of education today and pointed out that students today are receiving a far better education than those in the past and that they are better prepared for the changes to come than were their parents.

Penny Preston and Sara McLin, KUHS students and members of the Future Teachers of America Club, told the council members about the PTA and of their own aspirations as future teachers. They were each presented with a subscription to the National Parent Teacher magazine.

The Mills School Girls Ensemble, under the direction of Mrs. Robert Craig, presented three delightful selections.

Past presidents of the council honored at the meeting were Mrs. John Putnam, 1937-39; Mrs. Art Moore, 1935-37; Mrs. Orville Ferrell, 1934-35; Mrs. Frank Peyton, 1943-45; Mrs. B. C. Johnston, 1940-41; Mrs. Robert Ross, 1935-36.

Marilyn Dunn, council president, announced the organization of a new PTA unit, that of Falcon Heights School, bringing the Klamath County unit membership in the Oregon Congress of Parents and Teachers to 15. Officers for the new PTA are Charles Kelly, president, Leon Colias, vice president; Barbara Simon, secretary, and Corinne Hunt, treasurer. Erwin Brower is principal of the school.

The state convention of the Oregon Congress of Parents and Teachers will be held in Astoria April 24, 25 and 26. Many Klamath delegates are expected to attend as well as the PTA Melody

Mothers. The national convention will be held in Oregon next year (May 1961) in Portland.

The nominating committee of the National Congress has invited Mrs. Jennelle Moorehead to be on its slate for the 1961 election as a nominee for first vice president of the National Congress of Parents and Teachers. Mrs. Moorehead served as president of OCEPT in 1959-53, and is credited with the organization of the Alaska Congress of PTA. She has been a professor at the University of Oregon since 1946. One of our honors Mrs. Moorehead has received was the appointment by Secretary of State John Foster Dulles in 1955 to serve as a member of the United States Commission for UNESCO. She was reappointed for a second term in 1957.

Weather permitting, the council members expect to journey to Chiloquin March 7 for their next meeting to be held at the elementary school at 1:30 p.m. The Chiloquin PTA will host the group. Bert Thomas will show slides of early day Linkville and Klamath Falls. Business will include nomination of officers.
