

Weed District Seeking To Obtain Federal Aid

WEED—During regular board meeting of the Weed Sanitary District Tuesday, Feb. 14, William Krum, the president, was authorized to sign an application for a Federal Loan grant to be submitted to the Water Pollution Board at Santa Rosa. If the application is granted the government will furnish 30 per cent of the plant construction costs providing the district has passed the bond issue and has 70 per cent of the costs available. The grant depends upon the amount allowed each state by the federal government.

Krum stated that the money provided by the federal grant is not required to be repaid by the district.
