Rev. Jones Takes Over Church Here

The Rev. Mack P. Jones, pastor of First Southern Baptist Church, Eugene, for four years, has answered the call to the pastorate of First Baptist, Klamath Falls. He replaces Dr. E. M. Causey who left last May to pastor a church in Portland.

The Rev. Jones is a native of Clara, Miss. He graduated from Mississippi College in Clinton with a BA degree in 1951 and from the New Orleans Theological Seminary in 1955 to receive a bachelor of divinity degree. For six years he pastored churches in Alabama and Mississippi before coming to the Northwest.

Both he and Mrs. Jones were active in many interests in Eugene. The Reverend Jones led in completion of the church auditorium and in the establishment of two new congregations, led in the establishment and direction of a Baptist Student Union on the University of Oregon campus and was active in the denominational life of the Baptist General Convention of Oregon and Washington.

Mrs. Jones, a native of Hattiesburg, Miss., is a graduate of Mississippi Southern College of her native city, finishing with a

BA in music, majoring in voice and minoring in piano. She worked toward a master of religious education at the New Orleans Baptist Theological Seminary and did some work toward a master of music degree at the University of Oregon in 1958.

She has been elected to Who's Who in American Colleges and Universities, has sung the contralto solos in Handel's "Messiah," and was graduated with honors. While in Eugene Mrs. Jones directed a five-voice graded music program in the church pastored by her husband and directed a 40-voice Cascade Baptist

Choir. She also sang for one year with the Eugene Women's Choral Club.

Salvation Army Reports Family Aid Increasing

Major M. Lewis Kendall, commander Salvation Army, and his assistants, are faced with an increasing problem of moving families who seek aid from the army. Family assistance given during January including local help increased 100 per cent over the same period last year.

Thirty local families including 137 individuals were given clothing during January.

Total cost of aid in all areas during the month was \$398.70.

The number of persons seeking counsel and advice is also on the increase. The Home League has a continuous project of preparing layettes for destitute families with new babies and a home making program for families in this area in the lower income bracket is being developed. Adults in this group are given an opportunity at SA headquarters to learn improved planning in the home.
