

Dial A Book

The library of the Delft Institute of Technology of the Netherlands has introduced an innovation that is expected to ease the librarian's lot, and that of the borrower as well. It is based on the dial system of the telephone. When the borrower has consulted the catalogue and made his selection, he dials a seven-digit number with which the book is identified. Immediately, lights flash on in the stacks, directing the attendant to the aisle, bookcase and shelf, and finally to the place of the requested book on that shelf. All he has to do is to place the work on the conveyor belt that lands in the lending room.

Thus far, the Delft library is the world's first to be so equipped. But expect the system to spread; it is a simple way of saving time and money — two things all libraries are eternally short of.

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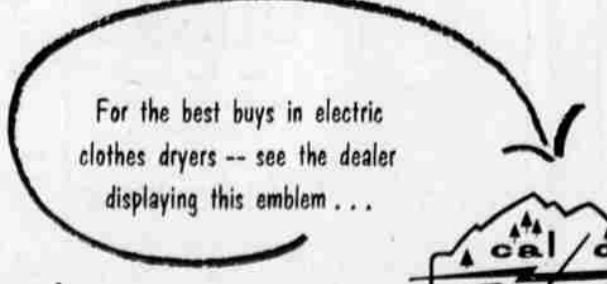
