Spraying Aid To Grazing

FORT ROCK—Chemical spraying of sage brush to release grass forage was of major significance on the agenda of the annual meeting of the Fort Rock Grazing Association Monday.

Discussing results of previous spray jobs on public land in this district, Lew Harris of Lakeview, district range manager, Bureau of Land Management, pointed out that some excellent kills had been obtained. On the Floyd Branch allotment grazing capacity has been doubled, he said.

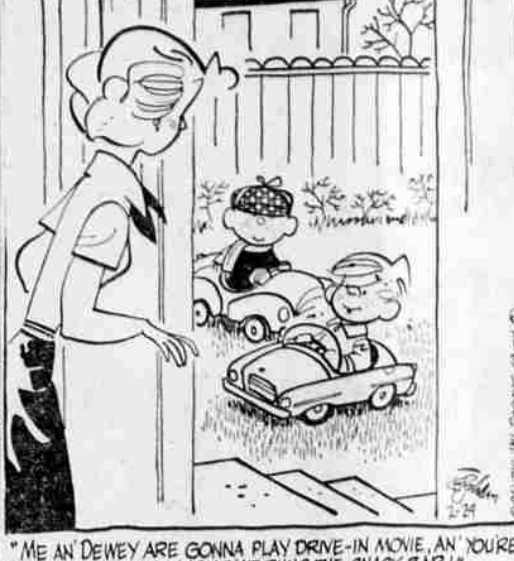
Plans for additional spraying are being prepared, according to Don Getty of the Lakeview BLM staff, but are subject to the availability of appropriations. Private land owners are welcome to get in on BLM aerial spray work at cost, Getty said, adding that it is usually substantially less than small individual contracts.

Compensation Bill Rapped

SALEM (AP)—Costs to employers and bureaucracy both would increase under the proposed three-way industrial accident compensation bill, former Gov. Charles A. Sprague said Thursday.

Sprague identified himself as president of the Statesman-Journal Publishing Co., which he described as a small business—and said he was speaking only for himself.

The three-way proposal would permit employers to insure under the industrial accident act with the state, private insurance companies or insure themselves.

The state already has three-way insurance, Sprague said, because employers who don't like the state

University Of Oregon Still Seeking President

SALEM (AP)—Two leading candidates for president of the University of Oregon were discussed by members of the state Board of Higher Education Thursday night but no decision was reached.

Six of the nine board members huddled in the room of Chancellor John R. Richards at the Marion Hotel for more than 2 1/2 hours without reporting any conclusions.

Earlier in the day Henry F. Cabell, board president, said, "Things are coming to a head now and just have to be decided."

"As of this moment there are two leading candidates, Arthur Flemming and Fred Harrington," Cabell said. "No decision has been made between them. It could be decided at any time."

Board members last December interviewed Flemming, secretary of Health, Education and Welfare under President Eisenhower and former president of Ohio Wesleyan.

Board members Tuesday interviewed Harrington, vice president of academic affairs at the University of Wisconsin.

South Koreans Approve Pact

SEOUL, Korea (AP)—The Foreign Affairs Committee of the South Korean Lower House today unanimously approved the controversial new U.S.-Korean aid agreement. The committee made no reservations.

It appeared certain the agreement would win House consent with little opposition.

The agreement gives the United States the right to "continuous observation and review" of how its aid programs are administered here. It requires South Korea to furnish "full and complete information" American aid funds make up more than half the country's national budget.

Foreign Capital Leaving Africa

STELLENBOSCH, South Africa (AP)—A leading gold and diamond magnate warned Thursday night that foreign capital is still fleeing white-ruled South Africa through fear and moral indignation.

Harry Oppenheimer, chairman of the big Anglo-American Corp., said many people abroad hate South Africa's racial segregation policies and this also helped pull out at least 100 million pounds (\$280 million) of investment capital during 1960.

Queen Visits Historic Pier

BOMBAY (AP)—Queen Elizabeth II today visited a spot best known to Indians as the pier from which the last British troops left the country.

To the British it is the place where her grandfather, King George V, landed in India during his 1911 visit.

A massive "Gateway of India" archway, slightly smaller than the Arch of Triumph in Paris, still commemorates the landing of King George.

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
