LA Manager May Platoon '61 Dodgers

VERO BEACH, Fla. (UPI) — Dodger manager Walter Alston, who has more platoon material than a Marine drill sergeant, indicated today he may lean more toward a set lineup this year, although he hasn't the vaguest idea what it will be.

"We'll platoon more against individual pitchers and take into consideration different parks and who's hot rather than use a strict lineup of right-handers against left-handed pitching and vice versa," Alston said.

"Right now, I couldn't begin to make a lineup. The three outfielders I leave out today might be the ones I would want three weeks from now. But this is a pleasant problem and I'm not concerned in the least."

On a straight platoon basis, Alston could start an all right-handed lineup consisting of outfielders Tommy Davis, Frank Howard and Don Demter, Charlie Smith or Jim Gilliam at third, Maury Wills at short, Charlie Neal at second, Gil Hodges at first and Norm Sherry or Doug Camilli behind the plate.

Alston also could call on a lineup in which Neal would be the lone right-handed hitter. This would include an outfield of Wally Moon, Willie Davis and Duke Snider or Ron Fairly, an infield of Gilliam, Wills, Neal, and Norm Larker and John Roseboro catching. Wills and Gilliam are switch-hitters.

The Dodgers also may have the league's most versatile team in the field. Howard will be given a thorough trial at first base, although Larker's .323 average was second to league leader Dick Groat. Tommy Davis is listed as a third baseman for all camp games.

To add to Alston's "pleasant problem," he must prune a variety roster of 37 plus a dozen promising minor league youngsters to the opening day limit of 28.

Coach Leo Durocher said he hasn't seen so many great prospects in one training camp since 1946 when Hodges and Snider were among the minor league hopefuls.

Star's Shots Don't Faze Golf World

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BATON ROUGE, La. (AP) — Arnold Palmer seems to have arrived at the point where some of his miracle shots just don't faze the golf world anymore—not even the shot that pulled him into a tie with Jackie Burke Jr. going into the second round of the \$20,000 Baton Rouge Open.

Palmer, golf's man of the year in 1960 who now lists Miami, Fla., as his playing base, came in with a soggy 65 among the late finishers Friday to tie Burke for the 18-hole lead.

An all-day rain, slippery footing and even the threat of tornadoes couldn't harness Palmer, who stole the thunder from the early-finishing Burke.

Palmer had six birdies and one bogey—the miscue came on the first hole—and waited until the final hole to set the meager gallery chattering.

With his stance cramped by the side of the ditch and the pin 90 feet away, Palmer sailed his wedge to within six feet of the flag and the following putt was merely the icing.

Hi-Milers Slate Event

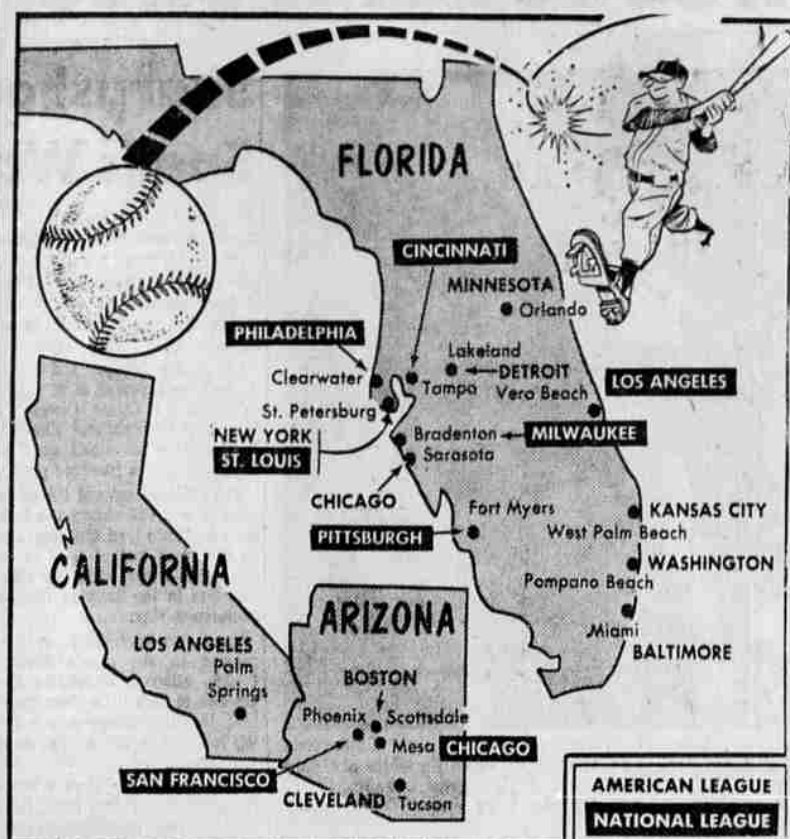
The Hi-Milers, an Oregon Technical Institute car club, will sponsor a hare-and-bound run next Saturday afternoon for its first major event of the year.

General Manager Frank Lane of the Kansas City A's had a new feud going today and he's going to have to do some fast thinking to get in the last word.

He is on the outs with Ray Herbert, the A's second-best pitcher last season.

Earlier last week, Lane fumed that he had been insulted by Herbert in a letter expressing dissatisfaction with his contract. Herbert arrived Friday in the A's West Palm Beach, Fla., camp and expressed wide-eyed surprise that Lane should be sore at him.

"In about the second or third letter he sent me, he said I could do one of three things," Herbert explained blandly. "He said I could sign my contract, hang it on the wall or tear it up."

"So," he continued with a straight face, "I tore it up and sent it back to him. That's when he got mad."

Herbert is the only member of the club unsigned. Outfielder Al Pilarcik came to terms Friday. He said he will report Monday. Other developments Friday reduced the unsigned ranks of the Milwaukee Braves, San Francisco Giants and Detroit Tigers.

CORVALLIS (AP) — The Oregon State College basketball team upset nationally ranked Southern California 62-58 Friday night.

Six-foot-10 Karl Anderson sparked a rally in the final two minutes that gave Oregon State its victory. The score was tied at 53-53 with 1 minute, 40 seconds remaining. Then Anderson sank a field goal. He also scored with three free throws in the closing minutes.

Anderson and John Rudometkin, an all America candidate from USC, were tied for scoring honors with 20 points each.

Rudometkin's scoring was held down by the checking of Bob Jacobson. The Southern Cal ace didn't score a field goal in the second half until eight minutes had gone.

The lead shifted through the first half and at one point Oregon State was out in front 21-12. But by halftime, the margin was cut to 29-23.

OSC coach Slats Gill benched two of his top scorers — Terry Baker and Jim Woodland. They were replaced by Bill Wold and Gary Rossi.

Oregon State sank 42 per cent of its field goal attempts to 36 per cent for the losers.

OSC now has a 14-9 season record. Southern Cal has won 16 of 21 games.

Angels Open Camp Site On Desert

PALM SPRINGS, Calif. (UPI) — Some 40 members of the Los Angeles Angels began formal spring training Saturday in what manager Bill Rigney believes is "the finest spring training park I've ever seen."

The team Friday checked out uniforms and staged an informal drill under blue skies and in 74-degree weather. It was the first time a major league baseball club has ever trained in this desert resort city.

Old pros Ted Kluszewski, Bob Cerv and Eddie Yost led a lively drill under the watchful eye of Rigney and coaches Red Kress, Bob Elliott and Marv Grissom.

Kluszewski blasted the ball 370 feet over the right field screen in his first trip to the plate. Cerv later drilled two in a row over the left field fence.

Meanwhile, second baseman Ken Aspromonte signed his 1961 player contract for an estimated \$14,000 after a meeting with Angels general manager Fred Haney.

Utility Man, Pitcher Still SF Holdouts

PHOENIX, Ariz. (UPI) — Only pitcher Juan Marichal and utility man Jim Marshall had failed to come to terms today with the San Francisco Giants.

The National League club brought hurlers Jack Sanford and Billy Loes into the corral Friday with each man taking a cut.

Sanford, who had a 12-14 record last year and led the loop with six shutouts, had his salary sawed down to an estimated \$22,250. Loes, 3-2 last year and a disappointment as a late inning stopper, signed up for \$20,000.

Marichal posted a 6-2 record last season after breaking into the majors July 19 with a one-hitter against the Philadelphia Phillies. He was reported to be en route to training camp from his home in the Dominican Republic.

Marshall batted .237 last year, mainly in pinch-hitting spots.

Willie Mays highlighted Friday's workout by blasting two batting practice pitches over the left field fence. It marked the first time that baseball's highest priced player had held a club since the team came back from last fall's tour through Japan.

Three Clubs Gain Berths In Tourney

Klamath Falls, the No. 1 team in the Associated Press poll, was beaten by unranked Crater of Central Point 68-64 and three more teams won berths in the state A-1 tournament in Friday night Oregon high school basketball action.

The three new tourney entries are Roseburg, Corvallis and South Salem.

Corvallis and South Salem are tied for first place in the Valley League. Corvallis beat Lebanon 46-40 while South Salem downed Albany 51-43.

Roseburg got in with a 59-51 triumph over Springfield.

Marshall, in second place behind Roseburg in the Midwestern League, took Cottage Grove 64-49.

Medford, No. 7, disposed of Ashland, 79-40.

Unranked St. Helens assured itself of at least a tie for second place in the Tualatin-Yamhill Valley League as it edged Dallas, 55-52.

Eight had won places earlier. They are Klamath Falls, Bend, La Grande, Scappoose, Tillamook and three Portland teams — Grant, Wilson and Central Catholic.

Klamath Falls went to Central Point needing only one victory to clinch its conference title. But Crater, entering the game with a 3-10 conference record to Klamath's 12-0, slowed up the high-scoring league leaders with a tight zone.

There were no other major upsets on the heavy schedule.

Unranked Grant, No. 3 in the AP poll, made sure of at least a tie for the Portland city league title by downing Clatskanie, 55-39.

Fourth-ranked Wilson, second in the league, was idle.

Central Catholic, No. 5 in the poll, nailed down the Portland Metropolitan League championship with a 57-52 triumph over Douglas of Portland boosted its second position in the league, ahead of Beaverton with a 65-26 rout of Centennial of Gresham.
