



THE REV. HARRY M. STRACHAN is pastor of Klamath Temple, 1007 Pine Street, which had its beginning in the summer of 1925 when services were held in an excavation for a building at the corner of Eighth and Klamath. A wooden structure followed and the building was dedicated in 1926 with Dr. B. C. Miller of Ashland the first pastor. Fire destroyed the partially completed permanent building and the present attractive building was dedicated in 1934. A new Sunday School annex has been added, remodeling completed, a new heating system installed and the mortgage has been burned. The church will soon own its own parsonage.



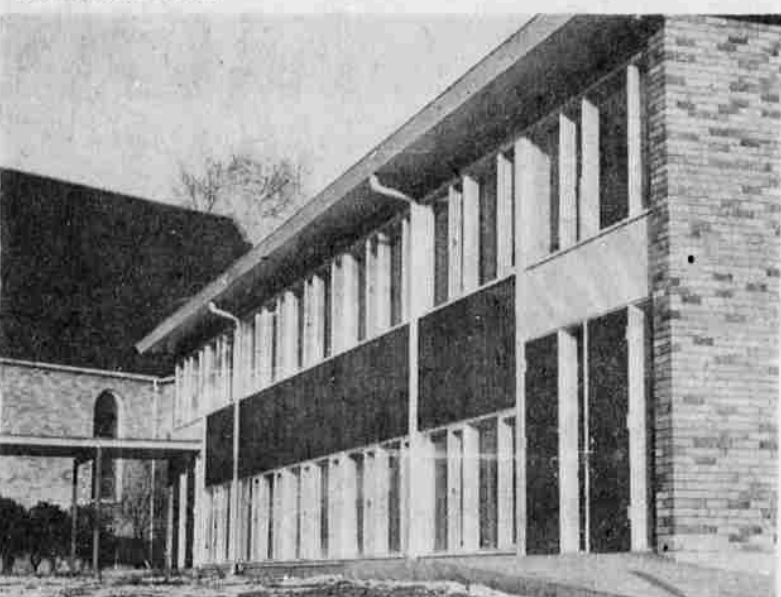
GROWTH in membership of the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter Day Saints which now includes two wards in Klamath Falls made necessary the building of a new addition to the original church building which was dedicated in 1947. The new wing, added to the east, was built during the years that Charles W. Clark was bishop of the Second Ward. It contains a Junior Sunday School chapel, nine classrooms and Relief Society room. Heat is provided by a hot water wall. Cost of the new wing including property was \$90,000. David J. Davis is bishop of the First Ward, George Shaffer Jr., bishop of the Second Ward.



PASTOR of the Church of the Nazarene, the Rev. Lawrence T. Holman, and members of the congregation have as goal before too many years, a site for a new church. The present structure at 620 Martin Street, completed in the late 1930s, has limited parking facilities. A congregation of approximately 100 and a Sunday School attendance of 108 is reported by the Reverend Holman who came to accept the pastorate last July from Albuquerque, N.M.



THE KLAMATH UNITARIAN FELLOWSHIP meets in this meeting house on the Lakeview Highway. The building has been a landmark for many years. Acquisition of a lease on this building was a goal for the membership, which since 1957 had met in the Klamath Art Center in the Mount View housing project, and in the social hall of the Congregational Church.



THE EDUCATIONAL WING addition of Klamath Lutheran Church was made necessary by a constantly growing church membership. Today, there are 623 adult and junior communicants and 505 children affiliated with the church, making a total of 1,128. The new two-story wing, completed at a cost of \$71,649, provides an additional 21 Sunday School rooms, two large assembly rooms, rest rooms and kitchenette on the second floor. A covered walkway from the wing to the original sanctuary is a convenience.

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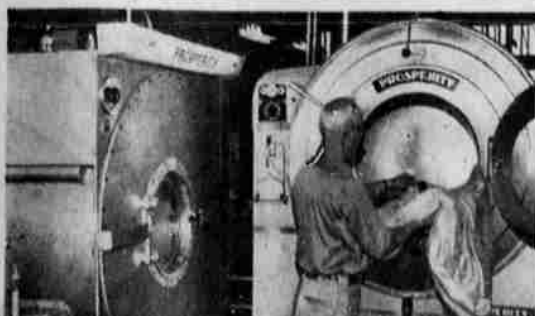
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
