

County Has Two Active National Guard Units

Because Klamath County has supplied 75 per cent of the money and the state government a quarter of it. The city and county donated the property jointly. It was dedicated in March, 1957. Previous to that, Batteries B and C, Klamath Falls, of the Second Gun Battalion, headquartered in Ashland, 249th Artillery, with headquarters in Portland, used the old armory, then a portion of a hangar and administration building at the municipal airport.

The National Guard units have been associated for a long time with artillery. Before World War II the men were assigned to coastal artillery and after the war first to field artillery and finally to antiaircraft duty.

Now, each battery has three radar-operated 75 millimeter "Sky-sweeper" guns and a variety of small arms, vehicles and other equipment.

The units have a total of 120 enlisted men and each has four officers.

Commanding officer of Battery B is Capt. Valentine W. Costanzo. His executive officer is 1st Lt. Leonard Springer and his gunnery officers, 1st Lt. Kenneth Wandell and 1st Lt. Phil Groves.

Battery C's commander is 1st Lt. J. Dean Lowell. Executive officer is 1st Lt. Richard Gilchrist and gunnery officers are 1st Lt. Wilfred Dunster and 2nd Lt. Norman Fitzgerald.

The men must drill a minimum of two hours 48 times per year. Battery B meets each Tuesday night and Battery C each Monday night. The batteries often have all-day or half-day drills on Sunday, too.

Each summer, the men spend two weeks on active duty at an Army post.

Last year, during summer training sessions when the men were able to shoot live ammunition at target drone planes, Battery B received superior rating—the best—and Battery C, excellent rating—next best.

Though the complex Skysweepers are fantastic weapons, their usefulness is waning, and guardsmen expect that someday local units will be armed with rockets.

Five full-time employees maintain the armory and its equipment. They are Sgt. Kenneth D. Hearsh, Army supply technician

for Battery B; Sgt. John R. Child, radar mechanic; Specialist Dick Ders, supply technician for Battery C; Sgt. LeRoy Lofdash, radar mechanic; and James Gould, vehicle mechanic.

Engineer Says Bridge Work Half Completed

The Hope Street Bridge, a major county road project, is more than half completed, according to County Engineer Jack Kalinoski.

The bridge and improvements on Hope Street will make that street a main suburban arterial connecting Bristol Street with South Sixth Street. Workmen were preparing to pour cement Thursday afternoon on the bridge project.

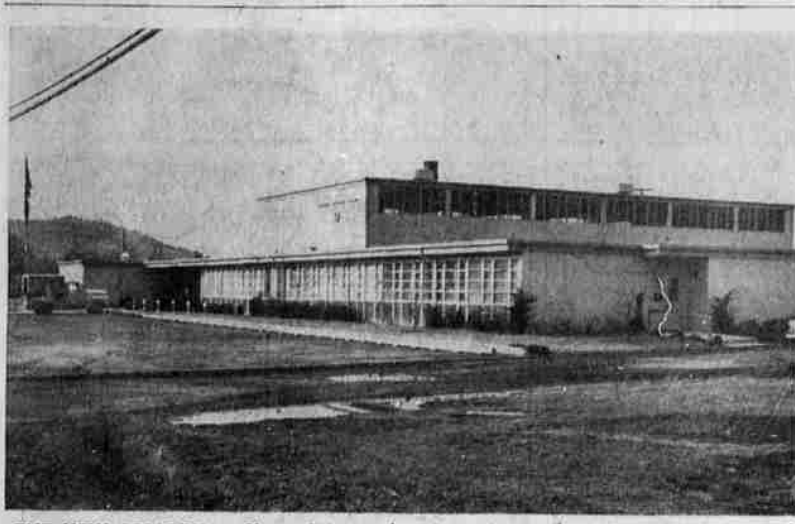
A sixth tenth-mile section of Hope Street has been graded and rock surfaced in preparation for paving this summer. To complete the Hope Street project, two blocks of Ward Street were renamed so that the entire thoroughfare will be Hope Street. The entire project cost \$53,000.

Another county road project is underway. Kalinoski is negotiating with Weyerhaeuser Company for nine miles of right-of-way for the Clover Creek Road. Eleven miles of the road, which will connect Keno and the Dead Indian Road, are scheduled to be paved this year.

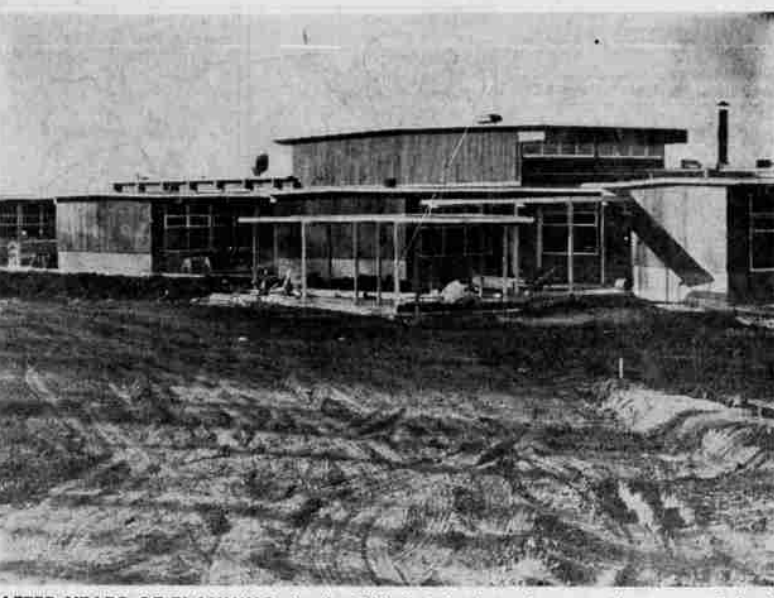
The Forest Service will build 10 more miles of the new road.

The Bureau of Land Management has let bids for a road parallel to the Clover Creek Road. The roads will be from two to six miles apart and are designed to reach separate timber areas.

When the BLM's Keno Road is completed, recreational development of the east shores of Howard Prairie Reservoir will be possible.

Order Of Elks Established As Antlers Back In 1909



THIS IMPOSING STRUCTURE is the home of Klamath Falls Lodge, No. 1247 BPOE, at 305 Main Street. This building with classic lines was first occupied in 1915. Tentative plans have been announced by the building committee for complete remodeling of the present lodge and the building of a new addition on the Main Street side.

When members of the Antlers Club in Klamath Falls, back in 1909, sought to organize an Elks Lodge in the city, they probably little thought of the growth that the lodge would make before it celebrated its half century birthday this year.

Lodge law required that a city must have a population of 5,000 to have an Elks Lodge. The Antlers decided to undertake a program of convincing the grand lodge that Klamath Falls should have an Elks Lodge and the Antlers won.

The federal census for 1910 gave Klamath Falls a population of 2,758. The Elks conducted their own census in 1911, listing more than 5,000 and there were none who bothered to check the list. It was rumored by some that some of the same names could be found on the tombstones in Linkville Cemetery, said one lodge historian, Malcolm Epley, past exalted ruler, executive editor of the Press-Telegram of Long Beach. People were too busy getting the new lodge set up to be curious.

By stage and a train trip through California over the old Shasta Line of the Southern Pacific, the head of the grand lodge traveled to Klamath Falls for the charter meeting.

The lodge grew rapidly and by 1915 the membership moved from the Hall Hotel Building on Fourth to its present location in the white-columned brick building on Main Street.

The first exalted ruler was E. B. Hall, now a trustee and honored each year as a charter member.

Many community activities have been undertaken by the Elks Lodge in the intervening years, its contributions to the public welfare often going unheralded.

Nine years after the lodge was instituted the city's population was 4,801 and the census takers could find not one man or woman more. With its record of community service, the justification of its starting back in 1911 has never been questioned.

Leaders in civic, business and professional life are numbered among its members, now totaling nearly 2,000.

J. C. Lemire, owner of the Acme Concrete Company, is exalted ruler of the democratic organization where men from all walks of life rub shoulders in the fraternal spirit.

Mooseheart, Moosehaven Supported By Local Moose Lodge

Members of Klamath Falls Moose Lodge, like those of many of the community organizations, devote much of their lodge efforts toward projects benefiting youngsters.

The project of which lodge members are most proud is Mooseheart, a home near Chicago for children of deceased lodge members, supported by donations from lodges across the country.

Nationally, the lodge also sponsors Moosehaven, a retirement home for senior lodge members in Florida.

Each year, lodge members pick up discarded Christmas trees around the city and destroy them. Contributions so received are used to assist local youth organizations.

And, annually, lodge members sponsor a program called "operating Santa Claus." They collect candy and toys and distribute them to children who otherwise might not receive such gifts.

Last season, Moose members collected and distributed about 380 pieces.

The lodge, too, sponsors annually a Halloween dance, attended this year by about 600 youngsters.

Officers are Orval Musgrave, governor; Mel Robinson, past governor; Clyde Hooper, secretary; Mel Douglas, junior governor; and Webb Hescok, prelate.

The lodge has a strong auxiliary and the women meet each Tuesday at 8 p.m. Men of the lodge meet Thursdays at the same time.

Flourishing Eagles Lodge Has Grown To 630 Members



EAGLES HALL provides a place of relaxation and recreation for about 630 men and 200 women who are members of Fraternal Order of Eagles or its auxiliary.

The flourishing Fraternal Order of Eagles lodges in Klamath Falls has grown from about 100 members when it was instituted in 1926 to about 630 members today. Its auxiliary has about 200 members, in addition.

The lodge building at 835 Walnut Avenue is open every day to both men and women. Inside are an assortment of facilities for fun and relaxation and for use of lodge members and their guests.

The lodge sponsors dances three times a week with live music. But the organization's purpose is not just to promote brotherhood and recreation. Members each year donate time and money to a number of benevolent projects.

Last year, the Eagles instituted a hearing aid program and they purchase about two hearing aids each year as gifts to children of the community who need them and can't afford them.

Eagles also donate substantial amounts to the Max Baer Heart Fund and to the Muscular Dystrophy foundation.

The lodge recently acquired property adjacent to the building that will be converted during the next few years into a parking lot. The building has been considerably remodeled during the past few years, too.

Lodge officers are H. J. Stevens, president; Vince Van Uden, vice president; O. V. Baker, chaplain; H. H. Slaughter, junior past president; R. E. (Bud) Mueller, conductor; Leo Woods, secretary; Frenchy St. John, treasurer; Nick Burk, Charles Samuelson and Roy Laird, directors; William Paul, inside guard, and A. E. Shulmire, outside guard.

The men meet each Friday and the women each second and fourth Friday, both at 8 p.m.
