

Park, Youth Activity Is Goal Of Kiwanians

When former Klamath Falls Kiwanis Club president Gene Favell was asked "What do Kiwanians plan for the future," he said: "We hope to continue and expand our park, youth and citizenship program." That, in a nutshell, is what local Kiwanians have been doing and in some respects are obligated to do in the future.

For instance, Kiwanis Park, on the Hot Springs side of Kit Carson Way, is not complete and Kiwanians feel obligated to finish it.

The park site was purchased with a 10-year development plan in mind. So far, Kiwanians have installed a temporary water system and tennis courts. They must replace the waterworks with permanent fixtures, and landscape the property before the job is considered complete.

Since the club advocates a "pay as you go" system of finance, the park is not scheduled for completion for about five years.

Another Kiwanis contribution to the community is Mills-Kiwanis Park in the Mills Addition.

Kiwanians are most attentive to their youth program, but they are most proud of their organizational accomplishment last year. The club, with Favell at the helm, sponsored formation of a Key Club for teen-age youths at Klamath Union High School and a Circle K Club for college men at Oregon Technical Institute. At the same time, they sponsored formation of Linkville Kiwanis Club, another chapter in Klamath Falls.

The three received charters from the national organization together during unprecedented ceremonies here and the Klamath Falls Kiwanis has received national recognition as a result. The new Kiwanis chapter, only a few months old, is the third largest in Division 13-A, including 11 clubs in Southern Oregon. Medford's club is second and the Klamath Falls Kiwanis first in size.

Kiwanians recently instituted a Kiwanis Foundation of Klamath Falls, Incorporated, and interest accrued from philanthropic donations and other contributions to the fund is spent for Kiwanis youth projects.

The club sponsors Little League Baseball, helps youngsters go to summer camp, sponsors an essay contest at Klamath Union High School and a youth awards banquet to honor an "all-around boy and girl" from each high school in the Klamath Basin, including Butte Valley and Tulelake high schools, and honors local students during club meetings for outstanding personal achievement.

Club members plan to start a new honors program this year. If the plan is launched, each month a boy or girl will be acclaimed for outstanding service to a church.

Each September Kiwanians in cooperation with the Air Force sponsor a children's tour of Kingsley Field.

Locally, too, Kiwanians are active in the national Kiwanis "CQ" (Citizenship Quotient) program, in which club members attempt to make youth and adults aware of civic responsibility.

Rotary Club Gives Boost To Youths

Klamath Falls Rotary Club will aim in the future toward developing more and worthwhile projects benefiting youth, says Chuck Bailey, club president.

The Youth Committee is working toward that aim right now, he says.

Locally, Rotarians put most of their blue chips on youth. Their big project is sponsorship of the annual fall 4-H Club-Future Farmers of America Fair and Livestock Show at the Klamath County Fairgrounds.

Rotarians spent about \$2,000 to make arrangements for the show and to host more than 2,000 4-H and FFA youngsters, their parents and guests during a barbecue banquet at the fairgrounds last August.

The club receives no financial return from the project. Youngsters have a chance to sell animals they have cultured to local merchants and others interested at premium prices.

Rotarians here also sponsor a youth's trip to Boys' State at Salem. They arrange a dance during the Christmas season for vacationing college students.

They donate a substantial sum annually to the city library for purchase of children's library books. They host the presidents of the Klamath Union High School and Oregon Technical Institute student bodies and their guests during regular luncheon meetings each Friday.

Since Rotary's main international aim is to promote friendship among nations, local Rotarians donate to the Rotary International Fellowship fund that helps finance students' schooling abroad.

The club also participates in a local educational program with an international flavor. For instance, a medical missionary from Burns, Ore., who was ordered out of the Congo during the recent insurrection, has been invited to speak during a meeting in March.

Locally, too, the club is attempting to increase and strengthen its already considerable membership of about 130 men. Membership is varied and a considerable number of members are young men.
