Progress Through Land Development

Tulana farms was organized as a partnership in 1936 for the purpose of farming U. S. Bureau of Reclamation leased land at Tulelake in Northern California. Participating partners were Dave and Dan Liskey, now deceased, and Ben and Dick Henzel.

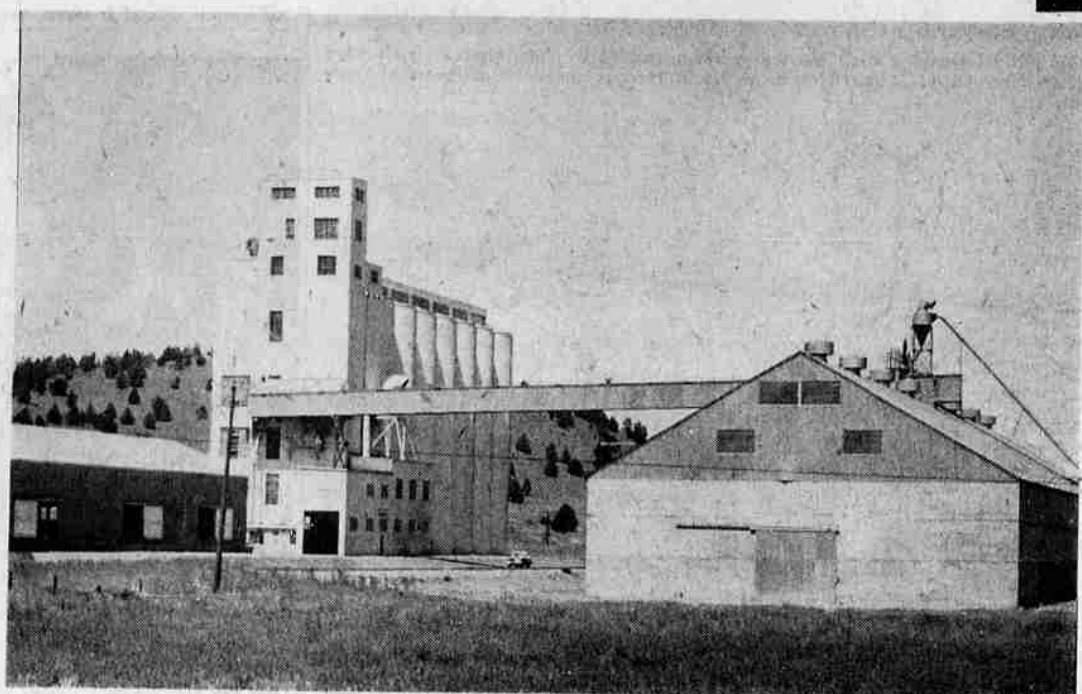
As time progressed it became necessary to change from a lease operation to private ownership in order to expand with the growing Basin. A sizeable purchase was the undeveloped marsh lands just north of the California- Oregon border, and being lake bed, it was necessary to construct drainage and irrigation facilities. In the natural course of progress, adequate ranch buildings were constructed, and later, a modern concrete elevator.

In 1948 a greater expansion took place with the purchase of the Williamson River property.

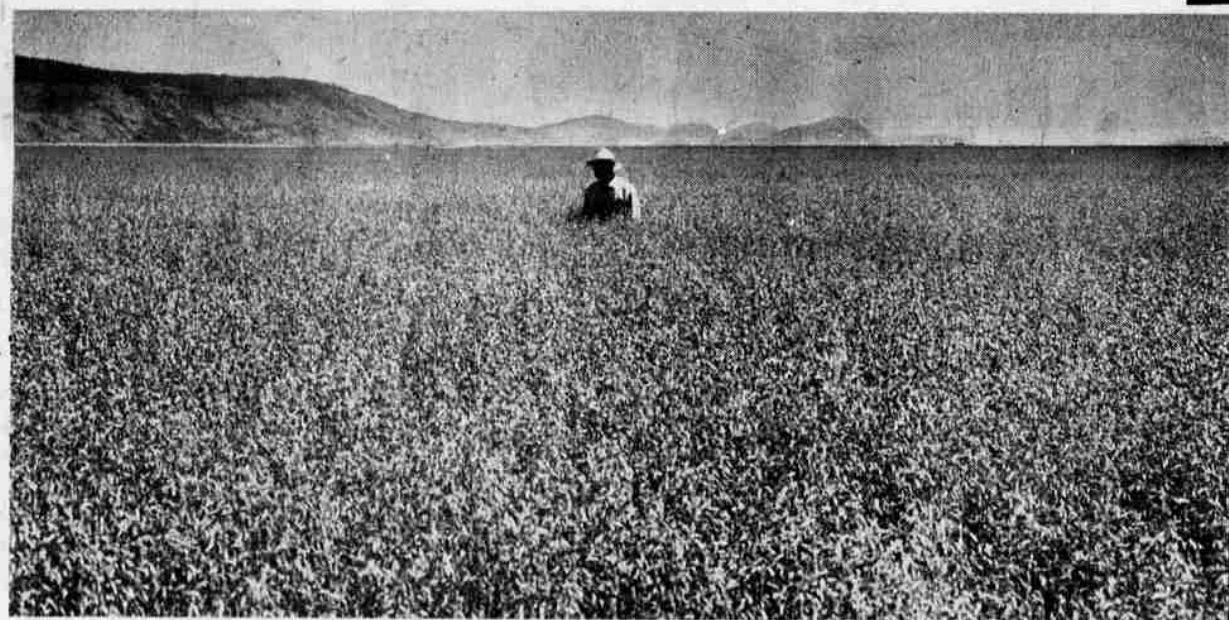
Tulana farms with over 18,000 acres in diversified farming plays an important part in the economic growth of the great Klamath Basin.



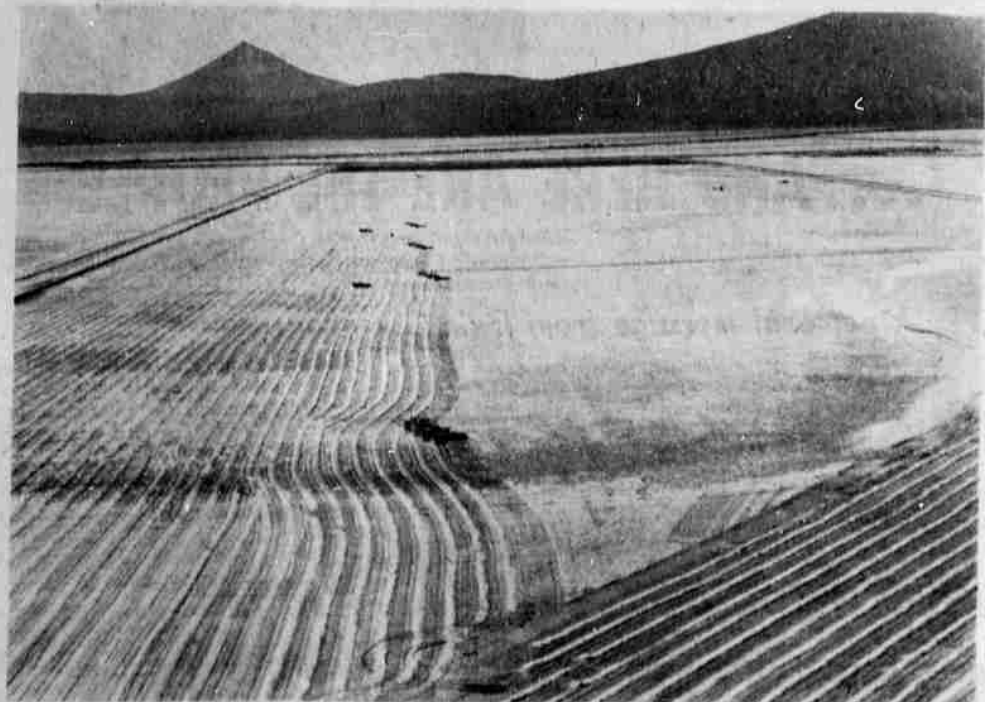
A typical picture of the undeveloped marsh lands before reclaiming. Many sites like these now boast a yearly crop of cattle, alfalfa or grain.



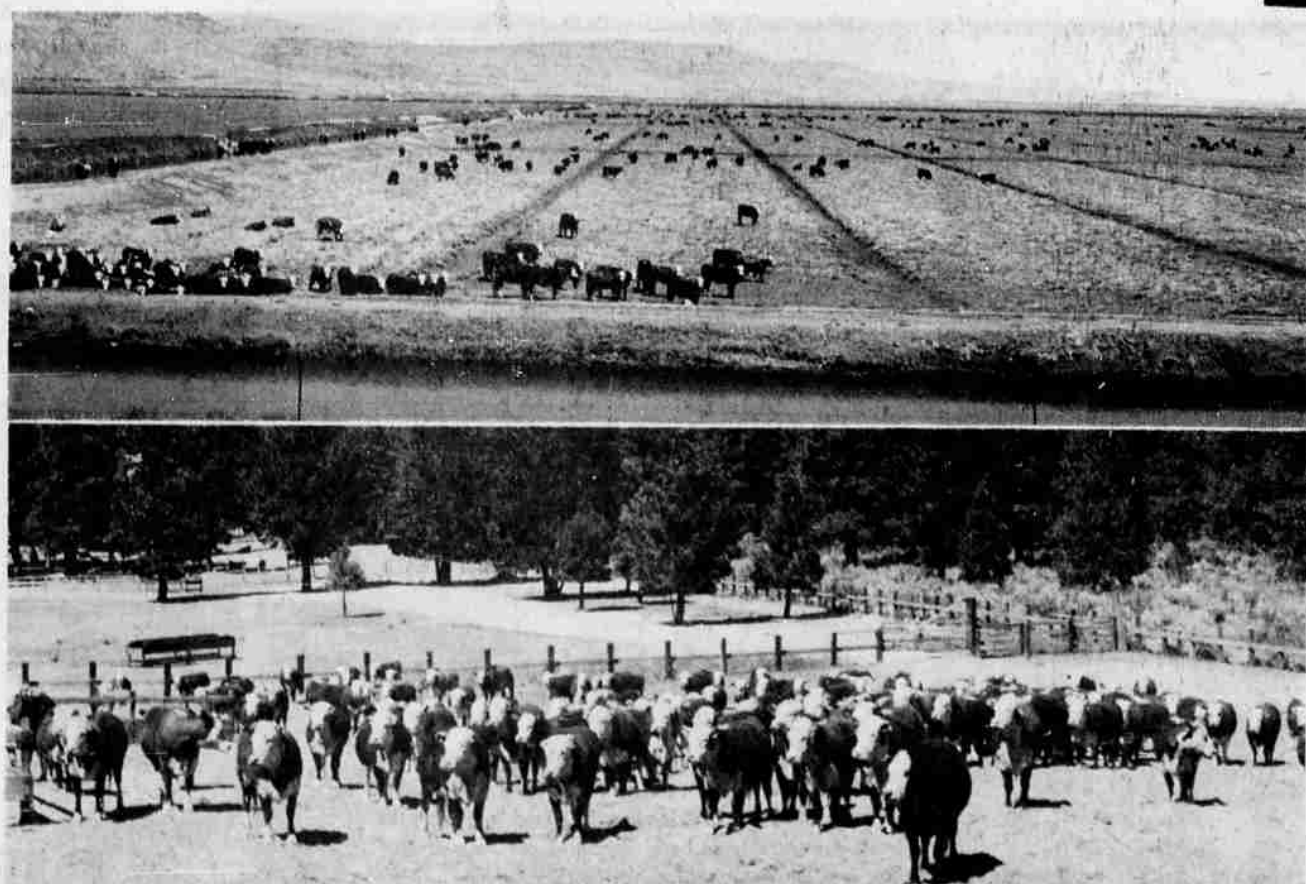
