

Some Break Given Vets On Taxation

Most veterans' benefits are exempt from state and federal taxation, Vere A. McCarty, service division manager for the Oregon Department of Veterans' Affairs, reported today. Items excluded in computing both federal and state tax returns, which are due April 15, include:

State bonuses, all benefits paid by the federal Veterans Administration to veterans and survivors, GI insurance dividends, insurance proceeds paid on death of the insured or on endowment plans, mustering-out pay and veterans' jobless benefits, and social security benefits, workmen's compensation and sickness benefits. Interest earnings from GI insurance dividends left on deposit are taxable, however.

Armed Forces disability retirement pay is exempt from federal taxation, while Oregon taxes any amount in excess of \$3,000, with one exception: If the VA had at one time been responsible for making the payment, then it is totally exempt.

Retirement pay for length of service in the Armed Force is taxed both by the federal government and the state of Oregon.

Oregon servicemen on active duty enjoy a state income tax exclusion on the first \$3,000 of their annual military pay. This includes pay earned during annual National Guard summer camp or Reserve cruises or maneuvers of two weeks or more, but it does not include inactive duty or weekly drill pay.

Servicemen must pay federal taxes on their military income.

Weyerhaeuser Granted Permit To Build Road

Public Utility Commissioner Joel C. Hill said last week he had granted the application of the Weyerhaeuser Company for authority to construct a private road crossing with the Klamath Falls-Lakeview Highway near Bly.

Hill said the crossing would connect forest roads leading from Weyerhaeuser's timber source with a road providing access to a log reloading point near Bly.

Trucks using the crossing will be of the off-the-road type which haul loads up to 125,000 pounds. The maximum size of the loads has been set at 40 feet long, 12 feet high and 10 feet wide.

About 60 trucks a day will use the crossing during the logging season, with nearly all movements being conducted during daylight hours.

Traffic volume on Highway Oregon 66 in the vicinity of the crossing is 400 vehicles a day.

Tax Returns Date Nears

A tax return due date reminder for Oregon businesses was issued today by A. G. Erickson, district director of the Internal Revenue Service for the state of Oregon.

Erickson said Feb. 28 is the date by which all businesses must file annual information returns showing payments made during 1960 of salaries, wages, fees, commissions, and other compensation for personal services totaling \$600 or more.

Payments of interest, rents, royalties, annuities, pensions and other income must be reported, he said, as well as dividends of \$10 or more.

However, compensation already reported on Forms W-2 are not included on these information returns.

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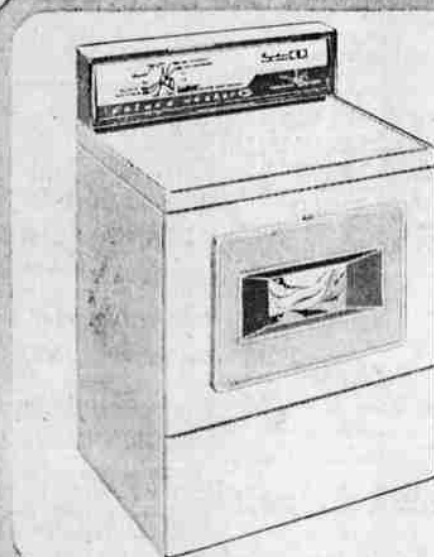

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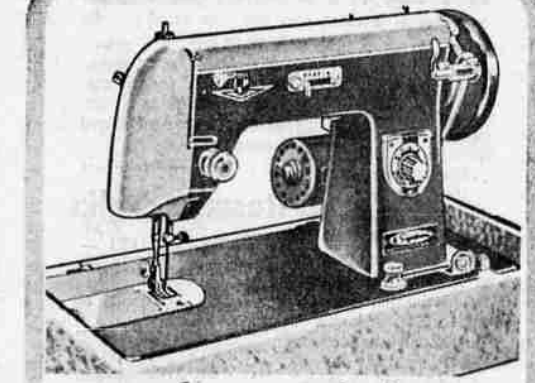

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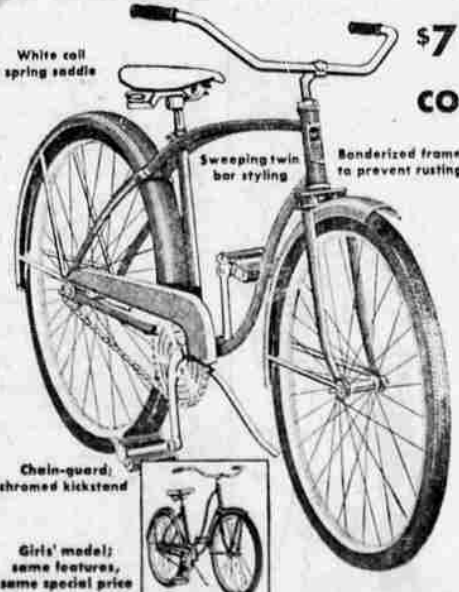


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
