Hallard Bailey, curriculum director, attended the Northwest Audio-Visual Conference at the University of Portland on Monday and Tuesday. Practically all of both private and public colleges and universities were represented there. If you want to know anything about motivational research and audio-visual materials, ask Hallard. Considerable time was spent on school building planning for the use of new techniques and teaching machines.

A design for improvement of teaching machines were two themes of the conference. Laurine McFarland, who graduated in Drafting Tech in 1939 and who is presently employed at Lakeview in the Engineering Department of Fremont National Forest, has spent the last month attending a forest service road design school in Portland. She was the only lady to attend the school. Laurine is the sister-in-law of Benny Morrison, auto mechanics instructor.

Larry Seal, a 1960 graduate in Welding, has an important position with Wa Chang Metallurgical Corporation which produces rare and exotic metals at Albany. The corporation is presently geared to the production of hafnium control rods to be used in atomic reactors. He has the final inspection responsibilities in the inspection department to see that these rods meet the required specifications. Not only Larry's training in welding, but that acquired in the industrial lab, radiographic lab, and the physics and other science courses, have contributed to his qualifications for holding the position. He was recently selected to go to New Jersey to attend a school to learn to test the rods by ultrasonic methods. Larry is also chief operator of the industrial X-ray equipment at Wa Chang, and has been given the assignment of working out schedules of radiographs based on density of the various metals. He will receive a special bonus as a result of the working out of these schedules.

The Button furnace which Lea Ogden, machine shop instructor, is building in the machine shop for the industrial lab is about 50 per cent completed. To this amateur, the complicated looking piece of equipment certainly looks like a professional job.

Ray Garrison and Gene Culver, instructors in the Mechanical Technology area, with three students attended a meeting of Portland Chapter No. 63 of ASTM (American Society of Tool and Machine Engineers) last Thursday evening. The Portland Chapter is sponsoring the OTI student chapter and was very enthusiastic about its formation according to Garrison. A tentative date for charter night has been set for March 4. Approximately 30 members of the Portland chapter will be here to present the charter and take part in the charter night ceremonies.

Fred Poston, Engineering Associates Division head, informs us that the survey work preliminary to seismographic soundings on the new campus was completed Friday. Seven advanced surveying students carried out the project. The company will come to Klamath Falls with the machines to make the soundings in the relatively near future.

Jack Frust, electronics instructor, Gene Culver and Ray Garrison with members of the Control Systems class visited the Bureau of Mines at Albany Friday. They observed methods of refining hafnium and zirconium and other rare and exotic metals. Albany is the center for refining of these metals used in the nose-cones of missiles. The group viewed control systems used in extracting metals from ore and further refinement processes.

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Even Felons File Returns

SALEM (AP) — Uncle Sam will take your cash, no matter where you are. Like an awful lot of people who are not in stir, inmates of the Oregon State Penitentiary are filling out income tax returns this year.

For the main part it's not from the money they make in prison. But for cash they earned before they made the bucket. Or from pensions or other income that continues while they are off the labor market.

Warden Clarence T. Gladden says some 254 of the prison's 1,500 inmates filled out income tax returns last year. Many were trying to get return of money withheld for taxes from incomes they earned before their arrests.

For the most part, the men behind bars are not money-makers. Most never were. But there are a few with healthy outside incomes. One owns a large farm.

Gladden says these people usually turn over their businesses and interests to friends or relatives. The state of Oregon won't let you operate a business while you're doing time in prison.

Some others receive Social Security benefits. Others get industrial accident benefits they were receiving before imprisonment. Still others are getting pensions for military service.

Prisoners lay their hands on none of this money. It is held for them until their release. But one thing is sure: Nary a sole within the penitentiary is getting any rocking chair money. That's one of the first things they check.

Nehru Against Khrushchev

NEW DELHI, India (AP) — Prime Minister Nehru said today Soviet Premier Khrushchev's drive to reorganize the United Nations must take second place to solving the Congo crisis and making progress on disarmament.

Nehru's statement to Parliament seemed to make it clear that at least for the time being he will not support the Soviet campaign to replace Secretary-General Dag Hammarskjöld with a three-man committee.
