Odds Favor Fullmer By 6-5 Margin

NEW YORK (UPI) —The middleweight championship series between Gene Fullmer and Sugar Ray Robinson resumes at Las Vegas, Nev., Saturday night in contest number four, with the standing even at 1-1-1.

Stocky, muscular Fullmer of West Jordan, Utah, is defending the National Boxing Association's version of the world 160-pound championship against the slender, 40-year-old New Yorker who wore the undisputed crown an unprecedented five times.

Although each was victorious in one of their three previous bouts and although they fought to a draw in their latest encounter at Los Angeles last Dec. 3, Fullmer is favored at 9-5 to win Saturday's "rubber match" because of his strength, stamina and comparative youth, 29 years.

Their scheduled 15-round fight will be televised nationally by ABC, but the promoters in Blackout at Las Vegas expect 8,000 fans at the Convention Center.

If Fullmer wins, he may try to force a fight with Paul Pender of Brookline, Mass., for the undisputed championship. Pender wears the New York-Massachusetts-European segment of the crown.

Pender, however, plans an earlier defense against ex-champion Carmen Basilio at Boston April 22.
