

Oregon Tech Marksmen Rated Among Top 20 NW Scorers

Oregon Tech's "Sweet Sammy" Smith, 6-6 center, and 5-9 guard Leon Wilson were ranked 12th and 15th respectively among all the Northwest college scorers in a list announced today by the Associated Press.

Smith, however, with a total of 375 points for the season, compiled his over an abbreviated season. He became eligible to join the Oregon Collegiate Conference championship squad at the beginning of the league schedule, and thus only competed in 18 of the Owls' 26 games. At an average of 20.8 per game he might have overhauled Seattle U's Eddie Miles for second place behind Gonzaga's Frank Burgess, the national leader, had he played the full slate.

Wilson, who notched 365 points

in 25 games, completed the season just four points behind Wilamette's Fidel Gaviola and ahead of Southern Oregon Conference star Gordy Carrigan.

Big Bob Peterson, the ex-Klamath Union state all-star, was the number three producer with a total of 332 points and shares the team rebounding mark with 111 Smith. Each has pulled 307 off the boards.

National Scoring Race Hot

The closest scoring race since official NCAA statistics have been kept should be decided Friday night when Gonzaga plays Idaho. Gonzaga's Frank Burgess must score 31 points to retain the all-most invisible lead he now holds over Tom Chilton of East Tennessee State in the race for major college individual honors.

Figures issued today by the NCAA Service Bureau and including games of Tuesday, Feb. 20, show Burgess with a 32.2 points per game average and Chilton, who has ended his season, with 32.12. An even 31 points Friday would bring Burgess down to 32.15.

There's an outside chance that All-America Tom Stith of St. Bonaventure could overhaul the two top men through an outstanding performance in the National Collegiate championship tournament. Stith has a 30.2 point average, so he'd have to hit about 40 points a game to reach the top. Tournament performances are included in the regular season statistics.

Pirate Boss Figures Bums Team To Beat

FORT MYERS, Fla. (UPI) — General manager Joe Brown today picked the Los Angeles Dodgers as the club his Pittsburgh Pirates will have to beat to retain the National League pennant.

Although he did not sell the other contenders short, Brown said the Dodgers should prove the toughest because of the young players they have coming up.

"They're not only good, they are great," said Brown. "The Dodgers have spent more than \$2 million in the past year and a half for bonus players and it looks like they are going to get big dividends from them."

"They have kids for almost every spot and have the potential to be stars in this league."

Brown said the Pirates also have some fine looking youngsters as do the other contending clubs—the Braves, Giants, Cardinals and Reds.

"The Dodgers don't have all of the fine looking youngsters by any means, but they have a pretty good corner on the market," Brown added.

Not that he doesn't think the Pirates aren't going to win again.

NEW YORK (UPI) — One of the fight crowd figured out Joe Louis could have earned \$100 million if he'd been fighting in this era of theater-television.

"Yeah," answered a cynic, recalling Joe's painful problems with the tax collectors, "then he'd have owed Uncle Sam a hundred and two million in taxes and penalties."

It's the way of the modern world for prize fighters to take more whacks on the whiskers for Uncle Sam than for themselves and the plight of Ingemar Johansson, who hopes to become heavyweight champion of the International Revenue Service, is common among high-pay athletes, actors, singers and other get-rich-quicksters.

Johansson and the income tax people have a slight difference of opinion over whether Ingo owes some \$598,181.92 on various pots he collected for fighting Floyd Patterson twice and for certain appearances as a television entertainer.

Can't Expect Sympathy The average guy slaving over his income tax forms these days may find it hard to bleed for Ingo, who came over from Sweden a couple of years ago in search of big money—and found it.

Johansson's well-planned Swiss tax set-up had the local mob green with envy but if it's legal he's entitled to all the loot he can keep. If not, he'll get his bill.

Even a careful character like Rocky Marciano has had come-back ideas, though in recent months Rocky's business ventures reportedly have been taking a turn for the better and the come-back talk has ceased.

Cry For Relief There frequently has been raised a great cry for tax relief for short-career "artists," including athletes, and we're all for it if some genius can figure out a way so the difference wouldn't be added to our own tax bill.

But what matters to most of us now is whether Johansson will turn moody over money and make a poor fight against Patterson at Miami Beach, Fla., March 13 or whether he'll be a tiger for the same reason and stretch out the young champion for the second time with the "tender" in his right fist.

Only by going all the way to the finals of a post-season tournament—scoring like mad en route—could a rival overhaul Frank Burgess of Gonzaga in the race for 1961 collegiate basketball tally honors in the Northwest.

Burgess had counted 781 points in 24 games as the books closed for this week's tabulations. Eddie Miles, the flashy Seattle University sophomore, had 499 over a similar distance.

Larry Applegate of Eastern Oregon, although killed by injury, held to third spot with 478 and College of Idaho's Bob Moreno followed with 460. Four other players were over the 400 mark—Dave Mills of Seattle U. with 454, Dave Wortman of Seattle Pacific with 435, Tom Neel, Eastern Oregon with 431 and Terry Ball of Washington State with 435.

Rounding out the top 10 were Bob Hunt of Gonzaga with 390 and Ray Burwick of Northwest Nazarene with 386. To land in the second 10 a player needed 340 or more. The leaders:

Two basketball tournaments whose winners figure to be among the leading contenders for the National Collegiate Championship began today and the results could confuse the issue as much as what's been happening to the St. Bonaventure team lately.

St. Bonaventure, beaten only by Ohio State in its first 22 games this season and ranked second nationally, was the first to accept an at-large invitation to the NCAA tournament. The Bonnies figured they could beat the mighty Buckeyes if given a second chance. So did a lot of impartial observers.

Then they ran into a couple of teams that were eager for bids to the National Invitation Tournament and pinned their hopes on one big victory. It was Niagara.

St. Bonaventure 77 last Saturday. And Wednesday night an undermanned but fired-up Duquesne team, playing without a substitution, conquered the Bonnies 79-74 in overtime. Now it's hard to figure who fits in where in the tournament picture.

The Atlantic Coast and Southern Conference Tournaments—starting today—could blur the scene a bit more. West Virginia, ranked eighth nationally in the Associated Press poll, is favored to win its seventh straight Southern title. Duke, No. 9, is seeded second but a slight favorite in the ACC event.

The windup of the Southwest Conference season tonight should produce another NCAA tournament entry. Texas Tech (10-3) can win the title by beating Texas. Otherwise the winner of the Texas A&M-Arkansas game will tie. Each has a 9-4 conference record.

Tournament-bound and tournament-hopeful teams dominated the rest of Wednesday night's major program.
