Rings Attend Funeral Of Relatives

Mr. and Mrs. Henry S. Ring returned to Klamath Falls from Stockton, Calif., this week after attending the funeral of Ring's brother, Gordon William Ring, 44, who was killed in an auto accident near Weed last Tuesday.

Gordon Ring and his 7-year-old son, Dennis, were killed in a head-on collision with his wife, Hilda, 43, suffered a broken back and ankle. Mrs. Ring is still in the Mount Shasta Hospital.

At the time of the accident, the Rings were on their way to Stockton to attend the funeral of Mrs. Ring's nephew. The family had lived in Stockton for 18 years and were building a home in Grants Pass.

Gordon Ring came to Klamath Falls in 1917 and worked a short time for the Butler Construction Company and Balsiger Motor Company. Henry Ring has owned the Ring Sheet Metal Company, 2104 1/2 South Sixth Street, for the past 18 years. Other local relatives of the deceased are another brother, Leonard Ring, 609 Lytton Street, and two nephews, Dale Ring, 2060 Eberlein Street, and Glenn D. Ring, 1301 Oak Street.

Hatfield Signs Bond Measure

SALEM (AP)—Gov. Mark O. Hatfield signed into law Tuesday the bill to authorize the state Board of Higher Education to issue \$10 million more in bonds for dormitories and other structures. The bill raises the limit on these bonds from \$24 million to \$34 million.

U. S. Embroiled In Burma Incident

Aside from its other troubles in Southeast Asia, notably Laos, the United States now finds itself embroiled in another unfortunate incident in Burma.

The incident, which Burmese Premier U Nu now threatens to take to the United Nations, occurred Feb. 15 when Burmese fighter planes intercepted and shot down a plane allegedly carrying Nationalist Chinese military supplies to guerrillas operating along Burma's border with Red China.

U.S. military attaches who went to the site of the crashed plane reportedly found about five tons of ammunition bearing U.S. aid labels.

Washington now is checking to see whether the findings represent a misuse of U.S. aid to Formosa, which in the last 10 years has amounted to well over a billion dollars.

Demand for Action

U Nu says it does and demands that Washington take its promised "appropriate action."

"Without America," he says, the Formosa regime of Chiang Kai-shek "would be just waifs and strays." He adds:

"Just one word from the United States and everything would be all right."

Nationalist guerrillas in Burma, left over from the retreat from the mainland more than 10 years ago, have been a source of discord since 1953.

Under pressure of a United Nations resolution, the Formosa regime disavowed them in 1953, and United States transport helped to remove about 7,000 of them from Burma.

Burma, however, did not believe that the United States had been enough and for the next six years refused to participate in any

American aid programs.

Vexation Of Civilization Leaves People Worn Out

NEW YORK (AP)—You know why civilization wears so many people out?

Their chronic fatigue doesn't come from doing things. It comes from the vexation and annoyance of trying to arrange to do something.

Nobody does anything offhand or on the spur of the moment. You have to set it up in advance. It has to be arranged.

The mat that once said "Welcome" is out of style. The new mat says, "Welcome—by appointment only."

You phone somebody in an office, and what happens? They don't connect you. An icy impersonal voice inquires, "Who's calling, please?"

You may be calling only to call him a big personal favor. It makes no difference.

The system provides that you must give your name, rank and maybe your Social Security number, then hang fuming on the phone while you are invisibly announced and received or rejected.

You can, of course, fight back. Whenever you get that maddening query, "Who's calling, please?" you can reply in a great hollow voice: "Tell him it is God returning his call—but too busy to wait."

Then slam the receiver hard. But you can't really beat the

system today. It has you surrounded.

Try and get the television repairman to fix your set in a hurry. He has a Girl Friday, too, and she says sweetly, "Sorry-ee, he can't come to your home until Thursday evening."

To see a hit Broadway play you have to buy your tickets six months in advance. Who knows whether a man will feel like being entertained in a certain way on a certain date half a year later? But the "by appointment only" vogue—some of it necessary, but much of it simply snobbery—spreads across more fields every year.

It is "by appointment only" now that you get a haircut, have your dog clipped, play golf on a public course, go bowling, have your teeth filled, or explain your last income tax return.

You don't have to die by appointment, but if your friends want to attend your funeral services they have to arrange to arrive at the appointed hour. If they get to the church 5 minutes late, you'll be gone—and the pastor may be performing a wedding.

There is only one real way of escaping the system.

Become a beatnik. As he doesn't plan to do anything much anyway, he doesn't have all the wear and tear of arranging things beforehand. His nerves are calm, unflinched.

A beatnik's only appointment is with futility. And this doesn't require phone calls or advance planning.
