Tulelake Fire Department To Hold Dance Saturday

TULELAKE—The Tulelake Volunteer Fire Department will sponsor the department's annual public dance, Saturday, March 4, with the Cedarville Rhythmaires, eight-piece orchestra, playing. Dancing will start at 9 p.m. in the multipurpose building at the fairgrounds.
The dance is the only money-making project the department attempts during the year. Proceeds are used for special purchases for the firemen and fire hall.
Peter A. John, dance chairman, expressed appreciation to those in Klamath Falls who supported the dance with the purchase of tickets. Fire chief is Lyle Sherer.
The Tulelake department is currently opening a new fire station at Newell, located across the street from the Newell Elementary School, where three trucks including a 10,000-gallon pumper will be located. A steel building houses the equipment. Pumper service will provide fire protection at such times as ditches are dry.
The new installation will provide six separate fire fighting units for the protection of the entire Tulelake-Newell districts. Tulelake department's Civil Defense truck is available for calls anywhere, any time, cooperating with the Civil Defense organization in Oregon.

Chamber Loses Subsidy Fund

MOUNT SHASTA — In making a firm request to the Mount Shasta Chamber of Commerce to remove chamber-owned property from a city-owned building, the Mount Shasta City Council added an incentive.
One hundred fifty dollars of the \$300 quarterly city subsidy to the chamber was withheld by the council to pay for removal costs unless the chamber took immediate action.
Props left over from the chamber's Fourth of July celebration will be removed from city park property promptly, Barney Hoffman, chamber president, said.

More People Going Bankrupt

WASHINGTON (AP) — More Americans are going bankrupt these days than ever before in the nation's history.
Bankruptcy filings in 1960 totaled 110,034 and may reach 143,000 this year, reports the federal court's bankruptcy chief, Edwin L. Covey. In 1953 the total was 40,007.
Covey's figures were made public today by a House subcommittee which heard his request for more money for additional clerks. He said nearly 90 per cent of the bankruptcy petitions are being filed by individuals and the rest by business concerns.
