Designed by Evelyn Coleman, these Expand-a-grille panels unite a broken window wall while concealing a radiator and an air conditioner.

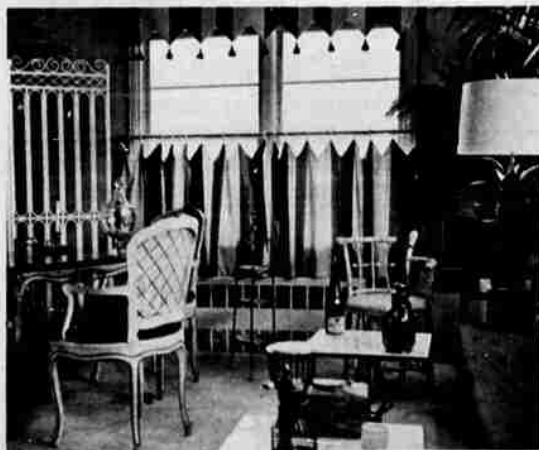
New Ways to Decorate Windows

IT'S NOT MUCH of a trick to enhance beautiful window walls, but it takes a little imagination to create dramatic illusions that fool the eye with less than handsome ones. Here, by leading designers, are exciting new ways with windows that score high on decorative effect, yet are practical solutions to common window problems.
