

IWA To Seek Pension Plan

PORTLAND (AP) — There will be no wage increase demand when contract negotiations begin in the Far West next month, the International Woodworkers of America union said Saturday.

Instead the stress will be on uniform pension and health and welfare plans in seven western states.

Most of the 40,000 IWA members in the West now have no pension plan and only some are covered by health and welfare plans, said Harvey Nelson, president of the union's Western Regional Council.

"We think we're very behind time in getting pension plans for our people," Nelson said, adding that such benefits now are provided by only a few companies. Nelson said no final proposals have been drafted for the IWA plan, but added that he estimated realization of the union's goals would amount to considerably more than a 10-cent an hour wage boost.

No general wage increase will be sought, he said. There will be an attempt, however, to eliminate what Nelson called present wage inequities that exist in some companies and some segments of the industry. Neither will there be an attempt to implement one of the IWA's major dreams: a six-hour day.

Negotiations are scheduled to begin in April. Nelson said he hoped negotiations could be on an industry-wide basis. Most contracts expire June 1.

Of the IWA's 40,000 members in Oregon, Washington, Idaho, California, Nevada, Wyoming and Colorado, only about 32,000 are now employed because of the production slump that has hit the lumbering industry, Nelson said.
