Order Search For Solovich

ROSEBURG, Ore. (AP) — A new search was ordered today for Steve Solovich, the elusive mountain man who has lived in the Cascades since escaping from a mental hospital here a year ago. Only two men will be used in the latest phase of the long search, said Sheriff Ira Byrd. Two deputies will go into the snow-covered wilderness, using horses to carry enough provisions to last for several days. The search was stalled most of last week by rain, fog and snow. Solovich is being sought for a series of burglaries at outlying ranches and for the wounding of a posse member last month.

OTI Labor-Management Reporting Seminar Set Wednesday

Final arrangements are being made at Oregon Technical Institute for the labor-management reporting seminar to be held on March 8. Bureau of Labor-Management personnel, Dow E. Walker, compliance officer, and Robert C. Stevens, acting area director, will manage the workshop-type meeting. All union members are invited to attend but it is especially important that presidents, treasurers, and secretaries, or acting principal officers, attend. The seminar is for union personnel in all of the Southern Oregon counties including Lake, Jackson, Josephine, Curry, Deschutes, Crook, Klamath and Northern California counties. The Labor-Management Reporting and Disclosure Act of 1959 specifies the methods in which this reporting must be done. "A large body of opinion has been developed regarding the legal requirements and officer's responsibilities in complying with the act," Gilbert L. Penrose, compliance officer, Bureau of Labor-Management Reports, Seattle Area Office, stated when he met with James Boyle, campus chairman, last week to help with the planning. "The seminar officials will also be prepared to answer questions regarding bookkeeping problems." Registration will occur at the Student Union building at 8 a.m. The morning agenda will include lectures and discussions led by the BLMR officials. Lunch at the campus cafeteria will be included in the \$5 registration fee. The afternoon meetings will be devoted to workshop-type activity.

Cites Danger In Ag Slash

SALEM (AP) — Joe Saito, chairman of the state Board of Agriculture, Saturday urged a legislative Ways and Means subcommittee to restore the cuts it has proposed in the governor's budget for the state Department of Agriculture. Saito said that the governor's budget contains the minimum amount necessary to carry out the assignments which the legislature has given to the department. He added that programs of meat inspection, dairy sanitation, ragweed control and checks on weights and measures would be seriously curtailed if the subcommittee's cuts prevail. He also said the cuts would force a reduction in programs to control diseases of plants and animals. The subcommittee has proposed reducing the budget by \$500,000.

PORTLAND (AP) — Portland School District voters will be asked Wednesday to approve a \$2.5 million two-year levy. The school district said the money is needed to continue such programs as kindergartens, free civic use of school buildings and health services.

Election First For County

PRINEVILLE (AP) — Crook County has called for an election April 21 to put before the voters a measure that would increase taxes by \$54,859 next year. It is the first time in the county's 73-year history, officials said, that voters have been asked to approve funds over the six percent limitation. The county court said a total budget of \$242,903 is needed, or the county will have to close the library, eliminate predatory animal control, drop the rural fire zone and withdraw financial aid from the county agricultural agent's office. The measure was named president-elect. Other officers included Dr. Robert J. Schulstad of Portland, vice president, and Dr. Thomas D. Holder of Portland, secretary-treasurer.
