

# Klamath Falls Naval Pilot To Attend Homecoming

Lt. Cmdr. John Stirling of 2964 South Sixth Street will attend a First Homecoming of Naval Aviators at the Golden Anniversary of Naval Aviation in Pensacola, Fla., June 6-11.

He is one of 70,000 naval aviators trained in Pensacola who are being invited to return to the cradle of naval aviation for a spectacular birthday party honoring the Navy's heroic flying men of past and present.

The celebration coincides with Pensacola's annual Fiesta of Five Flags, a colorful week-long pageant commemorating the founding of Pensacola 402 years ago by a Spanish conquistador, Don Tristan de Luna.

A highlight of festivities will be a mammoth air show with performances by the Navy's Blue Angels and Sky Divers, the Air Force Thunderbirds and other precision demonstration teams. The Royal British and Canadian Air Forces have been invited to participate.

More than 60 events throughout the week will include class reunions for naval aviators, indoor and outdoor competitions ranging from bridge tournaments to fishing rosters, water skiing demonstrations, and boat racing. Treasure hunts for fiesta revelers of all ages will be held on the white sands of Pensacola Beach and in the Gulf waters once frequented by pirates in Spanish galleons.

## FBI Terms Trail Cold

PORTLAND (AP) — The FBI says the trail is cold in the search for the robber who held up the Citizens Branch of the U.S. National Bank in Portland Monday.

The neatly dressed robber got away with \$1,000 after he passed a note to tell Jennie Rondenstedt which said: "Give me your 20s, 10s and 5s. I've got a gun pointed at you."

Mrs. Rondenstedt said she did not see a gun. She said she put a stack of bills on the counter. The robber stuffed the money into a briefcase he was holding and walked out of the bank. The robbery went swiftly and quietly and others in the bank did not know about it.

Mrs. Rondenstedt said she stepped on an alarm button in the floor of the teller cage. But it apparently did not work.

She described the robber as in his early 30s, about six feet tall, and with sandy hair. He was wearing a beige raincoat.

The description fitted that of a man seen getting into a cream colored car at the rear of the bank after the robbery.

But FBI agent Joseph Thornton said the description of the car was not definite enough to justify any roadblocks, and none were established.

# Grain Setup Change Seen This Year

LAKEVIEW—Farmers in Lake County who may be interested in a possible feed grain production adjustment program in 1961 are urged to call at the County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Office, according to Erwin Abramson, chairman of the ASC county committee. The request is made to farmers at this time because farm feed grain and other crop acreage information will be needed for any feed grain program that may be authorized for the coming crop season.

Farmers who supply feed grain and other acreage figures at this time will not be eligible to participate. However, Abramson points out that a program can be quickly put into operation if the necessary farm acreage information is on file at the county office. He asks cooperation of the farmers in providing the necessary information.

Those interested are asked to bring to the county ASC office their records of the acreage of cropland used for field corn, grain sorghums, oats, barley, and other crops for the two crop years 1959 and 1960. The report should be on the basis of the acreage planted and the use made of the crop produced. Accurate information must be obtained immediately for possible establishments of farm feed grain base acreages.

Since Lake County is classed as a minor feed grain producing area, only interested farmers are being asked to make reports. In counties classed as major feed grain producing areas, acreage reports are being obtained for all farms.

# Protest Meeting Canceled

CHARLESTON, S.C. (UPI)—An organization of Roman Catholic parents, threatened with excommunication and charging unwelcome outside interference, Monday night called off a meeting to protest parochial school desegregation.

The newly formed "Organization of Catholic Parents" had scheduled a meeting in a civic auditorium to discuss ways of slowing integration of South Carolina parochial schools. An attempt to use church facilities for the meeting had been met with a flat refusal by the group's pastor.

The Most Rev. Paul H. Hallinan, bishop of the Charleston Diocese which takes in the entire state, had issued a pastoral letter Feb. 19 telling Roman Catholics to prepare for desegregation of parochial schools.

Persons arriving for the meeting Monday night found a cancellation notice at the entrance to the auditorium. A spokesman for the parents' organization told newsmen the meeting was called off because "we wanted to keep it in the family and newsmen wanted to attend."

Bishop Hallinan's earlier warnings possibly had affected the cancellation. The bishop had reminded the group that those who resisted the church edict "could not expect their status in the church to remain unchanged."

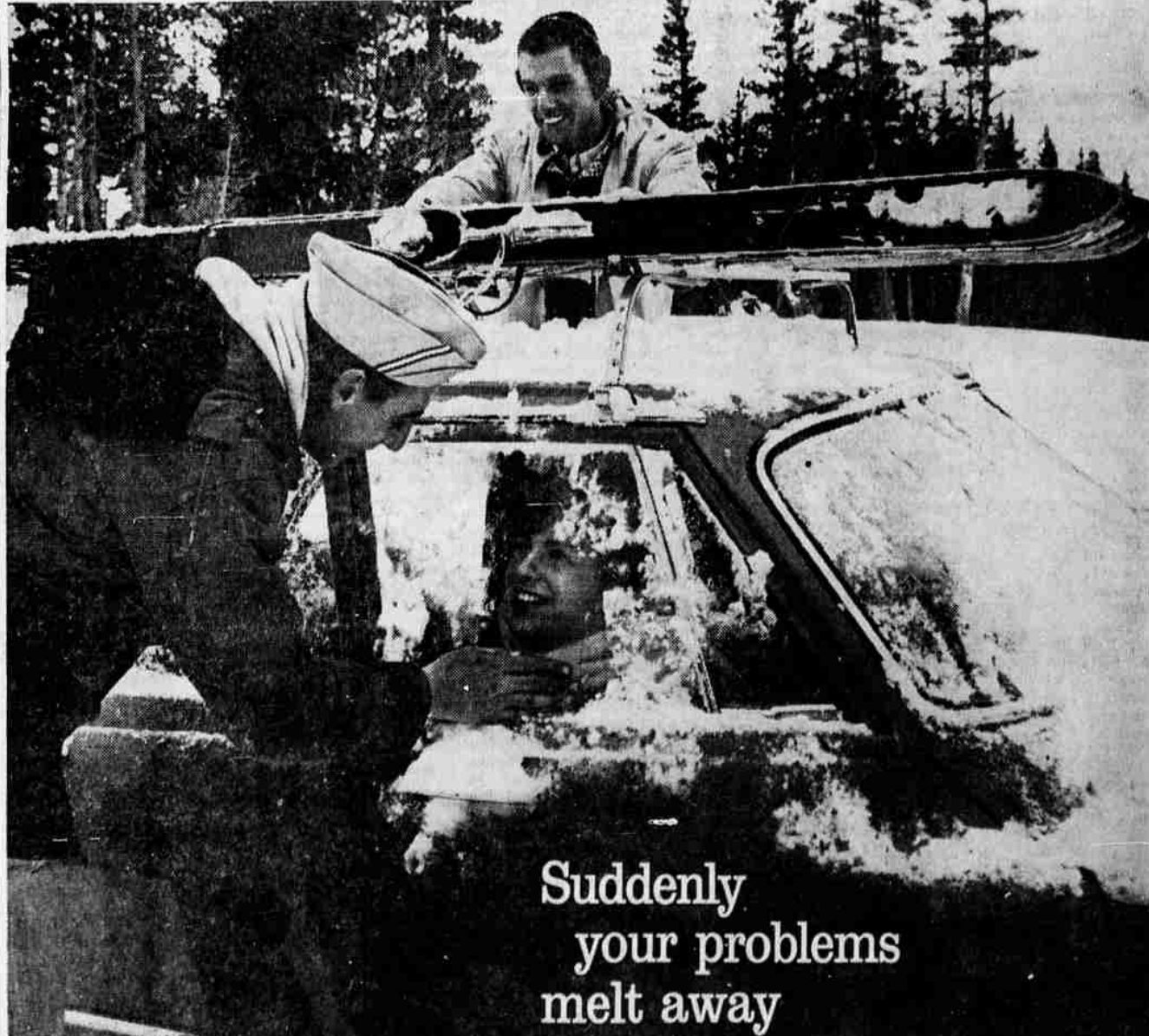
