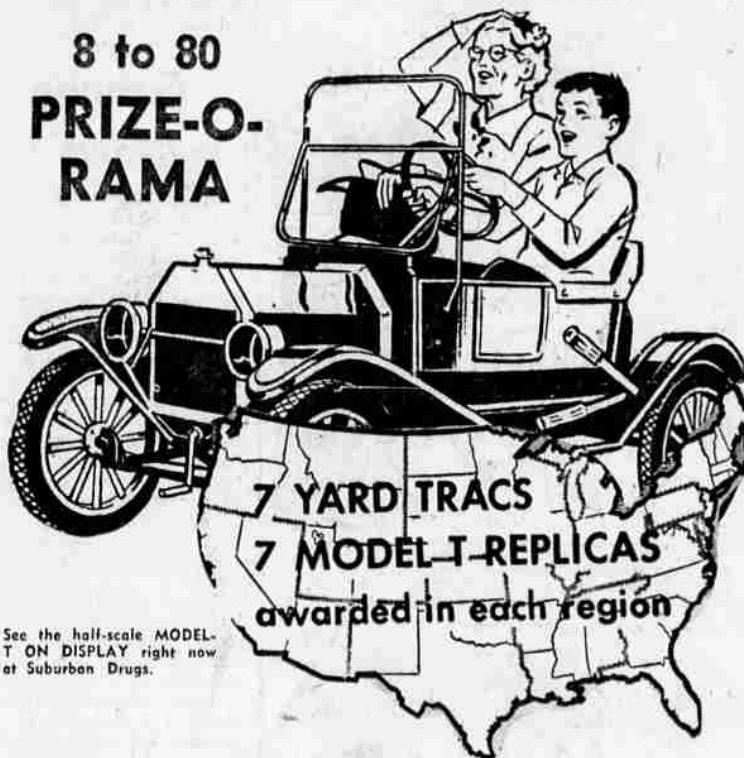

Judge Turns Down Motion In Local Gambling Case

Motions to dismiss the gambling charges against Mrs. Jane E. Rood, bartender at the Suburban Tavern, were overruled in district court Tuesday morning.

The motions were made by Mrs. Rood's attorney, David Vandenberg Jr. He contended that there were insufficient charges in the complaint to appraise Mrs. Rood of what she was being charged with.

Judge Hal F. Coe overruled motions in connection with two pin-ball machines and took a third motion, concerning punchboards, under advisement for a later ruling.

As soon as the motions failed, Vandenberg filed demurrers to the complaints on the ground that they were improperly prepared. The demurrers will be argued March 17.

The youths were arrested shortly after midnight Saturday in the parking lot behind the Holiday Bowl after a report that they were giving a bowling alley employee a "bad time." Police officers said Puckett was profane and wanted to fight.
