

Ingemar To Switch Attack; To Mix At Close Quarters

PALM BEACH, Fla. (UPI)—Ingemar Johansson, a changed fighter at 28, finished his glove preparations today for perhaps the ring's "greatest experiment" Monday night.

Under fire, he'll attempt a transition from the long-range "feather-fighter" style that made him world champion to a close-quarter pressure attack which he hopes will recapture the crown from Floyd Patterson at the Miami Beach Convention Hall.

It's extremely doubtful if any other boxer of Swedish Ingo's prominence and age ever attempted such a drastic shift as that for which he has been rehearsing during 206 rounds of sparring for this fight.

When big, brown-haired Ingemar won the title from Patterson in June, 1953, with a third-round knockout, he was what boxing men call a "feather-fighter" with-

out any necessary reflection on his courage.

The term "feather-fighter" has been applied for years to boxers who prefer fast footwork and long-range sharp-shooting to a close-quarter attack and its accompanying exchanges.

Timing Near Perfect

A feather-fighter who can punch is a very dangerous opponent because usually he is under such tension that his reflexes are lightning fast and his timing verges on perfection.

Now, Ingemar—strictly an up-right fighter during his career—has changed to a semi-crouch, and even attempts a bob-weave at times. And he presses forward, flat-footed, after his sparmates. He jabs and jabs at them with his left—with a solid left—and tries to batter them with both fists in exchanges.

Unpleasant Surprise

In Tuesday's six rounds with three sparmates here, his changed style proved a surprise indeed to one who hadn't seen him in action since last year. And in some respects it was an unpleasant surprise.

It appeared Ingo had sacrificed his defensive speed and his long-range explosiveness for a style that required a solid left jab and little close-quarter hooking ability.

Ingo's left jab, when he tries to make it solid, is a bit ponderous—the wagon tongue variety. And he is too clumsy for effective hooking at close quarters.

Unless Ingo and his advisers have some secret weapons that were sharpened during the two private sparring sessions he staged here each week, it would seem his style-change has lessened his chance of becoming the second man to recapture the heavy crown.

Only 20-Year Man

Big Early, who'll become baseball's only 20-year man on Sept. 2, has a reputation for being the "meanest" pitcher in the majors, win or lose, and he means to start winning again after a so-so (for him) 13-12 season last year. He won 22 the year before.

Wynn, however, was feeling his oats at the start of last season and admitted he was "trying to blow the ball past the hitters" instead of pitching his regular routine. He went back to the old pattern in mid-season and picked up nine of his 13 victories.

Staley gave some thought to retirement last season but he wound up 13-8 in 64 relief appearances.

Only three percentage points separate the two teams but Detroit plays four games in the next five days to finish out the season, meeting Los Angeles, Boston and Philadelphia in successive nights starting tonight. The Pistons then wind up the season on Sunday against New York.

Cincinnati, meanwhile, has only two games remaining and will have plenty of time to rest up after losing Tuesday night to the Celtics, 124-121. The Royals don't play again until this weekend when they meet the Lakers both Saturday and Sunday.

Boston picked up a \$2,000 bonus by defeating the Royals Tuesday night. The victory assured the Celtics the best win-loss record in the NBA, which gains them the extra money. In other games, the St. Louis Hawks scored a 137-136 double overtime triumph over the Lakers and the Knickerbockers withstood a late Syracuse rally to down the Nationals, 114-113.

Bill Russell with 27 points and Bob Cousy with 21 led Boston which survived a 43-point late period outburst by the Royals. Oscar Robertson of Cincinnati took game honors with 32 points.

Bob Pettit's 48 points paced the Hawks while Elgin Baylor led the Lakers with 30 points and 21 rebounds. Cliff Hagan added 35 points for the winners. Despite the loss, Los Angeles clinched second place in the Western Division by virtue of Cincinnati's loss to Boston.

Richie Guerin topped the Knicks, who blew a 13-point lead and then held on to break a nine-game losing streak. It was the fifth consecutive loss for Syracuse.

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Wynn Leads Frisky 'Senior Citizens'

NEW YORK (UPI) — There's plenty of life left in baseball's "senior citizens," a frisky, fortyish group led by 41-year-old Early Wynn of the Chicago White Sox.

That old rockin' chair may be callin' but it's only a whisper to some of these older statesmen of the diamond whose success or failure at combatting the calendar may be significant factors in the 1961 pennant races.

Wynn, 41 on Jan. 6, became the oldest active major leaguer when Ted Williams hung up his mitt at the end of last season but Gerry Staley of the White Sox, Stan Musial of the Cardinals, Dave Philley of the Orioles and Elmer Valo of the Minnesota Twins are close behind at 40 and Warren Spahn of the Braves hits 40 shortly after the season opens.

Valo and Philley, carried as pinch-hitters and occasional spot performers, aren't likely to decide any pennants though they're valued as capable "spare wheels."

But Wynn and Staley, in their best form, can mean a whale of a lot to White Sox hopes in their annual struggle to klayo the Yankees.

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Prairie View Makes Work Celebration

PRAIRIE VIEW, Tex. (AP) — They were soft-pedaling all enthusiasm over capturing the nation's small college basketball championship at Prairie View A&M today.

Instead of celebrating, Coach Leroy Moore and his players proceeded methodically to get ready for a game Friday in the college division of the NCAA playoffs — which Prairie View is favored to win. Their opponent is Superior State Teachers College of Wisconsin.

Prairie View, a small school with a big basketball team, claimed the No. 1 spot among smaller colleges in the season's final Associated Press poll by beating out another Negro school, Tennessee State, Ohio State took the national title in the major college poll.

In the small college poll, the Panthers got seven of 10 first place votes and a total of 97 points on the basis of 10 for first, nine for second, etc.

Tennessee State collected 83 points and two No. 1 votes.
