Yreka School Counselors Attend College Conference

YREKA — Mrs. Olive Young, Mrs. Gloria Louton and Stanley Balfrey, counselors at Yreka Union High School, recently attended a conference at Southern Oregon College, Ashland, sponsored by the College Entrance Examination Board.

Purpose of the conference was to brief teachers, counselors, and administrators on various changes and expected changes in college entrance requirements and procedures.

Considerable time was spent on discussion of the college board entrance examinations. The board recommends that high school juniors who are interested in college take the Preliminary Scholastic Aptitude Test in preparation for college entrance or placement.

Most colleges which practice selection at admission are receiving very few applications from students who are not qualified, the counselors learned. The colleges are thus required to make some subjective judgments of students.
