NEW YORK (AP)—The stock market kept an irregular edge to the upside late this afternoon as trading slackened from a far early pace.

Volume for the day was estimated at 6 million shares compared with 5.91 million Wednesday.

Gains of most key stocks were fractional but a few went to 1 or 2 points. More volatile secondary issues produced gains of 3 points or more as well as some fairly sharp losers.

The list was higher from the start and maintained its higher tone despite continued profit taking. Moderately higher on balance were steels, motors, tobacco, rails, drugs, nonferrous metals and utilities. Chemicals, nonferrous metals and electronics were mixed.

Brunswick fell about 2 1/2 points and American Machine & Foundry more than 3. Gains of 3 or more were posted for Polaroid, Beckman Instruments and Litton Industries. Western Union and American Smelting advanced more than 2 1/2 apiece. Universal Match added 2.

International Business Machines added about 18 points. Lorillard, American Tobacco, Radio Corp. and Jones & Laughlin advanced about 1 each.

Bond prices continued irregular late today. Corporate were active. The U.S. government market was quiet.

Winema Forest Recreation Development Discussed

Officials of the newly constituted Winema National Forest met with the Klamath County Court Wednesday to discuss the orderly development of recreational facilities on the new lands.

Carroll Brown, supervisor of the Rogue River National Forest, introduced Alex E. Smith, who is in Klamath Falls making plans for the Winema National Forest. District ranger Earl M. Karlinger, Douglas B. Shaw and Kjell M. Bakke, also of the U.S. Forest Service, were present for the meeting.

County Judge R. B. (Bob) Walker and commissioners Frank Ganong and Earl K. (Ken) Allison said they thought Klamath County should be consulted on matters affecting the local area. The forest service representatives agreed to cooperate fully with the county.

Several organizations, including the county court and forest service are interested in Klamath area recreational development, especially overnight camping facilities. The Klamath County Chamber of Commerce, Bureau of Land Management and the Oregon State Fish and Game Commission have also indicated their willingness to cooperate.

Two roads which the county and forest service are building, were discussed. They are the West Side Road and the Clover Creek Road, to which both agencies are contributing funds.

Reversal For Judge Sloper

The Oregon State Supreme Court this week reversed a decision by Circuit Court Judge Val D. Sloper in a Klamath County assault and battery case.

The supreme court, in handing down its decision, said Judge Sloper had ruled on questions which should rightfully have been submitted to a jury.

The case involved an assault and battery action filed by Rose Marie Long against Harold Allen Hill in October, 1957. The questions which should have been considered by a jury were the statute of limitations and intentional concealment by the defendant.

The supreme court ruled that the denial of a jury trial was the denial of a "fundamental right," and added that the judge's refusal to call a jury was reversible error.

Two Klamath Falls attorneys argued the case last month. Glenn D. Ramirez represented Miss Long and Freeman Murray represented Hill. The decision was written by Justice Hall Lusk.

erally come to the "lions den" in making a Dunsuirr appearance and complimented those attending on their willingness to listen and discuss the merger proposal in a friendly manner.

Dunsuirr is Southern Pacific main division point between Portland and the Bay Area and is primarily a railroad town. Runge did say that mergers would adversely affect railroad employment in the West but agreed that the interstate commerce commission has provided "climate for merger."

The men could offer no suggestion for increased rail truck complications except revision of outmoded interstate commerce commission regulation. Grossman admitted that Santa Fe has retained Sen. Ed Regan, Weaver, as a special counsel but could not say that Regan's value would be as an attorney whose practice is centered in a no-railroad county.

Rock 'n' Roll Band Combo To Play At March 11 Dance

"The Champs," a rock 'n' roll combo, and Jerry Fuller, vocalist and entertainer, will appear for a show and dance in the Klamath Auditorium Saturday, March 11, from 9 p.m. until 1 a.m.

The Champs were here last July and were well received, said Baldy Evans, the dance promoter. They came to fame with a recording of "Tequila" in late 1957 and since have made many television appearances, and have toured the nation and most of the world.

They were voted the best rock 'n' roll group in the country in 1958 by the National Academy of Recording Arts and Sciences.

Some of their hit tunes were "Too Much Tequila," "Little Matador," "Alley Cat" and "El Rancho Rock."

Fuller, a Texan, halted his prize fighting career to enter show business. His first record was "Betty, My Angel," a top seller. Subsequent releases, "Tennessee Waltz," "Gone for the Summer" and "Anna From Louisiana," have brought him increasing popularity.

Fuller is a swimmer, skier, bowler, mountain climber and rodeo bull rider. He writes much of the material he and other musicians use.

The Klamath County Unit of the Beauticians Association has just completed a community service program that has benefited teen-agers who live in foster homes.

Steve Peters of the participating Charm Center, said in announcing the project just completed, that this age of youth under the care of others than their families, are frequently overlooked by groups interested in helping the underprivileged.

About 30 hours of work time were devoted to giving permanent hair cuts, finger waves, shampoos and hair cuts without charge. The girls were accompanied to the shops by foster parents.

There is no money budgeted from any source for such services. The Klamath Unit of the association plans to make the effort an annual event.

Participating shops were the Charm Center, Klamath Beauty School, Margie's Beauty Shop, Dorothy's Beauty Shop, Studio of Beauty, Your Beauty Shop, and Lady Klamath Beauty Salon.

After 65 days of determined effort, the boys caught up with the girls in the 1961 Klamath County baby race.

A baby boy born to Mrs. Richard J. Hanson at 1 a.m. on March 7 tied the yearly baby count at 92-0. Then, at 4:24 a.m. the same morning, a 7-pound, 4 1/2-ounce boy became a hero by breaking the tie. He was born to Mrs. Jim Kenneally.

According to statistics from Klamath Valley Hospital, the boys usually romp away with honors, which should bring joy to the hearts of girls of all ages. But, for awhile this year, it appeared that male supremacy was at an end.

The girls dug in early this year and raced off to a lead that reached 15 at one point. On Feb. 12 the girls were ahead 68-50. Their edge dwindled gradually until Tuesday, when Baby Kenneally shattered female hopes.

Klamath Falls mothers, being women, refused to admit defeat and signs at the hospital were that it would be a close race this year.

The boys rolled up a 587-567 margin in 1960.
