Being celebrated this week in Oregon and the other 48 states is a special event of real significance to millions of Americans. It is National 4-H Club Week. During National 4-H Club Week, the 300 4-H members in Klamath County will join 33,250 of their fellows in Oregon and 2,200,000 throughout the nation in a variety of activities designed to call public attention to the achievements of the 4-H clubs and to the advantages of 4-H club membership for other boys and girls not yet enrolled in the organization.

Four-H clubs are an organization of young people interested in learning how to be better citizens and leaders of the future. They learn by actual practice through their projects, how to do some particular skill. The projects available number 70, and range all the way from home economics and agricultural projects, to electricity, photography, and others especially adapted to urban members.

The clubs work in close contact with the County Extension Service. They benefit from the guidance and cooperation of this public education system, as well as from civic groups, and from business and industry leaders. They have as volunteer leaders in their activities thousands of adults interested in the future of Oregon's young people.

One of the very important goals of club work is character building, which results from membership and active participation in 4-H work. Scores of former 4-H members now hold prominent places in many walks of life. There is a place in 4-H work for many thousands of other young people — and for many other adults who want to make a contribution to the welfare of youth and the progress of Oregon and the nation by lending a hand with 4-H work.
