Money Ready For Farmers

YREKA — Additional money is available to help eligible farmers who need it in their farming operations, states James F. Walker, county supervisor for the Farmers Home Administration.

He said a 25 million dollar contingency fund provided by the 1961 Agricultural Appropriations Act has just been released by the FHA to meet growing demand for credit.

The action was taken to make sure no qualified "family type" farmer will be required to give up farming due to lack of funds.

The amount of operating loans so far made this year has reached a total 20 per cent higher than the same period last year, said Walker. The agency's biggest lending season is at hand as farmers prepare to start spring work.

Most applications so far this year have been for loans to buy cattle. Operating loans help farmers pay for equipment, livestock, feed, seed, fertilizer, tractor fuel and other farm and home operating needs, including refinancing of chattel debts, said Walker.

Oroville Man Picks Bad Spot

ALTURAS — True Spencer of Oroville picked the wrong time and place to cause a disturbance here recently. Deputy Sheriff Elbert Kuch of Cedarville was having a meal in a cafe in Cedarville when Spencer became argumentative and disorderly, Kuch said. When it became obvious that Spencer was creating a disturbance, Kuch arrested Spencer and drove him to the Modoc County Jail here. Cedarville is 20 miles from Alturas.

Spencer spent a night in jail and was brought before Justice Court Judge Leo Steil the next morning, who found him guilty of drunk and disorderly conduct and fined him \$78.75.

Shannon River May Be Green

SAVANNAH, Ga. (AP)—Even the Savannah River will be wearing green on St. Patrick's Day if Tom Wooley's idea works.

Wooley, food and beverage manager of a Savannah hotel, proposes to dye the river green for Savannah's annual St. Patrick's Day parade March 17.

He said he will run a test today to determine how much dye would be needed and what it would cost. City officials cautiously agreed to help determine if the plan is feasible.

Wooley proposes to use a strong dye known as fluorescein, which is commonly used to test sewage systems. A county health department spokesman said the substance is not toxic, is water soluble and would have no permanent effect on anything it touches.

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
