Mrs. Joy Walker and her committee will act as hostesses for the afternoon. The club is open to all women of the Klamath Basin and it is hoped newcomers to Klamath Falls will feel welcome to attend. Tea will be served at the close of the meeting along with a social hour.

The program features two outstanding events, the annual fashion sewing contest and Mrs. Margaret Knoll, master at fiddle arts and crafts, who will display and demonstrate her work.

Sewing, a smart fashion may win a trip to Paris for a local clubwoman this year, according to Mrs. John West, chairman of the fourth annual fashion sewing contest sponsored by the General Federation of Women's Clubs and Vogue Pattern Service.

First prize in this national contest is a trip to Europe, with other awards including trips to the federation's annual convention in Miami Beach next spring.

All contestants are required to make and model an outfit they consider the "ideal costume for the clubwoman's wardrobe."

Judging of entries from the local club is scheduled for this Monday. The winner will compete with other winners in this district, and that winner will be eligible to compete in the State Federation contest. Prizes at the state level consist of cash awards of \$100 and \$25 to the first and second place winners.

In the final round the top winner from each state will compete in the national judging in New York City. The grand prize for first place is a three-week fashion tour of Europe for two persons. Second and third place winners will receive \$500 and \$300, respectively.

For the second part of the program, Mrs. Margaret Knoll will present a demonstration and display of articles her students will make during a fiddle arts course which will be held in Maple Park at the Community Art Center in March and April. Some of the work includes egg decoration, placecards and favors, paper flowers, cloth and wood fiber, patterns for doll clothes and candle decorations. This display will be of interest to all women as it shows that persons of varying degrees of artistic talent can produce effective and inexpensive decorations for all occasions.

Abbey Gardens Get Woman Boss

Thirty-year-old Marian Care of City Council's gardeners are women brings a young head to an old task—taking care of the stately College Gardens at historic Westminster Abbey, which have been under continuous cultivation for almost 900 years.

She has recently been appointed supervisor of the gardens, laid down by the saintly King Edward the Confessor when he built the Abbey in 1065. They were once the favorite haunts of monks who sought their peaceful walks for meditation. Today they are used by the college faculty, the dean, clerics and lay officers of Westminster Abbey.

One of Miss Care's first tasks will be to prepare the gardens for the 900th anniversary of the Abbey's consecration. She will also be responsible for the gardens of neighboring St. Margaret's Church, where the Field of Remembrance is laid in memory of servicemen who died in battle.

At 30 the new supervisor is already one of England's top gardeners. She was formerly head gardener at Bletchley Park Teachers' Training College, one of the largest in the country.

Her appointment is an indication of the growing popularity in England of gardening as a career for women. The Royal Parks of London have 26 women gardeners; there is a woman gardener at Lincoln's Inn, ancient home of the English legal fraternity; and 20 per cent of the London Coun-
