

Oregon Tech Matmen Show Well In Olympic Development Tourney

OAKLAND (Special) — Competing against some of the top wrestlers on the West Coast and a crack Japanese National team, the Oregon Tech mat squad still had two men in action when the Olympic Development Meet entered the semifinals here Saturday afternoon.

The two, only four men from OTI made the trip, are Ed Anderson, heavyweight, and Windell Winterbottom, a 174-pounder. Anderson and Winterbottom, with five and three points against them respectively, are still possible second, third or fourth place finishers.

Winterbottom won two matches by pins and lost one by decision in the Friday action which began at 4 o'clock in the afternoon and continued without a break until 12:30 a.m.

Anderson decided one man and was pinned by giant Bill Golt of the Olympic Club. Golt weighs 255 and stands 6-5. Anderson is 205 and 5-11.

The other Owl team members, John Weaver and Dave Kubesh, were eliminated with seven points in the Friday rounds.

Oregon won, 54-52, Friday night on high-scoring Charlie Warren's rebound basket two seconds before the end. The result left the teams with identical records—4-11. A decision on the at-large tournament entry will be announced in San Francisco Sunday.

The victory clinched for Oregon the Chancellor's Cup for the first time since the trophy was put up in 1953 by the head of the state System of Higher Education. It goes annually to the team that wins the season series.

The Friday night game at Eugene was exciting throughout. Oregon led through most of it but in the fading minutes the Beavers caught up.

With one Oregon regular out on fouls and three others on the edge with four, field goals by Bill Wood and Jim Woodland and Woodland's free throw tied it.

Oregon took the ball with 30 seconds left and played for one late shot. Leon Hayes finally came off from a corner. The shot missed but Warren dropped in the rebound.

High scorers were Warren and Oregon State's Jay Carthy with 19 points each. Glenn Moore had 17 for Oregon.

Chicago Prep Star Steals Limelight

CHICAGO (AP)—Tom Sullivan, 18, a Chicago high school senior, today peered ahead to the 1964 Olympics. And well he might after bringing down the house in the Chicago Daily News Relays with a 1,000-yard triumph over veteran rivals.

Sullivan's one-yard triumph over Olympian Peter Close in the creditable time of 2:10.5 stole the spotlight from Hungarian Istvan Rozsavolgyi's 4:04.7 triumph in the featured Banker's mile before 10,301 in the Chicago Stadium Friday night.

A senior at St. George High School in suburban Evanston, Ill., Sullivan outdistanced Close in a mad dash for the tape after Close had run the first 800 yards in 1:54.5, fastest for the distance in the meet's history.

Another veteran runner, Ed Moran, of the New York Athletic Club, finished third. "I was shooting for 2:09," said Sullivan, "but 2:10.5 is good. I've got plenty of time. What I'm looking forward to is the 1964

Olympics. By that time, I should be ready for the 1,500 meters."

A second teen-ager, Bruce Kidd, of Toronto, was runnerup to Rozsavolgyi in the Banker's, finishing 40 yards behind the Hungarian in the best time of his young career, 4:09.4.

"That Hungarian set such a pace, that I was out of the race from the start, but I kept running," said Kidd, who is more used to running the two-mile or three-mile.

Tonight, Sullivan and Kidd performed at a mile and two miles respectively in the Milwaukee Journal games, while Rozsavolgyi prepares to leave Sunday for Budapest.

Other relays' standouts were little Max Truex whose fine 8:49.1 victory in the two-mile broke Greg Rice's 20-year-old meet mark of 8:51.1 and Olympic champion Ralph Boston's 26-foot, 1/4 inch leap in the meet's first broad jump event.

Without John Rudometkin in the lineup, the University of Southern California Trojans are just another basketball club, instead of one of the nation's top-rated.

Rudometkin sat out Friday night's game in Los Angeles as the Trojans bowed to California 69-57. The defeat was Southern California's third in 11 starts in the Big Five Conference and California's fifth straight conference victory after a poor start.

Southern California already had clinched the Big Five title, and Rudometkin, who suffered a pulled thigh muscle earlier last week, hopes to be ready this week when the Trojans compete in the NCAA Regional Championship Tournament in Portland, Ore.

Stan Morrison and Bill McClintock were the big guns as California got off to a 37-30 halftime bulge and maintained it all the way down to the finish. Morrison wound up with 20 points, McClintock with 17, and Gordon Martin topped the Trojans with 13.

UCLA's Bruins dumped Stanford in Los Angeles 69-55 and held their slight hold on second place. The Bruins play Cal Saturday night, while Southern California opposes Washington. If Cal should beat the Bruins, three teams would be tied for second place — California, Washington and UCLA, with records of 6-6.

Washington was hard pressed Friday night to beat little Idaho at Seattle 70-65 in an overtime period. It was a non-conference game.

Prospect Cougars Eliminate Huntington Quint In Semis

Friday night the Prospect five played an entirely different brand than that they displayed against Powers in the opener.

They were momentarily disheartened at the start of the game with the tall Huntington crew when their top-shooter, Craig Gardner sprained his ankle during the pre-game warmup but Bob Fitch took over and the Cougars finished in a breeze. The final tally was 70-47 for Prospect.

Gardner played most of the game despite the ankle but Fitch stole the limelight with his spectacular jump-shot from way outside. He totaled 37 points before the game was over, 24 of them on dead-center jumpers. He added three in five tries from the

foul line. Gardner was limited to eight points. The Cougars, long noted for their defensive ability, regained their composure against the Locomotives. Playing a stingy man-to-man defense they limited Bob Mason to six points, a far cry from the 25 he had collected in the first round.

Jim Armstrong, the 6-5 Loco center, was high for the losers with 19 points, hitting six for 15 from the floor and 7-10 at the foul line.

The Locomotives steamed out of a 12-10 first quarter bulge but the Cougars, led by eight points poured in by Fitch, squirted out to a 32-23 halftime edge. Fitch repeated in the third canto and the Prospect five owned a 47-31 three-quarter spread. Their fast

break accounted for 23 points in the final stanza as the Locomotive defenses just couldn't keep up.

The Cougars were successful on 28 of 56 from the field for a .500 and hit 14 of 24 foul shots.

Huntington hit on only 16 of 63 two-point tries, but notched 15 good ones in 20 attempts from the free throw line.

The shorter Cougars held a 35-32 rebound edge over the distance.

BEND (AP)—Lowell, from the west, and Ione, from the northeast, clashed for the Oregon Class B high school basketball championship Saturday night.

Lowell reached the final by stopping Portland Christian, 66-50, after Ione had qualified with a 67-54 triumph over Powers in the tournament semi-finals Friday night.

Portland Christian and Powers met in the first game of a doubleheader for third place.

Wheeler beat Perrydale, 76-51, and Prospect eliminated Huntington, 70-47, in Friday afternoon games between first round losers.

A rangy Lowell team, tallest in the tourney field, used a tight man-to-man defense to hand Portland Christian its first defeat

NY Reserve Plans To Quit '2nd Fiddle'

ST. PETERSBURG, Fla. (AP)—Eliot Howard, who has had to play second fiddle to Yogi Berra for the past five years, minced no words today when he declared he would be the New York Yankees' No. 1 catcher this year.

"I understand Yogi will do a lot of playing in the outfield," said Howard. "In that case, I'm going to be the regular catcher. I know that (John) Blanchard is a good hitter and he did a fine job in the World Series, but this is going to be my year. I just feel it. And it's about time."

This year talk for a fellow who last year fretted through his poorest season in the majors since he joined the Yankees in 1955. Ellie batted only .215, the low point of his career, hit only six home runs and batted in only 39 runs.

"I have no excuses," he said. "It was just a terrible year for me. But I know I'm capable of more. Better. I think, playing regularly, I can hit around .290 to .300, with 20 home runs and about 90 runs batted in."

Howard actually was behind the plate last year in more games than Berra. The 32-year-old St. Louisian caught 91 games to 63 for Yogi but it was Berra who caught the first two games of the World Series. Howard got in only when Yogi was shifted to the outfield. A broken finger put an end to Ellie's World Series activities and gave Blanchard an opportunity to be one of the Yankee stars.

The fighting Cortez brothers, Joe and Mike, led New York to the unofficial team title. But the trophy went to Jacksonville, with 10 points because New York was ineligible for the award as host city.

Joe Cortez, featuring a windmill style, knocked out his opponents in each of the semi-final and final rounds in the 118-pound class. He first disposed of Ralph Jackson of Washington, D.C., and then stopped Clyde Tyler of Huntington, W. Va.

Mike, a subway counterman, engaged in the bloodiest fight of the night when he outpointed O'Neil Dobbins of Cleveland to win the 135-pound crown.

Thomas Haynes, a Brooklyn, N.Y., college student, wound up at the head of the 147-pound class with a decision over Joe Williams of Elizabeth, N.J., and John Persol gave New York its fourth title by outpointing Charles Clemmons of Washington in the 160-pound division.

Jacksonville scored its other five points for a winning title fight when Pat Brady mauled Floyd Marshall of Elizabeth through three rounds to gain the 126-pound crown.

A crowd of 12,547, largest to watch the Golden Gloves bouts at Madison Square Garden in 13 years, cheered as little Raymond Jutras of Lowell, Mass., outpointed Victor Melendez of Puerto Rico in the 112-pound class.
