New Orange Boat Licenses Are Seen On Oregon Waters

The new 1961 annual boat license, which is orange colored, is commencing to appear on boats throughout the state. The State Marine Board reports that since the first of this year 10,000 licenses have been issued. The board expects to issue 35,000 more

licenses before the boating season gets under way.

Application forms were mailed to boat owners with their last year's licenses. License fees are \$3 for boats 12 feet in length but less than 16 feet; \$5 for those 16 feet or more but less than 20 feet; and \$5 for boats 20 feet in length plus \$1 per foot for each additional foot or fraction of a foot.

The board has asked the legislature now in session to exempt scouting groups and other non-profit organizations sponsoring youth programs from the boat license requirements.

Other legislation sponsored by the board includes a reduction in the license fee for canoes and other manually-propelled boats 16 feet in length and over and also elimination of the ad valorem taxes on commercial fishing vessels for which an annual boat license has been obtained.

Dinosaur Graveyard Found In Gobi

LONDON (UPI)—British scientists were awaiting further reports today from a Russo-Chinese expedition which found a "graveyard" of gigantic dinosaurs and other mighty beasts of millions of years ago in the Gobi Desert.

The Russians, acting as spokesmen for the expedition, have thus far given out only bare details of discoveries which appear to be of great importance in filling in the blank spots in the history of the vertebrates long before the appearance of man.

But among the finds in the Ala Shan Desert, in the heart of the Gobi, was a complete skeleton of an anchilosaur, a giant lizard 30 feet long—about three times the length of the previous largest skeleton of the species.

Anchilosaurs waddled like armored-plated tanks through the steaming jungles of 60 million years ago. They ate soft succulent plants.

In the same "graveyard" were the remains of duck-billed dinosaurs which were 32 feet tall when walking on their hind legs. And fragments were found of dinosaurs ranging from a species 10 to 14 feet high when on its hind legs to a saurapod, a browsing dinosaur probably 100 feet long.

According to the brief report published by Anatoly Rozhdestvensky, leader of the expedition, the academies of sciences of Russia and China on a scale certainly beyond the resources of any learned body in Britain—and probably the United States. About 80 scientists spent seven months and covered 18,000 miles in Inner Mongolia and China.

Esgate Given Scholarship To Hamburg University

Northwestern University announced today that Gary Esgate, history for 10 months, from September, 1961, to July, 1962.

Two scholarships were given to students selected on the basis of academic record and ability in German.

Esgate, a junior at Northwestern, plans to become a German professor. Besides his academic achievements, he is presently vice president of the Northwestern chapter of the Chi Phi fraternity, walking on their hind legs. And Esgate graduated from Klamath Union High School in 1958.

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
