Farm Bureau Hears Tichinin

MONTAGUE—Close to 500 persons heard Leon Tichinin, Santa Clara farm adviser, speak at the annual Siskiyou County Farm Bureau dinner meeting here.

Tichinin, who was sent to the USSR in 1929 as a Russian speaking expert with the American National Exhibition, was born in Oranburg, Russia, and received his high school education in that country.

He became a naturalized citizen of the U.S. in 1939. He was graduated from the University of California at Berkeley in 1943 with a major in public administration, and in 1953 received his bachelor of science degree from the University of California at Davis.

Tichinin said he learned the people have little to say about matters in a country that is ruled by politicians and military men.

He stressed through his talk that the Russian government uses treachery, lies and deceit.

YREKA—Sheriff A. B. Cottar reports the following activities by the Siskiyou County Sheriff's Office during the month of February:

There were 172 cases reported and investigated during the month which included two assault, one auto theft, four ABC Act, six burglaries, four checks, three disturbing the peace, two drunk, four failure to provide, 15 thefts, one robbery and 110 miscellaneous criminal cases. There were 20

miscellaneous non-criminal cases handled.

During the month of February there were 62 bookings at the Siskiyou County Jail. The average daily population for the month was 48 persons.

The Sheriff's Civil Department handled 31 cases during the same period and collected \$115.09 in county fees.

Based On Midway
