A late change in the lineup of the Annual All-Indian Basketball Tournament, which will be sponsored by the Klamath Reservation Jaycees this Thursday, Friday and Saturday in Chiloquin, was today announced by tournament director Bob Doak.

The Wa-Pai-Shones, a top-rated team from Fallon, Nev., has registered for the big tournament in place of the Pine Ridge, S. Dak., club which was forced to drop out because of financial problems.

The Fallon five will appear against Toppish, Wash., in the second game of the opening round. In the opener which is slated to get underway at 1:30 p.m. Thursday the Warm Springs cagers will square off against Sprague River.

In the Thursday evening session

the defending champion Brown-

ing, Mont., team will tangle with Phoenix, Ariz., at 7:30 followed by a clash pairing Lodge Grass, Mont., and the Klamath All-Nations five.

The new entry, the Nevada team, is composed of members of three tribes: the Wapato, Payutes and Shoshones. They are sponsored by the Midwest Livestock Auction Company and are managed and coached by Teddy James. Names of the individual players are not available.

The big three-day tournament is the eighth annual affair sponsored by the Jaycees and it includes a variety of entertainment to go along with the heavy basketball action. Scheduled is the selection of a queen and court to rule over the tourney, Indian dances, numerous public dances and a queen's ball.

Liston Next For Champ Says D'Amato

MIAMI BEACH, Fla. (UPI) —

Champion Floyd Patterson, who twice rose from the canvas to knock out Ingemar Johansson Monday night, will next defend his heavyweight crown against Sonny Liston at Philadelphia in September, it was learned authoritatively today.

Patterson and officials of the reorganized Feature Sports, Inc., which promoted Monday night's "83 million" fight at Convention Hall — will leave Swedish Ingemar to history, despite his thrilling performance in his third title fight with Floyd.

Neither Floyd nor the FSI officials are the least interested in the loud debate over whether it was a "short count" or a "rabbit punch" that caused Ingemar to be in turn floored twice for a knockout at 2:45 of the sixth round. They know that another fight with Johansson would not sell.

The FSI officials have practically wrapped up the fight for Philadelphia's Municipal Stadium and will announce it just as soon as a group of reputable New York businessmen buy the contract of Philadelphia Sonny, the world's top contender in all rankings.

Insist On Change

Patterson and manager Cus D'Amato have insisted that Sonny's questionable ownership give way to new purchasers. And the ownership will be changed soon, it was learned.

Best hitting streaks ever compiled as a Giant were turned in by Fred Lindstrom in 1930 and Don Mueller in 1953. Both hit safely in 24 straight games.

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Hot Controversy Brewing In Wake Of Title Fight

MIAMI BEACH, Fla. (UPI) —

The most controversial heavyweight championship fight debate since the long-count Dempsey-Turney fight appeared to be brewing today in the wake of Floyd Patterson's victory over Ingemar Johansson. In this case the questions are:

Was it a short count?

Was it a rabbit punch that knocked the Swedish challenger out?

On the first one, the crowd in the Miami Beach Convention Hall booed when referee Bill Regan signalled the end of the fight, Patterson winning on a knockout at 2:45 of the sixth round.

"Johansson did not protest," Regan said. "He tried to get up at the count of eight, but fell back and was still down at the count of ten. There was no question about it."

An hour later, when reporters

finally were permitted to see Johansson, he said:

"I thought I was up in time. I'm sorry I wasn't."

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Garden Fans Boo Hometown Fighter

NEW YORK (UPI)—Floyd Patterson must be the greatest living example of that old saw that "you're never a hero in your own hometown."

Although a native of New York, the heavyweight champion was booed by 8,734 fans who turned out at Madison Square Garden Monday night to witness a closed circuit telecast of his title defense against Ingemar Johansson.

Patterson was booed when he was shown entering the ring at Convention Hall in Miami Beach. They weren't loud boos like you hear on some fight nights at the Garden because this, generally speaking, was a refined crowd of men and socialites—some of who paid \$100 for their "ringside" seats.

But the catcalls did outnumber the cheers, especially when Patterson was announced as the winner on a sixth-round knockout.

It was difficult to determine whether the Garden fans, like some in the crowd at Miami Beach, felt Johansson had been the victim of a short count. But the victory definitely was not a popular one with Floyd's fellow New Yorkers.

The Garden was turned into a huge theatre for the telecast. A large white screen, measuring 30 by 40 feet, was suspended from the upper balcony on one end of the famed arena.

The early arrivals were entertained for 90 minutes preceding

the start of the fight by a host of night club performers, including comedians Henny Youngman, Joey Adams and Myron Cohen and singer Bobby Darin.
