Within a year, an old two-story homestead house was attached to the store for living quarters. In time, the post office was transferred to the store and successive storekeepers also assumed the job of postmaster.

The store was built in 1935 by homesteader John Ernst for Charles and Rose Alsdorf who opened a rival business to the town's only other store, now a warehouse.

Lane County Deputy Holds Course For Local Officers

The second in a series of advanced training classes for city, county and state police officers was given in Klamath Falls Tuesday afternoon by Kenneth E. Allen of the Lane County Sheriff's Office.

Allen, chief criminal deputy for Lane County, gave a class in police lineup and roadblock techniques. He is a former Springfield city policeman and attended the University of Oregon.

The class was sponsored by the Oregon Association of City Police Officers and the Oregon State Sheriff's Association. The Klamath Falls Police Department hosted the class in its rifle range classroom.

Fight Rages Over Signs

SALEM (AP) — The billboard industry and those who seek more stringent regulation of billboards along state highways differed sharply Monday over amendments to a billboard control bill.

Appearing before the Senate Highways Committee, those for more controls said that federal standards should be applied to all Oregon highways and not just those in the interstate system.

The bill would apply these regulations only to the interstate system that includes only Highway 30 from Ontario to Portland and Highway 99 from Portland to the Oregon-California border.

The billboard industry also opposed any change in the bill that would set up a five-man, governor-appointed committee and which specifically spells out which groups the five come from.

The five would include representatives of the Oregon AFL-CIO, outdoor advertising, roadside industries, the Oregon Motor Association and the state Highway Commission under the bill.

Jack E. Schmitt, secretary of the Outdoor Advertising Council, said that it would not satisfy the industry if the appointments were made from general areas instead of the specific groups.

Forger Gets Prison Term

The second forgery conviction for Charles Junior Gaymon, 38-year-old transient, resulted in a five-year penitentiary sentence. Gaymon was sentenced Tuesday morning by Circuit Court Judge David R. Vandenberg.

Gaymon had nothing to say in his own behalf. A jury found Gaymon guilty last week after a short trial. He had been accused of passing a \$30 forged check last Dec. 5 at the Unique Market, 129 South Ninth Street. He had a previous forgery conviction and served some prison time after he broke probation.
