College Of Siskiyou Gets Full Accreditation

WEED — College of the Siskiyou has just been fully accredited by the Western College Association. This action followed a visiting committee of college and state department educators headed by President Roy L. Patrick of Napa Junior College. The group visited the COS campus Jan. 10-12 to evaluate the entire educational program of the junior college.

College of the Siskiyou is now as fully accredited as is possible for a collegiate institution in California," said Dr. M. J. Green-

shields, president of the college. All college level courses are transferable to the University of California and the state colleges. COS is approved by the federal government for the education of veterans and foreign students, and approved by the state for the rehabilitation of students injured or stricken by disease.

College of the Siskiyou is also a member in good standing of the Northern California Association of Junior Colleges, the California Association of Junior Colleges and the American Association of Junior Colleges.

The Western College Association is an organization of western colleges, one function of which is the examination of member institutions for accreditation so as to insure the maintenance of high educational standards.

Dunsmuir Receives News Of Federal Fund Grant

DUNSMUIR — Word has been received by the high school board that \$4,034.38 in federal funds will be available to Dunsmuir Joint Union High School on a matching basis for remodeling of the general science room and additional science equipment.

Dunsmuir High School has qualified for these funds under the National Defense Education Act of 1958, Delwin Poe, school superintendent, told the board.

The board also learned that \$7,000 in forest reserve funds have been allocated to the Dunsmuir High School for capital outlay

next year. Counties who are deprived of land tax money because of national forests within their boundaries are allocated forest reserve funds by the federal government according to national forest revenues received from those counties. These funds are used for schools and roads. Poe reminded the board in announcing the allocation.

Board members are continuing a school policy study. Board procedures and responsibilities will be taken up at the April board meeting.
