COOS BAY—Henley's Hornets landed two men on the first All-Star team of the A-2 tournament.

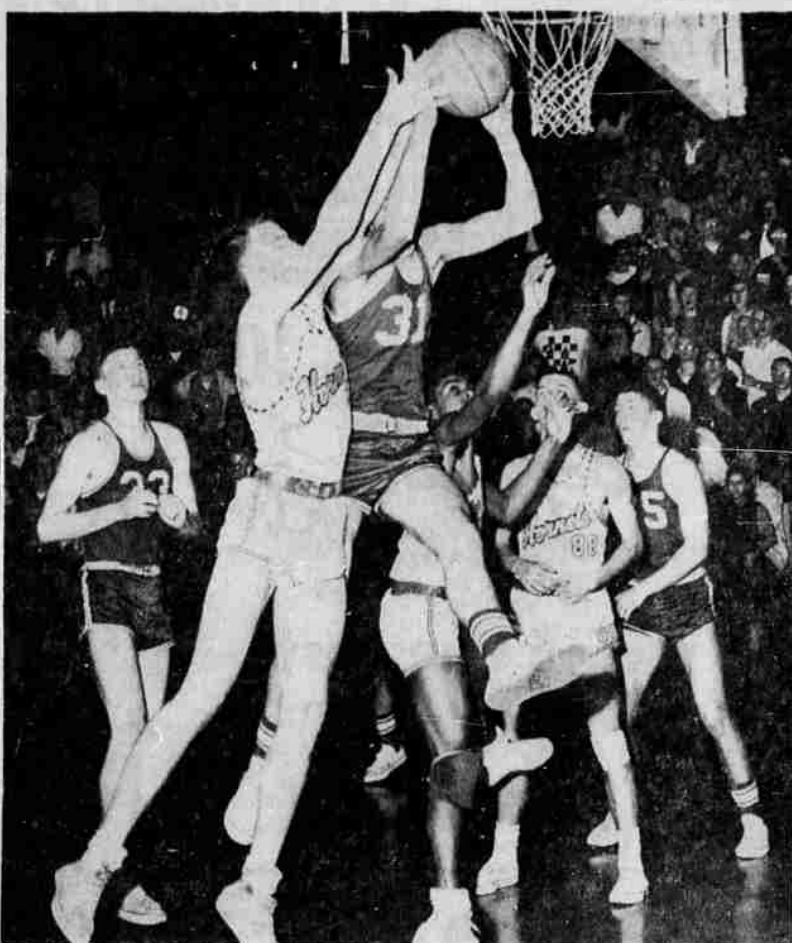
Snoaring the coveted berths for the Hornets were Ray Brown and Kent Gooding.

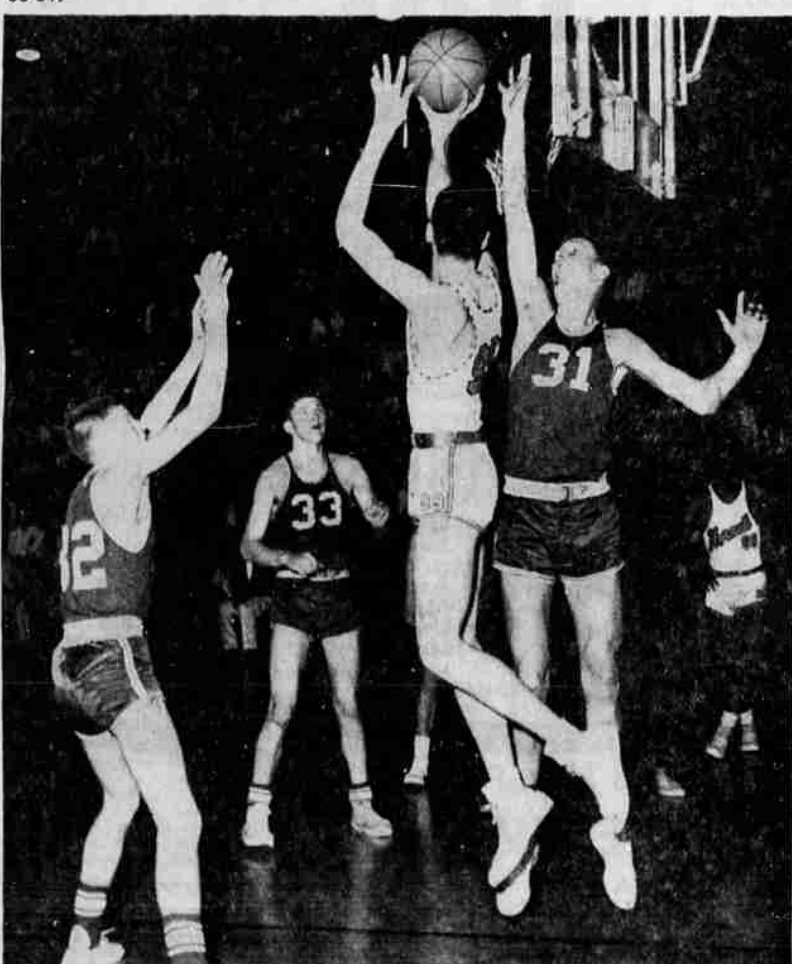

A-2 Tourney Title Won By Madras

COOS BAY (AP) — Madras' 25th straight victory after a season-opening loss to class A-1 Bend gave the central Oregon school the state class A-2 high school basketball championship here Wednesday night.

The White Buffaloes charged over Coquille, 63-51, in the final game of the tournament here.

Mount Angel beat Sherwood, 63-44, for third place. In the afternoon Seaside edged Henley, 60-59, for fifth place and the consolation title.

The closing night turnout of 3,500 assured a rousing financial success. Total attendance for the three-day meet, consisting of two afternoon and three night double-headers and one single game was 13,200.

Madras had to fight back from a 34-26 halftime deficit to beat a Coquille team, which had the tournament's leading scorer in Ron Stein.

In fact it was not until a star Coquille defender, Roger Sanders, was removed when he drew four fouls with his team leading, 39-34, that Madras was able to begin its winning rally.

Madras then registered 15 straight points, including 2 in the fourth quarter, to gain a safe 49-39 lead.

Stein topped the point makers with 22. Big Joe Piedmont of the losers was right behind with 21. They finished just like those for tournament scoring honors, too. Stein having 70 and Piedmont 68.

A tight defense and fine scoring performances by Don Berchold, with 18 points, and Ernie Bork, with 19, carried Mount Angel over Sherwood. The highest total a Sherwood player could make was 11 by Dave Rossa.

A 50 percentage shooting percentage was the big factor for Seaside in its win over Henley.

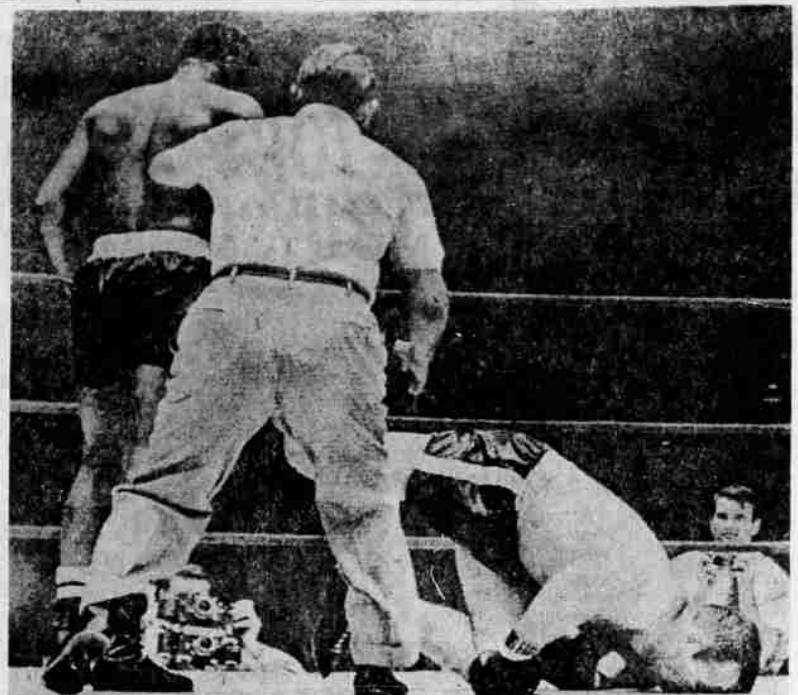

Films Show Ingo Got Break

MIAMI (UPI)—The public was victimized by a "fast count" just as much as Ingemar Johansson in his controversial knockout at the hands of Floyd Patterson, veteran Jack (Doc) Kearns asserted today.

"People pay to see a fight and they should get it," said Kearns, shrugging off evidence presented in New York Wednesday by Teleprompter which indicated Johansson was on the floor 11 1/2 seconds. "In the early days, the referee would tell you to 'get up and fight' but today they're too quick to count 'em out.'"

It's the reason behind the fact that a half century ago all the eastern champions were beaten when they went West.

"In the West, they had a bunch of fast four-round kids who fought at a whirlwind pace," Kearns recalled. "Those who came in from the East could stand the pace for one round but after that they had it."

Patterson, if the competition was around, wouldn't last long as champion because of the suspicious crystal quality of his jaw, the still agile 79-year-old Kearns analyzed.

Up And Down

"From the way he's up and down in almost every fight he has," Doc said, "it's pretty obvious that his chin isn't as strong as his heart. He reminds me of Fred Fulton, who was game and could box and punch. But hit him on the chin and he had to go."

"It is," he continued, "the same way in any racket. Look at baseball. Some of the slickest fielders in the game can't hit a lick. Yet some of the hardest hitters can't field. The real star is the guy who does everything and that's the way it is in boxing, too."

The man Patterson has to box now, to prove himself a true champion, is Sonny Liston.

"And Liston would have to be in the choice to beat him if they fought now," Kearns speculated. "He's big and strong and rough and he can take a punch as well as dish it out real good. I think he'd win the title and Patterson can't continue to dodge him no matter what the reason."

Reason Obvious

The reason is obvious to those inside boxing. Liston is managed by the wrong people, and don't let anybody tell you that Frankie Carbo still doesn't have a thumb in a number of boxing pies. You can't blame Patterson for not wanting anything to do with ring grime that might rub off one way or another. Liston's out is a completely new managerial setup.

Kearns currently is pointing Archie Moore toward a couple of fistic engagements in Europe. But, from the manner in which the old ballyhoo artist praised Johansson for "fighting and standing up better than anybody thought he would," it seems probable that later will tangle in Sweden for another big payday.

Gary Player Top Golfing Prize Victor

ST. PETERSBURG, Fla. (AP)—Stocky Gary Player has been going along his unobtrusive way on the pro golf tour this year while Arnold Palmer has been taking the headlines, but the youthful South African has won more prize money than any of his rivals.

Player, shooting every round in each of the 10 tournaments to date, has piled up \$19,285 in earnings to \$17,425 for Palmer, who set a money-winning record of \$75,292 in official PGA tournaments last year.

Player has won only one of the 10 tournaments, but he finished five times in the top five. Palmer won three of his nine tournaments and also finished in the top five in two others.

Starting today over the 6,296-yard, par 36-35 — 71 Pasadena course here, Player can increase his margin over Palmer, who is not entered in this 26th renewal of the St. Petersburg Open.

One round of the 72-hole, \$20,000 event will be played each day through Sunday. The field will be cut to the low 60 and ties Friday night after the second round.

In other games, the New York Yankees ended a four-game losing streak by defeating the Philadelphia Phillies, 2-0; the Washington Senators handed the Baltimore Orioles their fourth consecutive loss, 6-4; the Milwaukee Braves topped the Los Angeles Dodgers, 4-3, in 11 innings; the Pittsburgh Pirates overwhelmed the Minnesota Twins, 10-4; the San Francisco Giants nipped the Chicago Cubs, 10-9; the Boston Red Sox belted the Cleveland Indians, 14-6, and the Detroit Tigers trimmed the St. Louis Cardinals, 6-3.

Mantle Homers

Mickey Mantle drove in both runs for the Yankees, connecting for a double and a home run. The husky centerfielder, who returned to action Tuesday after a two-day layoff because of a knee injury, is hitting .500 in the Grapefruit League.

Joe Hicks, a rookie outfielder, smashed two homers, knocking in four runs to lead Washington over the Orioles. Marty Keough collected three hits for the Senators, who have won four of five games this spring.

Rookie centerfielder Mack (The Knife) Jones, considered Bill Bruton's replacement, tripled home

Lee Maye to earn the Braves their triumph. Another rookie, southpaw Denver Lemaster, limited the Dodgers to one hit over two innings.

The Pirates pounded out 16 hits, getting nine singles during their nine-run sixth inning. Gino Cimoli and Bill Materowski led the Pittsburgh hitters with three safeties apiece. Bob Friend went five innings for the world champions, allowing one run and four hits.

Stage Slugfest

The Giants and Cubs engaged in a free-swinging contest, with six home runs being slugged, but it was a balk by Chicago rookie hurler Dick Burwell with the

bases loaded that decided the game. Ernie Banks and Ron Santo slammed homers for the Cubs while Willie McCovey, John Orsino, Arlo Engel and Bob Farley hit homers for the Giants.

Don Mossi and Ray Narleski, former Cleveland relief aces, turned in fine performances as Detroit took advantage of two Cardinal errors in the sixth inning to score four runs off Art Kay.

The Red Sox jumped on rookie hurler Wilfred Siebert and Sam McDowell for 10 runs in the first inning to rout the Indians. Willie Kirkland clouted a grand slam homer for the Indians.

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
