Medford Rips Tillamook By Big Score

EUGENE (AP) — Roseburg, Wilson of Portland, South Salem, Medford, Grant of Portland, and South Eugene won victories Wednesday and joined Tuesday night winners Klamath Falls and Corvallis in the second round of the Oregon class A-1 high school basketball tournament here.

Jim Jarvis, the state's highest scoring prep player, recorded 20 points to help Roseburg surge late in the game and defeat David Douglas of the Portland Metropolitan League.

Roseburg ranked No. 1 in the Associated Press poll and was the Midwestern League champion. Douglas tied for tenth in the poll.

Wilson, second place team in the Portland city league and fifth in the poll, came on after a slow start to beat Jesuit of Beaverton, 55-42.

Earlier in the day undefeated Grant, the Portland league champion and No. 2 in the poll, turned back a stubborn Scappoose team, 61-56.

Sixth-ranked South Eugene out-defended Central Catholic, No. 8, and the Portland Metropolitan League champion, 39-34.

Defending champion Medford, No. 4 in the poll, routed Tillamook, 65-32, as Bob Quinney posted the tournament individual high scoring total to date, 27 points.

South Salem knocked off ninth ranked Bend, 68-57.

The consolation round starts this morning. Championship play continues at 3 p.m. with a game between Klamath Falls, ranked No. 3 in the poll but a pre-season choice as tournament winner by writers and broadcasters, meeting Corvallis.

Other title bracket games have South Eugene vs. Grant, Medford vs. South Salem and Roseburg vs. Wilson.

McARTHUR COURT (Special)—The Klamath Union Pelicans are learning to live with the fact that when they step onto the floor in an Oregon A-1 basketball tournament they are not, to say the least, the "pet" of the majority of the crowd.

Despite their narrow 46-43 win over St. Helens in the Tuesday night opener, the Pelicans found themselves once again the "target team" when they faced the Corvallis Spartans this afternoon.

The Spartans, the runnerup club in District 8, were the "darlings" of the fans, especially since they had come from behind to snag a thrilling 30-49 win over the La Grande Tigers in the second game Tuesday night.

However, if the Pelicans were letting the situation get them down, it didn't show.

KU coach Dean White's comment, "Well, if that's the way it is, I guess we'll just have to go without them, pretty well," summed up the Whitebird reaction.

All the people attending the 43rd annual classic aren't against White and his team, however. Among the true Pel backers are a bunch of strong-handed well-wishers, including a contingent of Klamath Falls people that accompanied the club to Eugene and a number of coaches who are taking a busman's holiday at the tournament.

This same group, however, is unknowingly making coach White the only casualty of the tourney thus far. White has winced many times as his congratulatory have grabbed his right hand to wish him good luck.

The reason? His hand is broken. During the Klamath Falls City League basketball season just completed, White, one of the top scorers in the loop, took a spill and injured the mitt.

Coincidentally, the same situation prevailed last year at the tourney, only then the hand wasn't actually broken, just badly bruised. However, the end result was the same.

White, who remembers well those with the strongest grip, has learned to tender his left to the more exuberant hand-shaker.

The entire Pelican team sat through the Wednesday games, taking full advantage of their day off in order to get a look at their more promising opposition.

What they saw, Wednesday morning at least, gave them little to go on in one instance, and cause for some understandable worry in the other.

The South Eugene Axemen, who clambered into a tournament slot with a last second victory over Marshfield in a playoff at the close of the regular season, were the pathetic winners of a rough-tumble combination of soccer, football and ice hockey style of game with the determined but confused Central Catholic Rams in Wednesday's opener.

The Axemen, backed by their usual swarm of hometown rooters, eked out a nervous 39-34 win over the Rams in a contest that saw more full-length scrambles on the floor for loose balls than it did full-stretch battles for rebounds.

Trailing Quinney with 23 points was Larry Enos of Corvallis and La Grande's David Smith with 21. Bunched at 20 apiece are Al Zell of Grant and Jim Jarvis of Roseburg.

Quinney is also one of the two top rebounders in the tournament, with 19, along with Ron Lake of Roseburg.

Medford snared 77 rebounds against Tillamook to break the tournament record for a single game. The former record of 71 was set by McMinnville against Redmond in 1957.

Kimpton, Moore Pace Ducks In 81-79 Loss To Trojans

PORTLAND (Special) — Ex-Klamath Union High basketball star Butch Kimpton closed out his college cage career with an outstanding performance in the Oregon Ducks final game of the 1961 season, a spine chilling 81-79 loss to the USC Trojans, the nation's fifth ranked team, in the opening round of the Far West NCAA regionals played in Portland's glass palace Wednesday night.

Kimpton, a 6-1 senior Oregon guard, played all but about five minutes in the thrilling nightcap of a double bill that saw Arizona State University edge Seattle U, 72-70 in the opener. He was a big factor in a squeaker that saw the Ducks hold a 37-26 halftime lead over the favored Southern Cal five.

Kimpton connected on three long jumpers in six tries from outside, nabbed a perfect two for two at the foul line, and collected a nasty cut beneath his right eye in a melee beneath the basket as the surprising Ducks gave the Trojans one of their toughest games of the year.

Kimpton, Denny Strickland and Leon Hayes, all UO guards making their final appearances, helped to put the wrapper on a season in which the Ducks collected the Chancellor's Trophy, notched the first four-game sweep over arch-rival Oregon State in the history of the school, and came within a gasp of pulling one of the major upsets in 1961 NCAA playoff action.

A second former Klamath Falls player, 6-7 center Glenn Moore, who had the toughest assignment on the floor, that of guarding John Rudometkin, USC's high-scoring All-American, collected 10 rebounds and 12 points for the Ducks before fouling out when the score read 61-32 for USC with 8:31 left to play.

Moore held the flash "Rudo" to a miserly eight points during the first half, but before the contest was over, Rudometkin found the range for the game's high of 24.

Oregon's Charlie Warren was next with 21, although he fouled out with 5:45 to go.

The Trojans lost "Rudo," who played all but the final 2:37 of the second half with four personal fouls, when they had a 73 to 65 lead.

In the final 1:22 of the game, down 77-70 after losing their lead midway at the point of the period, the Webfoots had the 4,709 Palace fans screaming their approval as they surged back to within two points of eliminating USC.

The late rally featured a combined marksmanship of Kimpton, Strickland who finished with 19, and Bill Simmons who had 16, as they were forced to work minus the services of their two high-scoring stars.

Kimpton missed the opening four minutes of the action, and was out only briefly for treatment of the eye injury in the second period. The injury proved to be not serious.
