New Colorful Plastic Coating Hides Industrial Eyesores

NEW YORK (UPI)—One of the eyesores of industrial America is slowly but steadily being cured by a new face lifting plastic style. The latest development to come out of the world of plastics is a coating which can change an ugly duckling of an industrial plant into a kaleidoscope of multi-colored pipes and machinery. The coating, urethane, provides a sparkle that lasts for years, and a surface that is virtually abrasion-proof and scratch-proof, according to manufacturers of the plastic.

Myron Bryant, president of Better Finishes and Coatings Co., a Dixon chemical subsidiary, said this unusual plastic lasts four times as long as ordinary paint and gives a glossy hard covering that can be cleaned with very little effort.

A number of large industrial firms have already turned to the new plastic to exchange somber exteriors for a fresh, long-lasting gleam. Industry sources estimate the sales of the new urethanes have moved up from \$1 million in 1958 to more than \$3 million last year.

Bryant noted that plants using chemicals or acids are particularly impressed with the new plastic because it cannot be corroded by accidental spillage. And trucks and tank cars carrying chemicals or acids now are beginning to acquire urethane coats to protect against spillage damage.

A prime example of this switch from a somber tone to pastels is Du Pont's chamber works in Deepwater, N.J. Decked in light green with touches of yellows and reds, the plant now glistens by daylight or floodlight.

Maintenance men chose a light green to hide streaks that were bound to show up on parts of the unit. Apparently one of the chemicals used in the process funds a way to seep through even the tightest joint, and slight green staining had continually shown up here and there. But, Du Pont said, when you can't lick them, join them. They painted her green.

New Judy Garland Making Comeback In Hollywood

HOLLYWOOD (AP) — Judy's back, and she's sure enough the new Garland we've been hearing about.

The game gal who starred for 20 years in Hollywood has returned for her first movie in almost seven years. The last one was "A Star Is Born," a handsome job that got her an Academy nomination.

Even at 38 she has the glow of legend about her. You think of the youthful triumphs, and the mature years full of troubles and disappointment. The smash comeback at the Palace, then other times of illness and problems.

The travails now seem far behind her. When I saw her on the set of "Judgment at Nuremberg," she was as cheerful as a starlet.

She is still a looker. Her face seems slimmer than in recent years. Though she is inclined to be buxom, she tapers down to a pair of shapely gambs. These were personal observations. She is bored with questions about her weight, and with good reason.

Is she mad at Hollywood?

"No, not at all," she replied. "How could I be? I've had some wonderful times here."

"I am selling my house here merely because it's more convenient for me to live in London and New York. My work is centered around those places; Hollywood is actually out of the way as a place to live. You have to fly five hours just to get to New York. Then it's a matter of getting to Europe or wherever else I'm working."

She said she would keep a house in London and an apartment in New York. She'll return to England in June, after her three children get out of school.

In contrast to "A Star Is Born," which took six months to film, she is working eight days in "Judgment." Like Marlene Dietrich and Montgomery Clift, she is playing a witness at the war crimes trial of German jurists. Judy plays a German girl who became involved in a Nazi racial pollution case.

"More movies? Sure, I'm interested. They can be either dramatic or musical; it doesn't matter to me. I just want to do good pictures."

Her future plans include a concert tour of the United States; she just scored a hit with her 2½-hour song sessions in Texas. She also has some dates in Europe and may do the London company of "The Unsinkable Molly Brown"—if she can sew up the film rights, too.
