Ed Murrow Goes Without Cigarettes

WASHINGTON (UPI) — "My name is Edward R. Murrow. I was christened Egbert but abandoned that name at the age of 16 while working in logging camps in western Washington."

Thus, in tones that suggested an impending Armageddon, began the statement of the new director of the U.S. Information Agency at his confirmation hearing before the Senate Foreign Relations Committee Tuesday.

It was a good thing for me that the erstwhile Egbert identified himself at the outset of his testimony. Otherwise, I probably would not have recognized him.

Like most televisioners, I was accustomed to seeing the famous newscaster, interviewer and documentary producer peering at his audience through a cloud of tobacco smoke.

The cigarette, as you know, is a virtually a television trademark for Murrow. His smoking habits have been lampooned by just about every comedian in America.

But in a hint of almost two hours before the committee's microphones, Murrow didn't even have a single drag. He just sat there, answering questions and wringing his hands.

How poor fellow must have suffered! Not only, for once, was his face clearly visible, but it also was plain to see that his nerves were shot.

As he read his prepared statement, the manuscript trembled in his hands and beads of perspiration dropped from his chin. Under the table, his knees were twitching and his feet kept up a ceaseless jiggle.

I couldn't imagine that a man who had regularly appeared before audiences numbering in the millions would be that nervous about testifying before a few senators. I assumed, therefore, that he had a case of the tobacco jitters.

My first thought was that Murrow had given up smoking in order to conform with the health trend on the New Frontier. After all, a chain smoker probably wouldn't last long in a tough football game.

Then the committee brought out that Murrow had taken a 90 percent pay cut when he left broadcasting to join the Kennedy administration. This led me to conclude that he could no longer afford to indulge his habit.

It turned out, however, that my conjecturing was off base. Murrow has not abandoned cigarettes. Being a newcomer and unfamiliar with Senate rules, he was just needlessly torturing himself.

I found this out after the hearing when someone asked Murrow why he had abstained from lighting up.

"I wanted to," he said. "But I didn't know if it was permitted."

I think it's safe to predict that the USIA chief will never again expose himself to a congressional committee. The next time he is called to testify, he undoubtedly will be back behind a smoke screen.

Kennedy Press Conferences Like Old Times With Ike

WASHINGTON (UPI) — It was just like old times when the President smiled his recognition of UPI's Merriman Smith and began answering the newsmen's press conference question. The President's answer wouldn't parse.

The President was handsome young John F. Kennedy. The old times were those of Dwight D. Eisenhower. The occasion was last week's Kennedy news conference when Smith asked a question which has been troubling Washington newsmen.

The White House has been receiving a great deal of mail protesting the department of reporters who put questions to the President. TV viewers, being wholly uninformed of news conference tradition, believe the reporters are too direct, or abrupt, with their President of the United States—that they do not accord him proper respect.

Plenty of Respect

Nonsense, of course. Respect is accorded in full measure to the man and to the office he holds.

There is a scramble, however, for recognition. Reporters leap to their feet, there is the noise of their rapid movement. But no disrespect. That is what Smith asked about last week, whether the President felt himself abused or disrespected.

"Mr. President, I'm sure you're aware, sir," was the way Smith began. "Sir" is the reporter's salute to the presidential office, that and a courteous tone and manner.

The President replied: "Well, you subject me to some abuse but not to any lack of respect. I don't—I must say that I do not know that there are any difficulties, but if, and I know that it places burdens on members of the press to have to stand up, particularly when I'm not able to recognize them."

"On the other hand, if it were changed, and one member stood up, then, perhaps, that would not be a satisfactory device. So that I think that along with the old saying about 'don't take down the fence until you know why it was put up,' I would say that we

should stay with what we now have."

Sounded Like Ike

Dr. Syntax would shudder, if he were still alive, to read those two paragraphs. That is the way Ike used to talk in news conferences. The eggheads who listened to or read Eisenhower were saddened.

"His syntax," they would complain, "is atrocious."

Now comes the new President with news conference "responses" that simply will not parse. What to do? Best thing to do is to consider what meaning the President sought to convey. His crack that the newsmen did subject him to some abuse was facetious, obviously so. The reporters do not do that.

Neither are they disrespectful. President Kennedy made that fact clear enough. Nor does the President want any changes made at this time in his news conference routine.

This essay would serve its purpose if the TV viewers would read the President's scrambled words and consider the meaning of what he said.

The ill-informed TV critics of newsmen are trying to apply to the news conferences their own childish TV formula—the good guy (one) and the bad guys. Silly, isn't it?

U.S. Ambassador Old Hand At Negotiating With Reds

WASHINGTON (AP) — Arthur Hobson Dean, who will head the U.S. negotiating team in Geneva next week, is no old hand at bargaining with Communists.

He has haggled with them in a seemingly endless struggle to find a middle ground. He has stalked off when he thought the talks were getting nowhere and the Communists were getting in-sulting.

Dean, 61, a lawyer, did both in late 1953 in Panmunjom, Korea. He served seven weeks there as U.S. ambassador to planning discussions on a Korean peace conference.

He came away with this impression of the Communist North Korean and Chinese negotiators: "The Communists have been using the negotiations as a forum for their propaganda. It's all part of their psychological war. They insult you all day long."

When the long drawn out talks on a nuclear test ban resume Tuesday, Dean will be dealing this time with Soviet Communists. He has been instructed to keep talking as long as the negotiations show the progress needed to reach an agreement.

To arrive at one, Dean said, "We are going to use all of our powers of ingenuity and persuasion."

Dean has dealt not only with Communists in negotiating on behalf of the United States. He is not new to Geneva.

In 1958, and again last year, this specialist in international and corporate law headed U. S. delegations to Geneva conferences on the law of the sea. Each conference was attended by 80-odd nations.

Associates found Dean a forceful speaker whose statements were cast in popular phrases rather than in legalistic terminology.

A man who was to travel far abroad in his later years, Dean went to school and worked at his first jobs in his hometown, Ithaca, N.Y., where he was born Oct. 16, 1898. He studied at the Ithaca High School and then at Cornell University, in Ithaca, helping to meet college expenses by working as a night clerk at a hotel and as a bookkeeper in a bank.

He interrupted his studies with Navy service in World War I, returning to the university after the armistice for his bachelor's and law degree.

Admitted to the New York bar in 1921, he joined Sullivan & Cromwell, a New York City firm of which the late Secretary of State John Foster Dulles was a partner. When Dulles became a U. S. senator in 1949, Dean succeeded him as the senior partner.

Dean was married to the former Mary Talbot Clark Marden on June 25, 1932. They have two children, Nicholas B. Dean and Patricia Campbell.

An associate of Dean has said, "His only hobby so far as I know is the law." He showed his dedication to it at Geneva, putting in long hours seven days a week and evidently enjoying it. He also spent quite a bit of his own money to entertain delegates in a manner he thought befitting the United States.

Shortly after his return from Korea, Dean defended himself against a charge by the late Sen. Herman Welke, R-Iowa, that he favored a policy of "appeasement" toward Red China.

"I am 100 per cent against appeasement or knocking under, and to the best of my knowledge and belief I have fought the Communists at every turn," Dean said. "Communism is repugnant to every idea for which I stand."

He also said he never had favored admitting Communist China into the United Nations or into the family of nations.

Later, in April 1955, Dean suggested in a magazine article that the United States would improve its international position by recognizing Red China in return for "balancing concessions." He did not say exactly what these concessions should be.
