Solons Adopt Million Dollar State Surplus Food Program

SALEM (AP) — A legislative ways and means subcommittee today adopted a program to provide federal surplus food to the needy in Oregon. It would cost the state and counties about \$1 million in the next two years.

Sen. Alfred Corbett, D-Portland, moved for adoption of the proposal which must be acted upon by the full Ways and Means Committee before it goes to the floor of the House of Representatives.

The proposal would put the plan into operation this biennium as funds become available.

It would have the state pay 70 per cent of the cost, or about \$634,000, and the counties 30 per cent, or \$272,000.

Both welfare recipients and low-income families would be eligible for the food under the plan.

Counties could enter the plan at their own option. If they do participate, however, they could not limit the food to welfare recipients.

The plan would be retroactive so counties like Josephine and Klamath that already have contracted for surplus food under the old plan would share in the state participation. Counties now must meet 100 per cent of the costs.

A report estimated some 59,000 welfare recipients and some 118,000 low-income families would be able to get the food valued at \$4.85 wholesale per person each month.

To get the food a person would have to have a net cash income of less than \$102 for a 30-day period prior to filing an application or an income of \$247 for the same period for a family of two, \$186 for three, \$225 for four, \$269 for five and six, \$360 for seven to nine and \$383 for 10 or more.

Food available under the program includes cornmeal, all-purpose flour, dry milk, rice, lard, butter, dried eggs, pork and gravy, pea beans and peanut butter.

Central Catholic; St. Helens Win

EUGENE (AP) — St. Helens eliminated La Grande from the Oregon A-1 basketball tournament today with a 50-43 victory in the consolation bracket.

La Grande, the first team to drop from the 16-team tournament, took an early lead before St. Helens rallied.

St. Helens led at the half 25-23. Balne Ceder hit the lone La Grande field goal of the third period to narrow the gap to one at 26-25. But the Lions out-scrambled the Eastern Oregon team the rest of the period and held a 40-30 third-quarter edge.

La Grande came up to within six points early in the fourth period, but got no closer.

Game scoring honors were shared by St. Helens' 6-2 forward Terry Jackson and Dave Prinz, with 16. La Grande had only two men in double figures — David Smith with 11, and Buddy Hilliard with 10.

Central Catholic, shoved into the losers' bracket Wednesday when beaten by South Eugene, broke into an early lead before the upset-minded Indians rallied.

The Rams led 15-9 at the quarter before losing the lead midway in the second period. Then Buck Karp connected on three 25-foot push shots for the Indians' first lead of the game.

A shot from mid-court by Dan Delk as the half ended gave the Indians a 26-24 halftime margin.

Central Catholic led briefly early in the second half, but Scappoose, losers of but one game before going into the tourney, could get only three points ahead.

The last Scappoose lead came on two free throws by Ron Kucera. Three points by Les Henderson gave the Rams a lead they never lost at 36-35 and the third period ended with Central leading 38-35.

Guards Jack Fettig and Joe Quirk broke the game wide open at the start of the fourth period. Both the small men repeatedly intercepted Scappoose passes and were breaking through for layins.

Central ran up their margin to 14 points before Delk could drop one in from the floor for the Indians first field goal of the period.

Les Henderson was high man for the Rams with 13 points.

The game scoring honors went to guard Buck Karp of the Indians, whose long left-handed shots from the floor netted 14 points.

Judge Turns Down Motion For Mrs. Ruff Acquittal

Judge David R. Vandenberg Thursday morning denied a motion for a directed verdict of acquittal in the Verna Lee Ruff second degree murder trial and Defense Attorney Glenn D. Ramirez proceeded with his case.

Ramirez, in his motion, alleged that the state had failed to prove its case. Deputy District Attorney Robert M. Redding rested 1 1/2 prosecution case Wednesday afternoon after calling eight witnesses in an attempt to prove that Mrs. Ruff murdered Joseph W. Penasse Feb. 4 with a hunting knife.

The defense is also expected to call about eight witnesses, most of whom testified for the state. Ramirez has indicated that he will call Mrs. Ruff to the stand to give her version of the killing.

Three witnesses testified Wednesday afternoon that Mrs. Ruff and Penasse had argued during the day and that Penasse had accused Mrs. Ruff of flirting.

Irven W. (Johnny) Holt said he and Howard Bryant had left Klamath Falls to go rabbit hunting. They had picked up Penasse, Mrs. Ruff and her brother, Bobby Lee Beal, in Sprague River. Holt said they had driven to Beatty and back to Sprague River, shooting at rabbits and drinking wine.

Holt, who was driving, said he stopped the car once and Penasse and Mrs. Ruff got out and argued. He said Penasse became belligerent and "started calling her (Mrs. Ruff) names."

"We came back to Beal's house in Sprague River," Holt said. "I pulled into the yard and stopped. Verna and her brother got out. First she tried to get Joe (Penasse) to come into the house for something to eat."

"Joe was mad and he finally got out of the car," Holt continued, "and he told Verna, 'I'll fix you this time.' He started hitting her and she backed up and replied, 'I'll kill you.' Then Verna fell to and was knocked to the ground and Joe fell on top of her. Joe got up, staggered and said, 'She stabbed me.'"

Holt described how Penasse was dragged into the house onto the kitchen floor. Holt said he saw a cut on Penasse's wrist but didn't think it was serious.

"Joe was still breathing," Holt said. "We put him on a mattress in the living room and covered him with a blanket." The rest of the group proceeded to cook some bacon and eggs, Holt said, and Beal watched television and Mrs. Ruff and Bryant played the piano for a few minutes.

"After awhile we went to see how Joe was," Holt said. "We got to looking at him and saw that the boy was dead."

Bryant and Beal also testified Wednesday afternoon but neither man recalled much about the evening. Bryant said he was asleep in the back seat of the car until he was awakened and asked to help drag Penasse into the house.

Beal said he "saw a hole in Joe's stomach." He also said he found a hunting knife under the porch of his house on Feb. 7. The state has alleged that the knife was the murder weapon.

Deputy Sheriff Alvie Youngblood was the last state witness Wednesday afternoon. He said Verna told him that she stabbed Penasse and later signed a statement to that effect.
